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

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

### **D.** Dale Browning

#### Giving his time... AND HIS TALENT

Many people have made a difference at St. John's Military School. One hundred and twenty years of existence has seen the emergence of men and women who not only offered their guidance and support but, were inspired to dedicate a portion of their lives to the education and training of young men.

A few have been both students and teachers at St. John's and then moved on to take their place in the outside world. D. Dale Browning is a shining example of that phenomenon. D. Dale came to St. John's after losing his mother to a cruel illness and being raised by his beloved older sister Wanda Faulkner while his father ran the family business. Browning was, by his own account, an 'ornery' young lad and the structure and discipline offered to cadets at St. John's was just what he needed. He blossomed at St. John's contributing to every facet of the military, sports and academic programs.

His name has long been associated with success at St. John's. His picture appears on the Wall of Fame as a distinguished Alumni. He was named an *Honorary Colonel* for "his internationally known banking innovations, his star presence on the basketball court by achieving the all-time scoring record at St. John's, his service to SJMS as a trustee and for his distinguished achievement in every turn of his life." In the hallway of the Vanier Academic Center a bronze plaque bears his name and likeness which lists the recipients of a full scholarship given annually in his name with funds established by the members of the Plus System Inc., following his retirement from his distinguished career in banking.

More than just a picture and a name, D. Dale has become a comrade, colleague and mentor to the members of the 120th Corps of Cadets and the faculty and staff lucky enough to be on campus during his tenure as Interim President. He has single handedly transformed the atmosphere both physically and emotionally at St. John's by infusing his spirit of gentle manliness and generosity to every corner of the campus.

Browning rises early and works with dogged determination throughout the day. Staff members scurry around completing tasks he has assigned during the many meetings he directs daily. He joins the Corps of Cadets for breakfast and lunch each day learning their names, lending a sympathetic ear, providing sage advice while maintaining mental notes of each of their many accomplishments and triumphs. Browning can be seen in the bleachers during home basketball games running late into the night even though he rises at 4:30 a.m. each day.

His other "job" as Chairman of the Board of Frontier Airlines periodically takes him away from campus. Handling the complex issues facing the airline industry provides Browning plenty of



challenges and still he is able to focus squarely on his mission at St. John's.

D. Dale has become a fixture on campus since moving into the position as Interim President. His life could be drastically different; he has homes in Golden, Colorado and Scottsdale, Arizona. He could be teeing off daily on the golf links in the warm sun of the American southwest and enjoying the finest cuisine; instead he chooses to make his home at the Salina Courtyard Marriott Hotel and dine among the young men of St. John's.

Under Browning's direction, the school has been reenergized with both cadets and staff walking a little taller and looking to the future with greater hope. He has directed the staff to make sure that the 2008 *Commencement Weekend* is a memorable one. He along with many others was extremely disappointed that the 2007 graduating class had to leave St. John's without the tradition and ceremony each class had experienced for the previous 119 years.

Excitement is building throughout the corps for the culmination of what has been up to this point a year to remember. D. Dale Browning must accept much of the credit for this, knowing that his contributions go far beyond dollars and cents. He is sensitive to the needs of everyone around him and takes great joy in giving. He has been a devoted and loving uncle, brother and son and enjoys a multitude of close friendships with both champions of industry and the most common of folks.

While we look forward to the presidential tenure of Larry Lysell to begin in June of 2008, those of us fortunate enough to have been working closely with Browning can't imagine St. John's without D. Dale. We can rest assured in the thought that D. ### Larry Britegam St. John's Memorabilia

When Larry Britegam read the recent Skirmisher article about the watercolors Paul Sommers has painted relating to St. John's, "the wheels began to turn."

Anyone acquainted with Larry Britegam knows of his genuine interest in and dedication to St. John's Military School. His own association with the school began when he joined the Corps of Cadets in 1967. Larry was at St. John's during his eighth and ninth grade year. But his involvement with the school did not stop there. Larry is currently serving his sixteenth year as a member of the Board of Trustees. Britegam has been Chairman of the Board twice and has served as Chairman of two major fund drives for the school.

One of his hobbies is collecting St. John's memorabilia. Leisure time often finds him surfing the Internet, searching for items to add to his collection, which has become quite extensive through the years.

Mr. Britegam is President of Sunflower Bank in Salina, with corporate offices in Salina. His pride in St. John's is evident there as well. Prominently displayed on a wall in his office is a beautiful reproduction of Vail Hall, painted by Dean Groves, a long-time friend and Board of Trustees member of St. John's Military School. Also displayed is a saber noting Larry as Honorary Battalion Commander of the 104th Corp, in 1991. The saber was presented to Larry by Colonel Keith Duckers, one of Larry's early mentors at SJMS and a very close family friend.

Impressed with local artist Paul Sommer's artistic talent and fond memories of St. John's cadets, faculty and staff, Larry commissioned Paul to paint an original watercolor of St. Barnabas Hospital.

St. Barnabas Hospital was constructed on the St. John's campus in 1909. It was Salina's first hospital building. It served as a hospital until 1922, when it became St. John's Junior School. The transformed facility included a lower school dormitory, classrooms and a dining hall. The building filled those needs until it was replaced by Mize Hall in 1965, a building Larry lived in for 2 years while he attend St. John's.

There remains one more reason, a rather personal one, for Larry to want a watercolor of that stately, old building. His Great Grandfather, Mr. Alfred Ritter, was the general contractor in charge of building St. Barnabas Hospital. Mr. Ritter, formerly of Kansas City and an engineer by trade and very successful building contractor in the Kansas City area, also was the general contractor for Salina's original YMCA, which served the Salina community well into the 1970's. Alfred Ritter also built a family home on South Santa Fe in



Salina, called the "Ritter House", that Larry's brother-in-law now lives in.

Mr. Ritter's parents migrated from Prussia in 1833 to the Georgetown area and eventually ended up in the Kansas City area where Alfred was born in Uniontown, KS in 1889. One of his son's, John Forest, Larry's Grandfather, made his way to Hays, met his future wife, eventually moved to Salina where he started Ritter Tile Company 95 years ago, now owned by Larry's uncle Charley and cousin Mike Ritter.

One other point of interest, Larry's great-grandfather Alfred, his grandfather John Forest and Larry were all born on the same day, February 15th! Larry's interest in his family's heritage in Kansas are linked to both sides of his family. The Britegam's were original settlers in Lincoln County Kansas, northwest of Salina and were original land grant owners in the 1870's!

With the completion of Britegam's commissioned work of St. Barnabas Hospital, he has another item of St. John's memorabilia to display in his office.

#### 2007.

Armstrong Chapel serves the corps as a place of meditation and prayer. The cadets come to worship each Sunday and twice during the week. Chapel Council, made up of cadets willing to be a part of the alter party, is responsible for making sure the

chapel is ready for each service.

Jessie Given believes that religion needs to be the centerpiece of the school. Her great-grandson Dan related that "the chapel has always had special meaning for his great-grandmother and the school has been an important part of their family for many years."

Jessie stays informed about St. John's through the phone calls she receives from



Skip Mac Alexander (former president of St. John's) and Jerry Bradley (former Commandant of Cadets).

Jessie remains active running her antique business while Dan pursues his Doctorate in Education at Auburn University.

The longevity of Armstrong Chapel will be assured through the generous gifts of Jessie Given and her great-grandson, Dan.

### The Buildings the legacy

Few campuses around the country can boast such a wonderful combination of beautiful buildings and well kept grounds as St. John's Military School. Each of the buildings is named for someone that has meant a great deal to the longevity and success of St. John's.

Mize Hall, home to countless young men since 1964 takes its name from the Right Reverend Robert H. Mize Episcopal Bishop of the Salina diocese and Superintendent of St. John's during the early part of the 20th century. His vision and leadership allowed the traditions of St. John's Military School to continue well past his tenure. Many times during his term as Bishop, Mize moved his young family onto the campus of St. John's to see to the daily needs of the school and to offer his vision for sustaining what the Right Reverend Elijah Smith founded in 1887. It was an easy choice to name the new barracks, destined to house the younger cadets at St. John's, after Bishop Mize as he had meant so much to the longevity of the school. His son, Father "Bob" Mize founded the St. Francis Boys Home a longstanding institution offering hope to countless young men in central Kansas since 1963. Both father and son offered salvation for boys needing guidance and a place to call home. St. John's is fortunate to have Mize Hall stand as a tribute to a family of men who have provided two generations of young men with hope.

Mize Hall will soon be retired as a barracks with a plan to remodel this grand old hall to serve in a new capacity. "Old Boys" calling Mize Hall home could tell countless stories of late night shenanigans and lasting friendships that were cultivated within the walls of Mize Hall. When the cadets pack for home at the end of the 2007-2008 school year Mize Hall will stand silent and an era will come to an end but the memories will linger in the minds of 6 many for a building that served it's purpose well and offered many a temporary place to call home.

The Vanier Academic Center, named after John J. and Lesta Vanier, grandparents of current board of trustee member Mary Vanier, and parents of "Old Boy" trustee and benefactor John "Jack" Vanier and his wife long time board of trustee member and St. John's benefactor Donna Vanier holds a revered place among the beautiful campus buildings. The Vanier Academic center continues today as a tribute to the commitment of the Vanier family to sustaining the mission of developing leaders one boy at a time.

Sage Hall and Clem Ferris, both barracks built during the 20<sup>th</sup> century were named after men who made a difference at St. John's. Their contributions came in the form of faithful service to a school that needed leadership. The close ties to the Episcopal Church have sustained the connection between church and school leaving the future open for young men to find their hidden potential.

Linger Hall takes it name from "Old Boy" Lymon G. Linger a successful Colorado Rancher committed to the longevity of the school he once called home. The late Keith G. Duckers, President Emeritus of St. John's, liked to call Linger Hall his flagship building and took great pride in the fact that this state of the art building was built during the last part of his presidency.

The Stevens Center was built to replace tried and worn Nichols Dining Hall under the watchful eye of former trustee and building contractor Charlie Stevens. Stevens spent many days on campus supervising every detail of the fantastic new facility planned to house a rifle range that would host state and national rifle meets a recreation center, a twelve bed infirmary, the duty office, new battalion staff quarters and a brightly lit dining facility. Opened in 2004, it stands as a beacon to the memory of the late Charlie Stevens. (cont. on pg 7)

## Lee Young SJMS BOARD OF TRUSTEE NAMED TO SALINA BUSINESS HALL OF FAME



Lee Young, a St. Johns Military School trustee since July 2001, joined the ranks of local business men inducted into the Salina Business Hall of Fame. Standing on the grounds next to the Stevens Center is the soon to be completed "Jack Vanier Hall." This new barracks is scheduled to be dedicated during commencement weekend on May 9, 2008 and will be open for tours following the dedication ceremony. The new structure will provide much more than just Spartan quarters for the cadets of the 121<sup>st</sup> corps. The building boasts high ceilings and wide corridors with more than ample space in each room. The military offices are placed for strategic monitoring of cadet activity and provide well appointed offices for the battalion and company leadership advisors that supervise the cadets after school hours.

The Vanier family is well entrenched in the past success of St. John's having given both monetary gifts and donations of time and talent. During the Duckers administration, Donna Vanier served as the first Development Officer helping to raise money for the school and both Jack and Donna served many terms on the board of trustees.

The newest building on campus "Jack Vanier Hall" serves as a beacon to the future The five-million dollar price tag well surpassed the initial commitment of Jack but the project was fully funded through each cost increase because of the fierce loyalty that the Vanier family has consistently shown towards St. John's and the young men it serves. Perhaps Jack's generosity can be measured through his extreme philanthropy but there must be a deeper meaning in the commitment that he has made to St. John's. He must have felt that special feeling that only a cadet can feel, the feeling of brotherhood and camaraderie that permeates each corps. He must possess a deep secret insight into what happens to a young boy as he grows into manhood. He must know that it is a very special journey, one that demands that each generation takes care of the next.



### State Assessments



Every year in April schools across the country spend a portion of each day measuring student knowledge and progress. The Bush Administration decided schools needed help to ensure that all American school children would receive an exemplary education.

"AYP," Adequate Yearly Progress mandated that by 2014, 100% of students will score proficient (Meets Standards) on state tests. The No Child Left Behind Law "NCLB," requires that we track our state test scores to meet Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP). Because state tests measure the academic levels of students in Math, Reading, Science, and Social Studies students in every state must be tested. "KSA," Kansas State Assessments are given to each student at St. John's in each grade level being tested.

Megan Rackley, SJMS math instructor developed a program to help the cadets understand testing, what it means to their future and what immediate rewards they can expect for doing well on assessments! Rackley attended a North Central Association

workshop about incentives and rewards meant to motivate students to perform well on tests. Rackley amended the program to fit our needs at St. John's.

The cadets will be challenged to do their best on the state assessments for the following reasons; their effort is representative of themselves and their school, their score will reflect what they have learned and there will be rewards for earning a high score.

The goal is to assure that by the time cadets are eligible to graduate, they will be proficienct in Math, Reading, Science, and Social Studies.

If the cadet meets the standards, exceeds the standards or scores exemplary he will receive a variety of rewards to be chosen from the following:

· Accelerated Promotions · Merits

· % Points to be used on your final grade

· Amnesty from 4 - Class III and Amnesty from 1

- Class II

· NO FINALS!!!!!!

· Extra RON to be used prior to next years test

· Exempt from ALL finals

· 1 year Movie Pass

· Tuition discount for the next school year

The cadets will be briefed on the reward system prior to taking this year's tests. It is hoped that each cadet will do his absolute best during the testing process and take full advantage of the incentives in place.




Every year when art students return from Christmas Break, one of their first tasks back is preparing artwork for upcoming art shows. The first one on the calendar is possibly one of the most impressive and important - the annual Scholastic Art Award competition, held in Wichita, Kansas at the Wichita Center of the Arts. This show is a regional exhibition which




covers a good portion of Kansas. Works first must be selected for the exhibition. which in itself is an impressive

accomplishment. This year about 293 of 1300 artworks were selected. These works are then eligible to receive Honorable Mention, Silver Key, or Gold Key Awards. The coveted Gold Key Awards gualifies the recipient for national competition. St. John's students usually submit 5 to 7 pieces and occasionally have a work of art selected for an award.

The winning cadets, teachers Mr. Wiedeman and Mrs. Stein, along with Tyler Raymer's parents, attended the Awards Ceremony on



Scuba training is available each semester. Training begins with some classroom time, as cadets meet once or twice a week with Mr. Scott Wiedeman, scuba sponsor. Coursework requires them to read the Open Water manual, complete the Knowledge Reviews for each chapter and view the training DVD.

With this portion of the training complete, a weekend trip to Wichita, Kansas, is planned where cadets continue the course under the direction of the Pro Ski and Scuba Dive Center. Once the cadets pass the final exam, it's on to the pool. Instruction is now focused on assembly, water entry and exits, and an intensive battery of skills that build proficiency and understanding of equipment operation and problem-solving tasks to establish a comfort level for their first scuba experience.

The final and most exciting portion of the training is completing their Open Water dives at Beaver Lake, Arkansas. Cadets depart after school on a Friday, and after a lengthy bus trip, arrive at Pro Ski & Scuba's lake house, for two days of intensive of training. Saturday morning starts with equipment and wet-suit fitting, proper weighting and buoyancy checks, and an orientation dive of the training cove, which features a sunken ski boat, the training platform, and frequent sightings of bass, carp, and catfish swimming amongst the submerged lawn ornaments. The rest of Saturday and Sunday morning is spent training underwater with the same skills the cadets performed at the pool. Boat rides and fun dives complete the Beaver Lake activities. The cadets return to Salina as Certified Open Water Divers! In the fall of 2007, divers Steven Crockenburg, James Pena, and Patrick Sullins earned their Basic Open Water certification.

The SJMS Divers Club also allows for continued involvement long after certification. As certified divers, cadets can participate on Beaver Lake trips as *Fun Divers* to dive and explore the lake at their leisure. Cadets can continue their training with Advanced Open Water certification. This is accomplished through a trip to Beaver Lake involving book study with the completion of five supervised "Adventure Dives." These dives provide divers with more specialized and extensive diving experience and skills. These may include Boat, Night, Underwater Navigation, Search and Recovery, or Underwater



Digital Photography Diving. With additional dives or training, divers can also earn Specialty certifications in these areas, as William Brooks did, earning his Dry Suit Diver specialty on the fall Beaver trip.

Following Advanced training, cadets may choose to pursue the Rescue Diving course, which includes Emergency First Responder training. Ultimately, with the completion of 5 dive specialties and 50 logged dives, a select few cadets have reached the top recreational rating of Master Scuba Diver.

Once a year, during either Christmas or Spring Break, Wiedeman takes some cadet divers to Cozumel, Mexico, to experience some of the world's best coral reef and aquatic life. The trip usually involves a six night stay at Casa del Mar Motel, with ten boat dives to Cozumel's best reefs, followed by unlimited shore diving and night diving. Making this year's Cozumel trip, during Christmas Break, were divers Josh Sibio, Patrick Sullins, and Brandon Holmes. Holmes completed his Advanced Open


three years reflects this. Right now the team is shooting scores higher than we have seen in the last three years, and this is with only one returning letterman on the team.





At the time of this article, this year's competitive season is still in its infancy, and yet; several of the boys are starting to put




together a collection of medals. Gamito was the overall match winner during this summer's Kansas State Rifle Association's Junior Shooting Camp at





Emmaly Reed, a death camp survivor, living in Salina, Kansas, came to St. John's on February 12 to speak about her experiences. Reed spoke about her struggle to survive the horrors of the Nazi regime. She was extremely soft spoken, yet you could hear every word she uttered. Cadets and faculty members asked Reed pointed questions about this terrible time in her life. Reed related that she had been taken to a concentration camp at age 3 and kept at various camps until she was 15 years old.

While there was sadness in her voice and evidence of a difficult journey Emmaly showed no outward signs of bitterness.

Emmaly credits Christian missionaries for her survival and was finally liberated by the French army before the end of the war.
