
















WHAT A SCORE!

Those not familiar with what it means to score 998

out of a possible 1000 points during AFI cannot begin to grasp the feeling of accomplishment the cadets experience when the inspection is over and the score is posted on the internet for all to see. Battalion staff members and company commanders breathe a sigh of relief and reflect on the months leading up to the inspection as tough but very worth the effort. Even the newest "New Boy" shares in the celebration knowing that he too is a part of a great tradition at St. John's. For as long as anyone can remember, AFI adds up to the corps pulling together when the stakes are highest. AFI provides the corps a reason to come together in a common cause, a reason to build esprit de corps to a feverish pitch and a reason to celebrate the brotherhood that has

been building since the corps was formed back in the early stages of the school year!

One can argue that the corps never looks as good as they do on the day the inspectors arrive on campus. The cadets in leadership positions begin preparing for AFI many weeks prior to the event. The academic department contributes to the cause by giving up crucial classroom time the day before AFI for use in last minute preparations. The commandant and his military staff offer plenty of help with the preparation of the uniforms and the general appearance of the cadet corps. Judy Casstevens and Wanda Radke spend countless hours issuing the ribbons and special uniform items necessary for the in-ranks inspection. The maintenance crew prepares the grounds, the administration meets and greets the inspection team and even cadet parents from near and far keep track of the

preparations and wait anxiously for news of the score. AFI is truly a group effort!

St. John's has earned the title of Honor Unit with Distinction for many years by consistently earning the highest score in the brigade. Once again, this year, the cadets were rewarded for their efforts by

being authorized to procure and wear the gold star on their Alpha Uniform!



Notes from Liz!

A man walked into Colonel Keith G. Ducker's office and said he was opening a gas station and convenience store at the Ohio street and I-70 exit and inquired as to whether we had any group at St. John's that he could use for entertainment at the grand opening. Duckers told him about our Crack Squad, known now as the Drill team. (It will always be the "Crack" squad to me as one of the many definitions in the dictionary is "excelling in skill or achievement, superior first rate as crack marksman.") Duckers also said we had a drum and bugle corps.

On a windy afternoon, the drum corps and the Salina mayor were at the airport to welcome some Hollywood personalities. The ceremonies had been moved into the big hanger because of the weather. In came a small aircraft, the corps struck up a welcome and the mayor fumbled the key to the city. Three Beech Aircraft mechanics, working in the hanger, were startled by such a welcome! Meanwhile the plane with the celebrities was looking around the airport trying to find the welcoming event.

The next day Virginia Grey, an actress from the Betty Grable era, Mary Sue Sommers, a young starlet from Gilligan's Island TV show, and Myron Healy, an actor who played the bad guy in movie Westerns came to have lunch in Nichols Dining Hall with the Cadets. Healy gave a talk on the importance of practicing gun safety even when using blanks and fired off a few rounds right over my head. Soon a young Cadet came up to Duckers, pulled on his sleeve and said that was live ammunition in the gun. He explained that was not possible, you must be careful with blanks to which the young cadet replied "then why did this splinter fall into my cake." Members of the kitchen staff, came out saying a bullet had come into the room and rattled around in one of the big pans.

Someone took the holster and guns from Healy who turned white and said he had been sabotaged when he realized he had discharged real bullets from his gun. He could not recall the last time he had used his guns. We stayed in touch



with Healy and visited with him on a visit to California. He never did learn who had changed his blanks for live ammunition. The bullet holes stayed in the ceiling until Nichols Hall was demolished to make way for the Stevens Center.



SJMS Forever!

Excerpts from a letter written by an "Old Boy"!

E.B. Putnam, Class of 1922, Fresno, CA wrote: "I entered St. John's about 1920. I was an obnoxious brat, having had too much of everything too soon, and thought that I was something special. It did not take long at St. John's to prove that I was laboring under a misapprehension. Suffice it to say that my various endeavors earned me the dubious distinction of serving more hours extra duty than anyone in the Cadet Corps (267 hours in one semester.) I had to unload two carloads (80 tons) of coal before we could leave school the Christmas of 1921."

"One very interesting episode in St. John's history occurred in 1920. The Shriners made a trip to Portland and Seattle on a special train. While there they were presented with a cub bear which was named ISIS the name of the Salina Shrine Temple. After much trouble with Isis getting away and being a nuisance to care for, COL Ganssle was prevailed upon to accept the cub as a mascot. There were several old chicken houses and old cottonwood trees back of Vail Hall and Isis was quartered in one and chained to a tree. The Cadets would play and wrestle with him. However, about 1921 when Isis was two years old, he weighed about 175 pounds and his claws were about three inches long. He could not understand why the boys didn't want to wrestle anymore. If some stranger walked by unsuspecting, Isis would dash out and clobber him, playfully of course, but it got out of hand. Eventually poor Isis had to go to Topeka to the Zoo in Gage Park, I believe."

lifference in their lives. During his turn at the microphone, Jacob Wilcox-Haskett asked first year computer teacher, Deb







Jefferson Baker Class of 1986

Jefferson was a Second Lieutenant Platoon leader in Alpha Company when he graduated in 1986. He lettered in basketball and track and was instrumental in forming the first cross country team

for SJMS. After graduation, he joined the Army where he was honorably discharged in 1989. He graduated from Chadwick University with a Bachelors Degree in Criminal Justice and later from the Police Academy. As a police officer Jefferson gained his certification to teach the DARE program, which he presented to elementary and middle schools instructing youth on the skills necessary to stay away from drugs. Jefferson believes in community service as he is involved with Grand Junction Lions Club, youth basketball coach and serves on a variety of community boards. Joining the Colorado National Guard in 2006, his unit mobilized for pre-deployment training, Jefferson was injured during training thus ending his chances for the deployment. He started sending care packages to his unit in Iraq, many others joined him from around the country and it is estimated over 1000 packages were sent to Iraq. For this dedication he was awarded the Western Colorado Chapter of the American Red Cross, Military Hero Award for Heroic Acts in Support of Others. Statement to the Corps: "I know that St. John's taught me honor, respect, duty and how to be a responsible man. All the good things SJMS instills are passed down to cadets, who pass these values to so many others in life who may never see this school. So, indirectly, the SJMS family affects the world in so many positives ways that may never be known."

David was a very proud Marine, and was so proud to represent his country in the Gulf War. **Advice to the Corps**: *"With faith and courage there is nothing you cannot accomplish. Education and self discipline that you learn at SJMS is carried over to family and service to country."*

MAJ Mark Richards Class 1993




George Norton


