Each year the General Douglas MacArthur Foundation presents the award to the outstanding Cadets of the Association of Military Colleges and Schools. The objective is to encourage the students of the member institutions to emulate and practice the qualities exemplified by MacArthur as a Cadet at Texas Military Institute, San Antonio, and

the U.S. Military Academy, West Point.



The criterion for the award is the most soldierly performance by a senior class cadet considering academics, athletics and leadership. Mulder, a third year student from Pine, Colorado, is the Battalion Commander of the 113th Corps.

The speaker and reviewing officer was LTC Brick T. Miller, Battalion Commander, 2nd Battalion 70th Armor, at Ft. Riley, Kansas. Special guests included Mulder's mother, Roni Reynolds and his grandmother, Dot Alexander.

2nd Semester opens with 28 new cadets

Twenty-eight new boys joined the Corps on January 7 and 8 starting the second semester with 182 cadets. Of the new boys, seven came from Colorado, six from Kansas, and three from both Texas and Oklahoma. Other states represented were Missouri, Alabama, Wyoming, Louisiana, Iowa, Washington and Hawaii.

Officers Candidate School ASVAB Testing Offered

Class of 2001

Officers Candidate School began at 1900 hours on Monday, the 15th of January, and ended on Sunday, the 21st of January. Nine candidates were selected for attendance, based on their present grade in school, a recommendation from the Senior Military Advisor and the Cadet Battalion Commander, their academic standing within the Corps of Cadets, and finally, the leadership ability they had demonstrated over the first half of the school year.

Those young men selected to attend were SGT Michael Evan Brown, SSG Alejandro Campomanes, SFC Richard Michael Derby, SSG Nicholas Kareem Dockery, SGT Brendon Joel Harris, SGT James Lorne Klock, SSG Mack Garrison Redd, MSG Rex Michael Robichaux, and SGT Benjamin Thomas Walker.

These young men received instruction in the principles and traits of leadership, lessons in military ethics, the role of the officer and noncommissioned officer, and saber drill. They then were given an examination consisting of fifty multiple choice and essay type questions, and had to demonstrate proficiency with the saber in a session with the Cadet Battalion Commander. All passed each phase of the examination and were promoted in an appropriate ceremony to 2LT in front of the assembled corps of Cadets, with Captain McAlexander and some of the parents in attendance. All were then assigned to officer positions throughout the Corps of Cadets.

On January 18, 2001 nearly all sophomore cadets took the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) in Stevens Center on the St. John's campus. The ASVAB is a multiaptitude test battery consisting of ten short individual tests. Subjects cover Word Knowledge, Paragraph Comprehension, Arithmetic Reasoning, Mathematics Knowledge, General Science, Auto and Shop Information, Numerical Operations, and Coding Speed.

Composite scores are also included and are the results of several individual tests combined to yield three academic scores: Verbal, Math, and Academic Ability.

St. John's representatives made the decision to offer the ASVAB for several important reasons: for Career Planning and Exploration, for those interested in the Armed Forces, and as one of many ways we measure how what our students know compared to the levels of knowledge of other students in other schools.

The ASVAB is one way to measure how well students have developed in their academic and occupational abilities at school, at home, and in the community. The ASVAB also measures capabilities test takers have developed so far that indicates their readiness to become proficient in a certain type of activity, when given the opportunity. Scores reflect aptitudes that are related to success in different jobs.

Some cadets are interested in pursuing military careers after they graduate from St. John's. ASVAB scores are used for military enlistment. Juniors and seniors may use their scores for up to two years after they complete the ASVAB. (A few juniors and seniors requested to take the ASVAB.) However, sophomores can not use ASVAB scores for enlistment. If any of this year's sophomores do choose to enlist in the military, they should have an advantage having previously taken the ASVAB. They will know what to expect.

Generally St. John's cadets scored very well on the ASVAB. Median Percentile Scores in all areas were above average. Percentile scores show how well test takers do in relation to others. ASVAB scores are compared to a national sample of students. Some of the best median percentile scores for St. John's cadets include the following: Word Knowledge, 81.00; Coding Speed, 78.00; General Science, 77.00; Verbal Ability, 76.50; Numerical Operations, 73.50; and Mechanical Comprehension, 73.00.

Rifle Team

The weekend of January 28-29 offered Kansas juniors an opportunity to fire 240 shots for record in three matches held during the same weekend. In addition to the USAS SJORC, they could participate in the NRA Open (120 rd.) and Junior (60 rd.) and Smallbore Rifle Sectional matches.

NRA Indoor 3-Position Smallbore Junior & Open Sectionals The 2001 NRA Junior and Open 3-Position indoor smallbore rifle sectional matches were held on the SJMS campus. Even though the weather was generally disagreeable for travel, sixteen open shooters and 15 junior shooters took part in the weekend-long

matches. Of the sixteen shooters present, eleven shot scores above 1000 for the match which speaks well for the state of smallbore position shooting in Kansas

The junior match saw very stiff competition

between several very good up-andcoming shooters. George Norton won the JROTC category with a 517-9X score. The cadet JROTC Team also competed scoring a total of 1854-25X. The team was com-






