


SJMSPA Volunteers Needed

Stephen Ritter and Enoch Lau met just two short years ago when Ritter joined the 122nd Corps of Cadets as a "New Boy," and Lau commanded Headquarters Company. Ritter quickly became known as a young man of many talents and abilities, while Lau's reputation for excellence in all things had already been established. Both displayed mental acuity, earning high academic honors and both pursued the study of music; Lau as a violinist and pianist and Ritter as a pianist and vocalist. Each was a member of a state honor musical group prior to arriving at St. John's. Academic pursuits allowed for study in Honors English and other advanced courses. Additionally both considered physical training to be important

to the development of a well rounded person. Their membership in the St. John's AMS (Advanced Military Skills) team designated by the black uniform, is a testament to their physical strength and stamina.

Serving together this year as officers on the Battalion Staff, Lau as Battalion Commander, and Ritter as Executive Officer, has given the two a chance to further cement their friendship. When searching for college career paths their goals were also very similar.

C/MAJ Ritter learned November 28, 2010 that he was accepted to Norwich University, the oldest of six Senior Military Colleges, recognized by the United States Department of Defense as




the birthplace of ROTC (Reserve Officers Training Corps). Accepted on full scholarship, Ritter is sure to bring great honor to St. John's while bringing to the Regiment at Norwich a *Recruit* determined to make the most of his opportunity and earn his commission as a Second Lieutenant in the United States Army.


C/LTC Lau received his letter of appointment to The United States Military Academy at West Point December 15, 2010. When Lau enters West Point as a *plebe*, he will be a mere seventeen years of age, likely to be among the youngest members of the brigade. With his appointment to West Point, Lau earns a fully funded four-year college education which requires him to serve in the US

Army for a minimum of five years. The St. John's staff expects Lau to bring honor to his legacy as a SJMS Cadet by upholding military traditions and excelling at all levels at West Point.

Upon graduation, each will choose a specialty area in which to serve. Both hope to serve together possibly in the Special Forces (infantry). Ritter says, "I await the day we can sit together and reminisce about our service and the many memories we created while serving together in the Army." Lau "is excited for the many adventures and challenges we will have together, with little sleep and plenty of P.T."

The elaborate ceremonial Saber was given in memory to Lt. Col. Aaron Young Hardy (U.S. Army-Ret) by George S. Bartley jr., Class of 1963, and his mother and grandmother during Commencement activities in 1963. We have no current address for Bartley but we did know that he served in the military during the Vietnam conflict.

Hardy, a Mormon, was a grandson of the famed Mormon leader Brigham Young. Hardy's mother was one of Young's 40 children.

It was unusual for Mormons to have active military careers. He had served in the Army Cavalry and I have his riding crop and stirrups.

Hardy came to SJMS in 1951. He had been associated with a military school in Colorado that had closed. He served as professor of military science, recruited boys for the School, coached the rifle team, acted as a substitute teacher and spent many hours counseling boys. His wife, Ann, worked at the school as English teacher.

Many Cadets credit her with their skills in English grammar and literature.

Hardy had heart disease and would go home after lunch each day for a nap. When he did not return as usual, Ann found him dead in



the "General's cottage" on the west side of the drive across from the house now known as the Commandant's quarters. But the Duckers family built the house and lived there for ten years.

Both of the Hardys were dear friends. They even drove to Atchison, KS, to attend our wedding reception. The night before placing the casket on the Portland Rose train at 5 a.m., Ann spent the night with us.

Keith took her to the depot trying to shield her from viewing the casket being loaded on the baggage car on a very cold December morning.

Another tribute to the late Colonel was the presentation of the Hardy Rifleman trophy by Cadet John E. Dawson, Class of 1961. The trophy is not given now but the Hardy Medal is given to the Rifle team member with the highest academic record according to the current coach Tony Blair. We believe Dawson lives in Wichita.

Mrs. Hardy returned to Salina to continue teaching for several years until she retired because of failing health. She was active in sponsoring the National Honor Society with meetings on Monday nights at her home. Donuts and hot chocolate were served. Cousins came to Salina to move her to Colorado after

Commencement in the late 1960s. I was left with the job of closing out the house of items she did not want.

The two left a legacy to the School that will not be forgotten. They were two people who loved the Cadets they taught and counseled.







"Our main characteristic that separates us from other teams is we do not have any parent mentors guiding us since we are a military boarding school. In fact, Team 3798 only has six adult mentors. With limited help, we cadets have learned to solve problems by ourselves through research and trial-anderror. We think this is an important characteristic because it has increased our problem -solving skills and has increased our knowledge of the First program."

The SJMS Ranger Team spent three days and two nights in Kansas City at regionals, competing against other robotics teams from five other states. The first day was spent testing and fine tuning "Old IronHyde," with the rest of the time spent on qualifying rounds and competition matches. Each of the competing teams were grouped into alliances giving the 'rookie' teams like St. John's a chance to contribute to the cause. Each match required that the robot pick up three tubes, red, white and blue and place those tubes on a stand of varying heights. In addition to completing the required task, the students controlling the robots were also trying to block out their competitors from accomplishing the mission. Watching the live feed broadcast during the competition, the SJMS family was able to witness the Ranger Team's successes and failures. After the last match of the day, Anna Robles reported "we were ranked 29th out of 56 teams which is not bad for a rookie team at all."

A LOVE FOR AVIATION ARGUED FOR AN ORGANIZATION TO PUT THEIR PLANES AND FLYING SKILLS TO USE IN DEFENSE OF THEIR COUNTRY. AS A RESULT, THE CIVIL AIR PATROL WAS BORN ONE WEEK PRIOR TO THE JAPANESE ATTACK ON PEARL HARBOR.

Fast forward to 2011 and the Civil Air Patrol continues to go strong. The Howard Williams Composite Squadron, based in Salina, has strong and continuing ties to St. John's. For many years, St. John's was a CAP school where the Cadets dressed in blue and CAP patches adorned their uniforms instead of the current Army Junior ROTC.

SFC Danny Phillips, a military advisor for Headquarters Company, is also known as Major Phillips, CAP, and commander of the local Squadron. Douglas Dutton, SJMS Chief Financial Officer, and SFC Thompson of Charlie Company are CAP Captains and Squadron pilots. SJMS Nurse, Cathy Mages, is a CAP Major and Deputy Commander. But more importantly, many of our St. John's Cadets are active CAP Cadets.

The Civil Air Patrol is recognized by Congress as the official auxiliary of the United States Air Force, and as such they wear Air Force style uniforms, maintain the Air Force rank structure, and practice Air Force customs and courtesies. CAP is tasked with three distinct missions: Emergency Services, Aerospace Education, and Cadet Programs.

Emergency Services is a wide reaching mission that includes

domestic search and rescue activities, both in the air and on the ground, disaster relief, counterdrug, homeland security, and drug demand reduction. They also fly a multitude of noncombat missions for the Air Force such as route surveys, training, and transportation.

Aerospace Education encompasses both internal and external tasks. The internal task consists of training the members in numerous areas relating to aerospace and emergency services. The external task includes providing information to schools and demonstrations and exhibits to the general public.

Cadet Programs are designed to foster leadership and good citizenship in our youth using aerospace education. Cadets participate in a variety of activities, earn rank, and learn to become better leaders. The best part of the cadet programs are the orientation flights, where the cadets get to spend time actually flying the airplane, and the encampments, where the cadets have the opportunity to attend nationwide air shows, learn to fly gliders, compete in computer security contests, and even obtain their pilot license.








