










The answers given to the questions raised may tug at your heart strings. One thing is for sure...the decision to send their son, Brandon, to St. John's has already paid great dividends! Brandon offered his own version of the journey! Even though there are two sides to every story, ou will see that sometimes the stories share the same

Why did you feel the need to enroll Brandon at SJMS? During Brandon's 10th grade year, he began high school in a large public school where we lived in Fayetteville, Arkansas. As the year progressed, Brandon's grades began to plummet. We sought help from teachers and school officials but were unable to get the assistance we needed. Seemingly, Brandon was getting lost in a crowd of many students. He was not very self-disciplined, especially when it came to school work. Brandon was losing self-confidence and self-esteem. He became increasingly argumentative toward us and those around him. All this, combined with his ADHD diagnosis early in life, created a very difficult environment. Our friends, the Gottsponers, had sent their son, Levi, to SJMS and his turnaround was amazing. We sought their counsel and prayed for direction from God. It became increasingly certain that we were being led to enroll Brandon at SJMS.

What surprised you about the experience? Brandon was generally a very solid student until his 10th grade year when he began to believe that he was not capable of making A's. We constantly urged him to do his best and told him how much we believed in his abilities. Once Brandon got

into the structured environment at SJMS, the low teacher/student ratios coupled with some of the best teachers on earth, empowered him to thrive academically. The St. John's faculty and staff is of the highest caliber, and they really care about our son. He even shared with us that he never thought he could be the good student he was becoming. The truth be known, we were not sure Brandon could make it through college on the path he was traveling prior to his arrival at St. John's. We are very confident he will not only be prepared for college, but also for life afterwards. St. John's professes to turn boys into men. Brandon is proof that happens.

Did the difficulty of saying good-bye to your son balance with the way he has accomplished so much while a Cadet at St. John's? Sending our child to a boarding school was no doubt an agonizing decision, but we felt a much worse decision would have been to let him continue on the path of struggle and failure. During his New Boy period at SJMS, we had limited contact with Brandon by design, and we understood that. We were able to write him letters. He was initially very angry with us for

sending him to SJMS. However, as he progressed through his first year, he began to increasingly buy into it. In fact, he not only told us he wanted to go back for his senior year, he would defend the honor of St. John's against any naysayer. There is no doubt in our mind that SJMS saved our son. As much as we miss seeing him on a daily basis, we know that he is being well prepared for college and life. It is a trade-off worth making for us. Of course, we get to see Brandon on fall and spring parents' weekends and on Thanksgiving, Christmas, and spring breaks. We communicate with him throughout the school year on a regular basis. Our relationship with Brandon prior to St. John's was very strained, but since his arrival there he has gained new respect and appreciation for his parents; our relationship with him has never been better.

In closing, Brandon broke his leg playing football this year, and although we were not able to be there initially, the teachers and staff did everything possible to make sure he was cared for and to ensure he maintained his studies. Nurse Lori Faerber and his SJMS mom, Pam Kraus, probably took better care of him than we would have. We



owe them and other faculty and staff a debt of gratitude we can never repay. They have treated him like their own son. St. John's is now a part of our family forever. We are grateful beyond words for how much our family has received from this fine school.

Brandon.

Why did your parents send you to St. John's?

My parents sent me to St. John's because of my poor effort in my schoolwork, mainly my sophomore year. I also didn't get along with my parents as well as I should have. I would fight with them frequently and was disrespectful.

What surprised you about St. John's?

New Boy, was harder than I thought it would be. It taught me, though, that you can't do everything by yourself. During New Boy period, you need teamwork and friends to help you get through it. Guys like Jack Glasgow, who was a New Boy with me, helped motivate me and Xinyang Du, who was my senior drill instructor, broke me down then built me back up into a better person. They are like my two brothers. The teachers at St. John's all have a unique personality and truly care about you as a person and care about your grades.

How is this school different than the school you left?

At my old school, it was hard to get the attention you do at St. John's. The teachers at St. John's will come in early or stay after school to help you with whatever you need. The teachers at my former school hardly ever did that. One thing about St. John's that's obviously different is the fact that after school is over we go back to the barracks and we still can see each other.

As for sports, there are fewer players on the teams versus the schools back home. I had quit football during the summer before my junior year because it was taking up so much time, and I wasn't getting anything out of it. It wasn't fun anymore. When I came to St. John's, I decided to play football. Only a few people know that I considered quitting after less than two weeks, but I didn't. I stuck with it and am so glad I did. Playing football my junior year was the most fun I have ever had playing a sport, and it felt so good to know I was a part of the first playoff win in school history.

How has the school helped you cope with your leg in jury? I broke my leg during a football game that initially led to me having a cast on my leg and being in a wheelchair for a few weeks. Later, I needed for surgery to insert a rod and pins in my leg.

I am not saying people wouldn't have cared for me if I was back home and this injury had happened there, but the people at St. John's are special and have helped me so much. I am forever grateful for what everybody did to help me.

What do you attribute your successes to now?

Before St. John's, I had very bad study habits. I attribute my good grades to the fact I had teachers who cared so much about me and wanted me to succeed, including Mrs. Kraus, Coach Alvarado, Mrs. Werth, MAJ Polzella, Mrs. Rickman, and more. They had my attention and made class fun for me. Getting ribbons, medals, and certificates for my achievements gave me a feeling of accomplishment. Being recognized for doing well in school or outside of school made me feel like I wasn't just another student. It made me feel important and successful. Because of hard work and motivation by friends, family, and teachers, I made straight A's for the first time and began to believe in myself.

What are your plans after you graduate from St. John's? I plan to attend Westminster College in Fulton, Missouri, and major in chemistry/pre-pharmacy. I also plan to minor in Spanish and possibly study abroad for a semester. After college, I hope to attend the University of Arkansas Medical School and obtain a Doctorate of Pharmacy.

The staff helped me in so many ways through my surgery:

Lt. Risher, my military advisor, arranged for a bed I could get into. Mrs. Kraus, my St. John's Mom brought homework assignments to the infirmary.

Coach Alvarado made sure I stayed current with Spanish homework. Mrs. Stein checked up on me and brought me milkshakes.

Nurse Lori and Kathy helped me in more ways than I could possibly list! The president and the commandant checked on me daily.

Friends would wheel me to and from places, get me food from the mess hall, and sit and talk with me.

At the beginning of the original Star Trek series, the crew of the Star Ship Enterprise goes "Boldly where no man-where no one-has gone...before." In today's, terms this quote would have to be changed to: "Boldly go where men and women and teachers have gone before. To reach the outer limits of space without fear or dread."

St. John's Military School is fortunate enough to have among its ranks two space explorers, Anna Robles and Pam Kraus. These two spend their summer vacations broadening their knowledge base and gaining ideas to help motivate their students to get excited about science.

The summer of 2014, Mrs. Kraus attended the Honeywell Educators at Space Academy at the U.S. Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville, Alabama. Honeywell pays the expenses for 200 selected teachers each summer to provide these teachers

tools to motivate students to be interested in STEM (science, engineering and technology).

During the workshop, Kraus was teamed with teachers form Scotland, Vietnam, China, and a Britisher who teaches in Dubai. Kraus explains, "I plan to collaborate with the teacher from China and one from Florida on a student-designed laboratory that SJMS students can do in our lab. We will Skype and email data back and forth and talk to the other classes about how our experiences went. One of the contacts I made at the workshop helped me apply for and receive a grant that provided ten kits to make robotic submarines. I attend these workshops to gain new knowledge about cutting-edge science experiments and to network with teachers around the world. Space exploration is the final frontier, and the Cadets at St. John's have a chance to participate in and experience firsthand what STEM has to offer."







Robles

Anna Robles spent a week in Columbus, Georgia, with 15 other teachers from around the country as part of the annual Teachers in Space conference. Over the past four years Robles has attended three different Teachers in Space conferences. The first workshop was focused on Suborbital Space Flight. Two summers ago, Robles attended a workshop for Human Factors and Space. Robles explaines, "We spent the first few days learning some basics involved in launching a balloon to near space. We learned about different sensors that could be put on the balloon as part of the payload, such as light sensors, temperature sensors, and even radiation sensors.

The program strives to get the teachers excited and send them home with new knowledge and ideas that they can incorporate into the classroom. For me, the greatest takeaway has been the networking with other teachers. I have met 15 new people with ideas on how to teach something. Bobby Russell was one of those people I met. He is CEO and founder of Quest for Stars, which is a non-profit that works with school and colleges to promote STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math.) Bobby has agreed to do a Skype session with our boys in November. He will talk about what he does and show them some of his projects. Being the science nerd that I am, I decided to detour to Orlando, Florida, prior to returning to Kansas. I was able to visit Cape Canaveral for the first time and watch the launch of a Delta IV rocket. And to top it all off, I had the opportunity to meet the first Brazilian Astronaut, Marcos Cesar Pontes. Overall, it was a great learning opportunity! I returned to Kansas even more excited for the upcoming school year!"



We will be sponsoring a running club three days a week to keep the boys and ourselves in shape.




Robert Conde finishes 5th overall M.S. Boys
















Edward sykes personal best 21:37 5k. Caleb Moscati personal best 22;33 5k Chenxi Yu with a time of 21:43 5k.


