mobile units. He recruited, trained, and operated with the Montagnard Tribesman (pronounced Mountain Yard), mercenary soldiers employed by Special Forces. Scott participated in the first ever Special Forces combat parachute jump and was promoted to the rank of Staff Sergeant. Uncle Scott also served in the U.S. Army Special Forces Reserves and is a retired Major

in the New York Guard.

David J. Whitting, 3rd generation Paratrooper, enlisted in the U.S. Army in January, 1991, after the liberation of Kuwait. Dave attended the Special Forces Assessment and Selection Course (SFAS) in May of 1993. After successfully completing SFAS and two years of intensive medical and language training, he was awarded the Green Beret and assigned to 1st BN, 1st Special Forces Group, Airborne in Okinawa, Japan. Dave first served as a Medical Sergeant (18D) for Operational Detachment Alpha (ODA) 121 where he trained US and foreign counterparts in all phases of combat and Special Operations while providing emergency and long-term medical care of the Detachment, allied and indigenous personnel. While on ODA 121, he successfully completed Ranger School graduating with class 8-96. Shortly after completion of Ranger School, an

opportunity arose for more advanced training. After successful completion of the Special Forces Underwater Operations Combat Diver Qualification Course and the Dive Medical Technician (DMT) Course in Key West, Florida, Dave moved to ODA 125, a Combat Diver Team. Once there, he served as a Medical Sergeant and DMT while conducting Joint Special Operations in the Pacific Theater traveling and training in Guam, Indonesia, Thailand, and Australia. Dave was honorably discharged in January 1998. About one year after 9/11, he was asked to re-enlist by a friend to assist with a Civil Affairs Unit that would be deployed to Iraq. After re-enlistment and additional training, he became a Team Sergeant for a civil affairs team where he was attached to 3rd BN, 3rd Special Forces Group, Airborne and the 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team. Once in country, the team conducted civil military operations in and around both central and northern Iraq. Besides operating a civil affairs team, Dave also initiated a permanent aid-station in his base camp, providing 24-hour care for 75 US and indigenous personnel. After spending one year in country, Dave returned home to Glen Head, New York, where he and wife, Janine, raise their five children.

Luke Whitting, C/CSGM of the 126th Corps of Cadets, took the United States Army oath of service given by his Uncle Scott Whitting during the award ceremony on Friday, May 9, 2014. When Luke completes his initial training period, he will be the 4th generation paratrooper to serve in the United States Army from the Whitting family.

Luke's Great Uncle Donald John MacPhee was a member of the 505th Parachute Regiment, 82nd Airborne Division, PFC MacPhee was killed in action June 16, 1944, in Normandy, France.

Scott Whitting, 2nd generation Paratrooper, brother of Dave's father served as a Medical Specialist in the 10th Special Forces Group Airborne (Green Berets), Bad Tolz, West Germany, 1965 ~ 1966, following two years of training. Scott served as the Medical Supervisor with the "MIKE Force" (Mobil Strike Force), 5th Special Forces Group Airborne, Republic of Vietnam, 1967 ~ 1967. Following selection for duty with the "MIKE Force," all must volunteer or decline. This was a reaction force for Special Forces "A" Teams under siege and also conducted operation "OMEGA," a Special Operation formed to hunt and identify enemy units within highly

The Gordan Prize was first awarded in 1906. Those winning this prestigious award are among St. John's most distinguished alumni. The Gordon Prize is not awarded every year and is given to only one Cadet per year.

Fred Pate, the oldest surviving recipient, says of receiving

this award in 1942: "It was such an honor to have received the Gordon Prize in 1942 and having my name engraved on a marble slab. One great occasion for me was when Major Clem (also known as COL Remy Clem, rector and superintendant of SJMS from 1936-1968) wrote to me while I was in college at Syracuse University in New York state and told me my name had been inscribed on the marble slab. In truth, the greatest part in receiving the Gordon Prize was to see two Cadets whom I truly admired, Gene Penny and Alan Clem, follow me in subsequent years in winning the award. I feel very honored to have my name alongside such great Cadets and later great men."

Levi Harmon, Battalion Commander of the 126th Corps of Cadets, fulfilled every category of the Gordon Prize requirements. Levi served in every leadership position during his four years as a Cadet. He holds numerous Blue Beret certificates which belong to the top three grade point averages in the Corps during each grading period. Valedictorian of his class and a member of the National Honor Society, Levi sets the standard for excellence in academics. C/COL Harmon was a member of the SJMS soccer team, serving as team captain and earning all-league honors both his junior and senior seasons.

Levi is the brother of C/LTC Eli Harmon, the Executive Officer of the 126th Corps of Cadets. He is the son of Donna and Ed Harmon of Flagstaff, Arizona.


C/COL Harmon will be a 2014 member of The "Rat" Class at Virginia Military Institute and will take his oath of cadetship on September 7, 2014.





(For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) is a competition in every sense of the word. The





"The mission trip started out as an idea for the boys staying on campus to do something productive, and to have a learning experience they could take with them when they left the school.

I went on-line to find mission trips and found five that looked promising. *Praying Pelican Missions* (PPM) began over 20 years ago by uniting groups with local churches throughout the world. PPM seeks to build a bridge between community needs and organizations seeking to offer help and support. I put together a group of 14 cadets (mostly New Boys) and three adults. We traveled to Tucson, Arizona, where we took down a large tree, repaired playground equipment, cleaned up the playground, and sanded, refinished, and sealed over 23 church pews. We spread 12 tons of gravel around the parking lot and led a Vacation Bible School for the kids of the church.

During our free time, the Cadets spent time in the pool at the motel, while we 'older folks,' used the hot tub (which our bodies needed). We spent one day traveling to *Gates Pass* and did some exploring. On the way back to St. John's, we went to the *Grand Canyon* and to an Indian trading post. We spent ten days together, working hard and having some fun. I am truly grateful for this chance to connect with the boys on a level that is often difficult for a chaplain to accomplish.

I am extremely proud of the Cadets for their hard work and the way they represented SJMS.
