


A Message From Col. Jack Fox, New SJMS President



A View of the Episcopalian Church

People often ask, "What does Evening Prayer. the Episcopal Church believe?" In a 'nutshell,' of course, the answer is that given by Archbishop of Canterbury Geoffrey Fisher when he was asked that same question. His response was:

"We have no doctrine of our own . . . we only possess the catholic doctrine of the catholic church enshrined in the catholic creeds. We stand firm on that rock."

We believe and teach that worship of Almighty God is absolutely central. And worship, at its best we believe, should cultivate in us a sense of awe, mystery and glory. Thus Episcopalians hold a 'high' view of Almighty God, the Holy and blessed Trinity, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We believe that our public worship services should express that 'high' view, and that our worship services should reflect what we believe about God. Thus our liturgy expresses our theology.

We believe that the very centerpiece of our spirituality is worship; The Holy Eucharist and the Daily Offices of Morning and

We hold a 'high' view of Creation. We believe that the world is sacramental, abounding in signs of God's goodness and glory.

We hold a 'high' view of the Incarnation of Jesus, The Christ, the only Son of Almighty God. We believe that our salvation began when the Word, of God, Jesus, took human flesh in the womb of His blessed mother, Mary the Virgin.

We hold a 'high' view of Holy Scripture as the living Word of God. Between the Daily Offices of Morning and Evening Prayer and the Lord's Day Eucharist, the entire Bible is read in public worship services yearly.

We hold a 'high' view of the Sacraments, believing that all life is sacramental and that Jesus Christ communicates His life, presence and grace through the Sacraments

We bear witness to a 'high' view of the Communion of Saints and Mary, the Mother of our Lord. We believe that we are encouraged by their example of obedience and service, aided by their prayers, and strengthened by

their fellowship. We view the church as consisting of all Christians who ever lived and were believers; the church militant (those who are living and witnessing to the living Christ now in this life), the church expectant (those who once lived and were believers, and are now in the 'nearer presence of our Lord;, who we pray continue to grow in the knowledge and love of God, but whom we see no more), and the church triumphant (those who even now dwell in the very presence of Almighty God Himself), including Jesus who dwells at the right hand of the Father, and others whom Scripture assures us were assumed directly to heaven.

And finally we hold a 'high' view of Holy Orders of Bishops, Priests, and Deacons, the threefold ministry in Apostolic succession, thus assuring our full participation in the plenitude of the One Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church.

It is my hope that this will give you a better view of the work of the Church, and the Diocese of Western Kansas in its ministry to those we serve.

In addition to the college entrance exams, St. John's offers all cadets the opportunity to take the Armed Service Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB.) The ASVAB and the ASVAB Career Exploration Program can help students learn more about themselves and the type of work they might enjoy.



Do You Have What it Takes?

What is AMS? Advanced Military Skills is a class and club made up of an elite squad of cadets who are given the opportunity to better themselves through leadership exercises and physical training. For those cadets who are qualified, AMS is not just a uniform, it is a door that opens to a world of possibilities either civilian or military.

AMS is not something you can just sign up for - it must be earned. Cadets who tryout for a spot on the AMS team must take part in the AMS challenge and pass all physical and mental aspects of the test. From the wake up call at 0345 until 0630, the candidates will go through some of the most rigorous physical training that St. John's has to offer. The challenge itself is focused on teamwork.

Behind the challenge is the AMS instructor, Captain Mark Bucholtz and his AMS team. Their job during the challenge is to push the candidates to go beyond their best, while ensuring a safe environment. From the push ups to performing the Army crawls, the cold wet cadets must endure the 47 degree weather, while keeping their wits about them. Was it mentioned

Not everyone can make it through the challenge. Out of 18 candidates, only 9 passed. 


