

### COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS



I just want to take a second and take in the "positive energy" from you today. I'm really not sure I ever thought I would be the commencement speaker at such a prestigious school or that I ever had enough insight or skill to uphold the

many speakers that have spoke before me.

I want to recognize the faculty and staff at St. John's.

I want to recognize the moms, dads, grandparents, brothers and sisters, aunts and uncles and all other family members for the agonizing decision that you made to send your son to school at St. John's! You did the right thing, you made the right choice.

I want to recognize and congratulate the cadets of the 120th corp. I salute each of you!

When you're asked to be a commencement speaker, you know there's a lot of pressure on you to perform. I consider today the greatest honor I've ever been asked to perform.

I thought my message today would be something we might have a common interest in. From a former old boy, to someone who has traveled the path of life the last 40 years. From someone whose entire thought process about life, relationships, family, making a difference, seeing the big picture and so on have changed since that rainy day in August in 1967 when I came to St. John's.

I was sitting in your chair 40 years ago and I can honestly say I know how you feel. The furthest thing from my mind was being the Commencement Speaker 40 years later! I would tell you today, that some day, one, or several of you will be asked to have this same honor that I received.

My story is not unlike many of you. I came from a good family, a loving family, parents that wanted the best for their kids.

But along the way, something happened to me. From concerns of a brain tumor in 7th grade, to missing an entire year of school because of migraine headaches, my parents made the decision to send me to St. John's.

No it was not easy for them to make that decision or to make it work financially. It didn't help that I didn't want to go. Counting the days until commencement, I could hardly wait to get on with the next stage of my life. After two years at school, my parents gave me the choice to go back to public schools. I jumped at the chance. Today though, I must tell you that in a lot of ways I regret that decision. In my heart, I wish I had graduated from St. John's.

I attended public schools, did OK in the classroom, attended Kansas State University and flunked out of school. Boy, was my dad happy with me. I painted houses for a year and kept telling my parents I would go back to school, knowing in my heart the motivation was not there.

One day, my mom made a statement to me that has forever been a part of me. I did go back to college and graduate with a degree in "Business and Finance". Yes, mom, your advice has been invaluable and I'm forever indebted!

I was fortunate 30 years ago to be hired at the place I always wanted to work. But, after six months, I quit. I kept saying to myself that nobody was noticing me. Nobody was getting how talented of a person I was. Nobody was getting what a difference I could make.

Why? Fortunately, someone did care about me and took the time to be a mentor to me, someone who saw something in me and said some things to me that made me realize I had to change. That was 30 years ago, and I'm still with the same organization!

My point in telling you this story, is to ask you to take the time to look around you. How many of us in the audience today, have been down this path, or maybe are on that path today? Sometimes the answers for our questions are right in front of us, yet we don't see them.

COL Keith Duckers, longtime President of St. Johns and a very close personal as well as family friend, took me under his wing. Keith took an interest in me as an eight grader and right up until the time he passed away in 2007. He helped me believe in myself, when I didn't.

Much like all of the faculty and teachers have taken an interest in you Remember though, at some point you must decide what path you want to take.

Early in my life I took the wrong path. One that was filled with self-pity, why is this happening to me questions, and one lined with no motivation or goals.

I would bet that some of you are on that path too.
What I realized one day and what you will realize
some day, is that you have to dig yourself out of that
type of thinking. Nobody will be there to take care of
your problems for you; you must take that responsibility
yourself. But boy, will you feel good about yourself
when you make that decision!

What I have realized in my life is that St. John's has been the infrastructure for most of my growth, especially after my formative years.

Its discipline, character, passion for people, religious influence, has been the very thing that I have relied on so many times. It took me years to realize what impact the two years I spent here had on me. It's taught me so many things that quite frankly, I may never have learned without this education.

St. John's taught me;

That attitude is everything. Be true to your friends and yourself and show compassion for others and the world will be at your fingertips.

To always surround myself with good people. People of character, people with vision, positive role models, friends that will be there in good times and bad.

To always establish goals. Whether you attain those goals or not is not the judge of success or failure. Your effort is.

To always be a great communicator. You must always share what you are feeling. This is something that I have to work on each and everyday.

To understand what real possibilities there are in my life and the lives of other people. See the good in everybody.

To understand people. There are not any of us that are alike. Those that have great success in life, and I'm not just talking about financially, are those that take the time to understand someone else's position and thoughts. The key to leadership to me is having the compassion to listen, and the wherewithal to create a common path for all to go down.

To constantly tell people when they are doing a good job. It will make a big difference in your relationships.

To never blame my failures on others.

To always accept the responsibility and move forward. Our greatest lessons most often come from our failures, not our successes.

To always listen to others. You just might be surprised what you learn.

To be a mentor for others. You owe that to yourself and to those who were there and helped you along the way. Embrace that responsibility, nurture the opportunity to make another human being grow. To talk about my family every chance I get and to tell those closest to me how much I love them and how much they mean to me and how proud I am of them!

I encourage all of you to enjoy the ride each and everyday, no matter what stage of your life you are in.

St. John's Military School has survived poverty, the depression, two world wars, existed during three centuries, the invention of electricity and the telephone, the invention of air transportation, the internet, high and low enrollments, a man on the moon, disagreements, financial strain and many other challenges. But through it all it has persevered and continued it's original mission of helping any of us who needed a "second chance".

We are all just like St. John's. We need good core values, mentoring from others, to learn from our mistakes, and the opportunity to make a difference.

I simply love St. John's. I love everything about it. Forty years ago, I wouldn't have said that. Today, I realize in my heart, what it did for me.

To my great friends Jack Vanier, Dale Browning, and Tim Soule, all "old boys" leaving their own legacies at this school that all of you are benefiting from today. If I can ever be anything close to what they are and what they represent, my life will be complete.

I challenge each and every one of you to not let any opportunity slip out of your grasp. Don't take the path of least resistance; it won't lead to where you want to go.

Challenge yourself, dig deep inside and draw on what you learned at St. John's. You have been taught the right path. Remember that success is measured in so many ways. It takes each and every one of us to create what you see here today.

I hope as each of you leaves the school, that you don't forget about what it has meant to you. I encourage all of you to stay in touch, to stay involved; to make sure that SJMS is here forever. You are the next generation that will assure the very existence of this school

In some ways I owe my life to this school. When you wake up someday and realize that the real difference we make in our lives and how we ultimately are judged, is the difference we make in the lives of others. It's really that simple!

I believe that the faculty and staff figured that out early on in their lives. How lucky each and every one of you are to be around that kind of influence!

In closing, I want to congratulate the seniors and wish them the very best in whatever career you decide to take.

To the rest of the corp, I wish you the very best next year as you create the 121st. corp's legacy!

May God Bless each of you, the United States of America and St. John's Military School!






The Wall of Fame inductees addressed the corps during the Academic and Military Awards ceremony. Their remarks were filled with sage advice and comical stories about their days as cadets.

Robert Miller attended St. John's from 1938 – 1947. He was awarded the Commandant's Medal in 1943 and 1946, and was the first cadet awarded a Major's rank.

After graduation, Robert attended Brown Mackie College and joined the Air Force. He worked for United Airlines as an aircraft inspector and Braniff Airlines as a technical representative. His early retirement years found him as a mediator in Hawaii and Washington State.

### Fred Pate Old Boy 1942

Fred Pate attended SJMS from 1939-1942 and was extremely proud when made Cadet Captain of The Corps. Fred was also the Crack Drill Squad Captain, football and Army Captain and Skirmisher Editor-in-Chief. Upon graduation he was awarded the Gordon Prize

Entered the US Marine Corps in 1943 and was shipped to the Pacific as a Turret Gunner in a TBM Torpedo Bomber. Flew off the Islands of Guam, Tinian and Ie Shima, also off the air field below Mt. Suribachi on Iwo Jima when secured by the Marines. Received the Air Medal while in Squadron 131 from Major General L.E. Woods, USMC, on Okinawa. Received a BS degree in Agriculture from California State University San Luis Obispo, CA. Fred worked the later part of his working years in real estate and was sales manager for The William Lyon Co. Fred has three daughters, one son, 12 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.





### Chairman of the Board SJMS



## Andy England

How did you come to be involved with the SJMS board?

I learned of St. John's through Bob Kastner. He was a family friend of my in-laws and knew of my attending military school. He discussed SJMS often and suggested that I get involved. My first involvement was in taking

some SJMS cadets to Kansas City for a VMI recruiting dinner. Peter Wilcox was a member of that first group and graduated from VMI a few years ago.

Who asked you to get involved?

As I mentioned, Bob Kastner had put the bug in my ear years earlier, but Don Lamb is the one that actually recruited me to be on the Board of Trustees.

How long have you been involved?

I came on the board in 2004.

How does serving on the board impact your life?

I know, first hand, the value of an all male military school education. Being involved in seeing that type of education perpetuated is very fulfilling. I believe that living in a community is not enough to call yourself a part of that community. By being involved at SJMS, I believe that I am enhancing the entire community of Salina. I am taking a personal stake in how our community is perceived and what our community produces; namely some fine high school graduates. SJMS provides a home for some boys, a place to get back on track for some, and a place to achieve higher goals for others. Watching the process of what SJMS can do for all young men is very personally

What is the history of Salina Building Systems?

Salina Building Systems was founded in 1969, by my father-inlaw A. Norman Yenkey. We have been a Buildership for Butler Manufacturing since our founding. Norm retired in 1998, and my partner and I purchased the firm. We are and always have been a General Contractor that specialized in pre-engineered metal building projects, however, we do a fair amount of conventional construction projects, project management, and maintenance services.

What types of projects is your company involved?

My company specializes in pre-engineered metal building projects in the manufacturing, warehousing, and industrial market. We have constructed buildings ranging from 1,200 to 130,000 square feet. The majority of our business is performed for repeat clients in the manufacturing industry in and around Salina, KS. We are currently involved in projects for the U.S. Army and Ft. Riley, KS, the Kansas National Guard in Salina, and local restaurants, dental clinics, manufacturers, and developers.

Describe your feelings about the current economy and how your company has adjusted (or not) to be viable in these turbulent economic times.

We have yet to see the turbulence that is being widely reported in the media. Salina is blessed to have a strong manufacturing base with markets overseas. Our current backlog of work and quote volume are higher today then they have ever been in my tenure here. We are certainly keeping a wary eye to the future, but are riding the wave of a boom in local manufacturing, military, and retail construction. As commodity prices escalate (mainly fuel and steel) we are taking every opportunity to purchase needed materials early.

Describe how being an alumni of VMI gives you more insight into the lives of SJMS current cadets.

Having lived in barracks and endured a system very similar to that of SJMS, I can empathize, and sometimes sympathize, with what the cadets are going through. As I attended the commencement activities for the 120th. I could see the bond of brotherhood between the boys. It brought back fond memories of my cadetship and the never ending bond that I share with my fellow cadets. My VMI experience provides me with insight into what programs and activities the boys need to have a fulfilling and successful cadetship.

Does being involved with the cadets, faculty and staff offer any challenges?

The challenge for me and the Board of Trustees is to ensure that the staff and faculty have every tool required to provide the programs necessary to successfully educate and develop these young men. We have to overcome the economic and logistical hurdles to ensure that we are providing these boys with a unique and challenging experience. As a board, it is easy to get caught up in the business aspects of SJMS. We must remain vigilant in business area, but remain focused on the Corp of Cadets. That can be a challenge. Being able to personally interact with the boys, faculty, and staff help me to remain focused on the Corp and overcome this challenge. Do you feel that you have an impact on what takes place on campus?

I would hope that in the few times I get to address the Corp, that a few things I say sink in and take root. By being on campus and available with an open ear or word of advice, I hope to instill a greater sense of involvement in the greater community of SJMS to all who are involved. People who feel they are a part of the SJMS team will go the extra mile to ensure that things are done right. If I can help to foster that sense of belonging, I will consider my Chairmanship a success.

What message would you like to send to the people who will be reading this Skirmisher?

The benefits of a SJMS education are not fully realized until you fully commit yourself to the process. A commitment to being a working part of something much larger than yourself, a sense of personal responsibility, and dedication to the process and the goals you hope to obtain makes all the difference in how a boy and his family perceive their results from a SJMS education. The "Old Boys" understand this full well. I would hope that the boys, parents of the boys, and anyone considering SJMS would come to embrace this thought.

The "Old Boys" are the life's blood of SJMS. As recruiters, supporters, and stewards of the school, they can do more to

perpetuate it than any one person on the

Board of Trustees, staff, or faculty. For those that have not taken the opportunity, rekindle your connections to your classmates, friends, and the school. For those currently involved, we appreciate you and celebrate your devotion to your alma mater.





## Leadership Camp

### START THE YEAR PREPARED



This year's leadership camp will focus on leadership training, teamwork, self-confidence, physical fitness, and adventure activities. The Military Department selected the attendees based on their leadership potential and ability to make a positive impact on the 121st Corps of Cadets. Cadets will attend leadership classes to enhance their individual leadership and to prepare them for future positions of increasing leadership and responsibility within the Corps of Cadets.

We will be holding the Drill Instructor, Squad Leader, Platoon Sergeant/First Sergeant, and Officer Candidate Schools. These classes are mandatory for certain promotions and help explain the art of leadership at the various levels. The cadets will then get to put their newly acquired knowledge to practical use in various environments.

We will promote teamwork and self-confidence through our adventure training. We will be taking the cadets to St. Francis for the high ropes course, Rock Springs for horseback riding, canoeing, and a leadership reaction course, plus conducting our own team building and leadership reaction courses on the St. John's campus. Our leaders will also be taught how to properly conduct physical fitness training for the 121st Corps of Cadets and complete a 10K road march.



### Jack Vanier 'Hall'



The 121st Corps of Cadets will be making new memories when they step on campus for the beginning of the 2008-2009 school year. The dark and dingy hall ways of Mize Hall will be silenced. Instead, Jack Vanier Hall with its high ceilings and brightly painted hallways will afford the cadets living quarters second to none. Jack Vanier provided the funding to build a barracks which will house cadets in high style for many years to come.

But along with the rooms where the cadets will study and sleep, there is a basement that will offer a place to rest, relax, entertain and build both body and mind. D. Dale Browning and Tim Soule stepped in to provide the funding to turn the bottom floor of Jack Vanier Hall into a recreation complex. Already in place are two theatres, each equipped with a flat panel TV screen, theatre seating and surround sound. Included in the recreation area are three new pool tables, three new pingpong tables, a snack bar, a 16 station video game room for Nintendo and X-Box games, a game room stocked with traditional board games and a quiet area for study and relaxation.

Soule and Browning have agreed to fund the building of a gym/weight room in the southwest portion of the basement. The room will be fitted with gym equipment purchased from Advanced Life Fitness Equipment. The weight machines are commercial grade and will include;

- 2 treadmills
- 2 elliptical machines
- 1 leg extension machine
- 1 seated leg curl machine
- 1 seated leg press
- 1 bi-cep curl machine
- 1 tri-cep extension machine

1 seated rowing machine

- 1 chest press machine
- 1 chest pull down machine
- 1 shoulder press machine
- 2 bench press stations
- 2 complete sets of dumbbells
- 3 weight lifting benches 2 heavy duty power racks

Each member of the 121st Corps of Cadets will receive training in the proper usage of the weight machines. This new gym/weight room

is scheduled to be ready for use during leadership camp. The equipment is scheduled to be installed the first week of August. The gym/weight room will be available for use by the P.E. classes and this area will be open during the weekends and during the hours the cadets have free time. Browning noted that cadets knowledgeable about the weight machines will be hired to train new cadets as they arrive on campus.

The combination of living space and recreational space provided by Jack Vanier, D. Dale Browning and Tim Soule, promises to make life as a cadet at St. John's the very best in the history of the school.






