Salary advancement for teachers



HE COMPANIES ARE FORMED and the opening bell hath rung on the 2006-2007 school year, an exciting but anxious time for cadets and staff alike. New teachers nervously prepare for first lessons while veteran teachers mentor and add new life to classroom walls. Some exciting changes are coming with the new year. A new accreditation cycle, student tutors, applied help in the reading and math curriculum and a number of new faces in the academic sector.

Closing out the year last year we were given an unblemished accreditation score for school improvement and our elevated test scores in both reading and math. This year begins a new five-year accreditation cycle and some new ideas to enhance a curriculum already tailor made for student success.

Cadets this year will be able to seek tutoring help in our library during evening study hall. A faculty member with student tutors will be available three nights a week to assist students during evening hours. Teachers will also be available at tutorials which have been moved to the morning to better aide students prior to classes. This is an attempt to give students ample opportunity to seek the help they need on any given subject. Tutorials can be teacher requested or student directed. If a teacher requests, the student must attend the tutorial session. If the student needs assistance.

the teachers are available even if they have not requested that student.

New to the curriculum this year is an Honors English for juniors. Students must meet a minimum GPA and have a recommendation from their former instructor to be scheduled in this class. We will continue to offer more Honors classes in the future with the goal of making them concurrent college credit through Kansas State University.

Also new to the curriculum will be reading for grades 7, 8, 9 and 11. These are the grades that are tested on the Kansas Assessments. All 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders are required to take reading. Ninth and eleventh graders who did not meet a cut-off score to be proficient on past reading exams will be scheduled in these classes. We have done this in previous years in our math department and the outcome has been successful.

# Construction & Renovation



**Tom Pestinger** "I grew up at 1411 North 5th Street in Salina. The site for the new sports complex was where my family grew and sold peonies each Memorial Day. My brothers, sister and I weeded the large garden that my family grew on that ground. It was a great place to work and grow up. My hope for that ground is that the boys at St. John's Military School will work, grow, play and love the lessons they learn there as much as I do."













### **New Barracks**

The new barracks being constructed at St. John's will increase our student capacity by 20 cadets. This will ensure a positive future for our school. Funds are needed to endow the continued maintenance of this new asset.

### Athletic & Football Fields

With construction of the new barracks, we have temporarily moved the football field to the location of our soccer field. Through the generous assistance of Tom Pestinger and existing funds that were designated for land purchase, we have added three acres to the present athletic fields and now must build a new permanent football field and construct other athletic fields. One key project that we want to provide for will be an eight-lane running track around the new football field. This will permit the introduction of track and field into our athletic program.

### Vanier Academic Center

The basement of the Vanier Academic Center is under renovation and will consist of 5 new state-of-the-art classrooms.

### Renovation of Mize Hall

Mize Hall will be renovated to hold a new Quartermaster, Boy Scout Activity Center, Recreation Center and Alumni/Old Boy Center.

### Renovation of Linger Hall

Linger Hall will become the Administrative Center for SJMS and will house the Chief Financial Officer and staff, Admissions staff and the SJMS President.

### Physical Plant Building

Currently, the physical plant is housed in the building on the northeast corner of campus. A new building to house the physical plant needs to be constructed north of the present building and the existing building will become the Visual Arts Center.

### **Obstacle & Low Ropes Course**

These facilities need to be constructed to enhance our present cadet leadership programs.

# A Family Th

thread that was woven through the passage of time continues today with the announcement that Mary Vanier joins the St. John's Military School Board of Trustees.

Like a quilt gently crafted from treasured pieces of fabric, the Vanier family name is woven through almost a century of St. John's Military School history creating a stunning legacy of both financial support and fierce loyalty.

From the early years of the 20<sup>th</sup> century when local businessman and philanthropist John J. Vanier and his wife, Lesta, became "friends" of the school, St. John's Military School has benefited greatly. First, during the Rev. Col. R. L. Clem administration when the need for a new dining facility became apparent, J.J. Vanier sat listening to a discussion of how the money could be raised to build the much needed dining facility. Elizabeth Duckers, first lady emeritus of St. John's, tells the story: "As suggestions surfaced around the

table in the board room regarding getting 'the money from a foundation, or a wealthy philanthropist in New York,' John Vanier interrupted with the declaration that the money would be raised in that very room right then, right now. He began by asking each in attendance how much he would give. In just thirty minutes, the entire cost of the building (\$45,000) had been raised."

Following the tragic fire of 1979 that destroyed Vail Hall, J.J. and Lesta Vanier placed their full support behind the building of a new state-of-the-art academic building. Granddaughter of J.J. and Lesta Vanier, Mary Vanier, when asked about her fondest memory of St. John's, tells about representing the thirteen Vanier grandchildren, by presenting a portrait of her grandparents, J.J. and Lesta Vanier, to Col. Keith G. Duckers, President, during the dedication of the Vanier Academic Center. Even the most casual visitor to the St. John's campus is keenly aware of the Vanier family name as the portrait graces the wall just inside the front entrance of the building.

John J. and Lesta Vanier decided that St. John's was just the place to bring a touch of discipline into the lives of their rambunctious young sons, Jack and Jerry, who had been growing up footloose and fancy free at the CK Ranch in Ellsworth County, Kansas. From those early days as a young cadet, Jack began a journey that has yet to reach its end.

Jack Vanier, SJMS "Old Boy," served on the board of trustees for many years. The day Vail Hall was destroyed, President Duckers called trustee Jack Vanier, who was in Kansas City at the time, to inform him of the tragedy. When Jack returned to Salina and visited the site where his former school building lay in ruins, he had the foresight to survey the site for mementos. Among the ashes, Jack spotted the front door handle and rescued it. Jack's saving the handle of Vail Hall has provided a treasured tradition – the handle

school year attended dances with the dapper young cadets of St. John's, unaware of the impact St. John's would have on her own life. Donna Vanier shared her husband's passion for St. John's. Liz Duckers describes Donna as having been "a one person alter guild for Armstrong Chapel," providing fresh cut flowers and clean linens for weekly chapel services. Keith Duckers hired Donna to head the development office and chair the St. John's Military School Foundation. Donna also served as a trustee from 1993-2004. From her daily involvement with the school, Donna came to understand that St. John's was a special place. Donna feels that "St. John's is a marvelous educational institution closely linked to a young man's moral and spiritual growth." Donna also feels that "the place grows on you because of the cadet stories, both the failures and the many successes."

So now, it is Mary Vanier who will carry the torch

and continue to weave the thread started so long ago by her grandfather John. Mary believes that the school's long history and connection with the Episcopal Church is one reason the Vanier family has continued their support. When asked about her earliest memory of St. John's, she mentioned the movie "Up the Academy" filmed on the campus of St. John's. Anyone connected with St. John's in the late 1970's remembers the stir created on campus by the Warner Brothers movie stars and film crew. For the cadets

ceremony - for each commencement ceremony since that day. To ensure that the thread continues, each graduate of St. John's touches the handle as it is passed around a circle formed by graduates and "Old Boys."

Jack married Donna Lindsey fifty years ago; Keith and Liz Duckers wed the next year. Already acquainted through their membership in the Episcopal Church and their mutual interest in Kansas State Athletic programs, the friendship that developed between the Vanier family and Keith and Liz Duckers helped cement the close connection with St. John's. Both couples shared a rich and lively social life that revolved around family and St. John's. Their families grew with the arrival of children, John, Marty and Mary Vanier and Ed, Kyle and Sarah Duckers. Both families shared common ground with their service to St. John's and their belief in the importance of family as the center of their lives.

As a young girl, Donna Vanier attended an Episcopal Church camp on the campus of St. John's and during the of the 92<sup>nd</sup> Corps, it was just one of many events that shaped their school year. As Mary Vanier grows to understand her role as trustee and begins to develop a vision for the future of St. John's, we look forward to her contributions and the continuance of the Vanier family thread.

HE SJMS CAMPUS once again was alive with the sound of cadets running around getting into uniform and putting away those comfortable "civies". 
Led by the Battalion Commander, Cadet/Ltc. Samy Wahabrebi, the leaders quickly changed into their uniforms to take on the challenge of leading the 119th Corps. For eleven days, the Cadets went through a series of instruction on developing their leadership skills. Classes on leadership styles, counseling and motivational techniques, and drill and ceremony filled the formal instruction part of the training. The younger leaders were exposed to a demanding series of instruction presented by 1sg. Tony Blair from the JROTC Department. This course of instruction, "Squad Leader School", was aimed at preparing young leaders to learn skills which will enable them to teach basic skills at the lowest unit level. The last four days of leadership camp were devoted to team building The low and high ropes complex at St. Francis was the first site for an intense exercise on team building as well as confidence building. It was frightening, yet inspiring, to see these young boys scaling up and down ladders and high wires that looked like they were hundreds of feet up in the air. The following day cadets traveled to Ft. Riley and went through an obstacle course, combat simulators and an interesting tour of the Ft. Riley Museum. They had an opportunity to enjoy a meal of "good old Army chow" and totally amazed the Army cooks as the cadets devoured hundreds of hamburgers and hotdogs.



## Keepsakes

ne of my prized possessions frayed and stained silk flag. Not the Stars and Stripes we are used to, but one that is half red and half blue with a lopsided gold star in the middle. It is a Viet Cong flag taken in battle forty years ago by one of the great men I have known. It has been one of my prized possessions for over 30 years.

While St. John's may be one of the best kept secrets in education, to those who know the school, it is certainly no secret that some very remarkable men have worked there molding young men. I was very fortunate to attend from 1971 to 1974 during the tenure of Commandant Lt. Col. Paul Kellogg, who put together a "Dream Team" of TAC Officers. This August group of senior NCO's included 1SG Bill Bunting, AUS (Ret.); MSG Dwight Woodall, USAF (Ret.); 1SG Richard Lipps, USAF (Ret.); and 1SG Benjamin C. Titus, AUS, (Ret.). Each of these men was combat veterans and perfectly suited to St. John's. Each of these men was very special in my life and each

contributed making me what I am today. This focused. however, on one particular individual. Ben Titus.

fought in Europe in WWII, followed by a combat tour in Korea and two combat tours in Vietnam. He never really spoke of his combat experiences, but would relate stories that were usually very funny and often with a lesson for this young cadet. Physically, he was short in stature, very compact and muscular. There hadn't been any hair

under his green bus driver-style hat in many years and he peered at you through black rimmed glasses. voice was gravelly and loud and he often had a cigarette gripped in his teeth rather than his lips. He was very high energy and usually in motion. He also was blessed with a terrific sense of humor. Sarge was 60 years old when I knew him and even then he could grip a broomstick with both hands and jump over it without letting go of the stick. and then reverse the process. also had another feat that still amazes me. He would ask me for a dime, then squeeze it very hard for a moment, and throw it on a table top. The dime would rock back and forth after being bent slightly by his fingers.

I learned a great deal from 1SG Titus and the other TAC officers, much of which boiled down to personal integrity. Things such as: take care of your troops; overcome the obstacles and get the job done; face your battles head on; tell the truth. Simple stuff really, but valuable beyond measure.

Just before I graduated in 1974, Sarge had me over to his home for a fine supper prepared by his wife, Ethel. After dinner, Sarge gave me that stained and tattered old flag. He didn't say a lot about how he came to have it except that the original owner did not survive the transaction. I could tell that it was important to him and it became very important to me, and has been

one of my treasured "keepsakes" over all of these years.

I am sure that every cadet, no matter what era they come from, has their "Sarge." One of the core strengths of St. John's is bringing great men such as these into the lives of young cadets to teach them the important things they need to know. And while succeeding generations of cadets will never know him personally, the legacy lives on through the current and future generations of outstanding staff that have devoted themselves to our school and the cadets.

The flag is now framed and hanging in Vanier Hall to hopefully inspire both staff and cadets and share some of the history of one of the important contributors to St. John's Military School. I did take the opportunity to talk to Sarge and thank him for all he had done for me some twenty years after I graduated. One of his favorite hobbies was fishing and on September 19, 2000, 1SG Benjamin C. Titus quietly passed away after cleaning a stringer of fish he had just caught.


