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

On April 11th I had the good fortune of being invited by Mr. Sven Hestrand and a group of his Advanced Military Skills cadets, to tag along with them on a trip to Las Cruces, New Mexico where

they were to take part in "The Bataan Death March." This march, designed to commemorate the actual event, began at White Sands Missile Range, and wound 26.2 miles through some extremely inhospitable desert terrain. Dominated by a steep, winding, rocky trail, and interspersed with occasional lengthy stretches of deep sand, the march route wandered across the high desert, attaining an elevation of some five thousand feet at the halfway point. The sun was relentless, the heat was blistering, and the guys experienced both the physical problems encountered when walking more than twenty-six miles in such terrain, and the constant battle to keep from falling victim to some sort of heat injury.

Approximately four thousand marchers participated in this event, coming from all over the USA and a couple of foreign countries as well. There were teams from the 82nd Airborne Division, the "Big Red One," The United States Air Force, The U. S. Marines, some German, Canadian and Dutch Military teams, and teams from The United States Army as far away as the Republic of Korea. There were also hundreds of individual marchers, who came not only for the competition, but simply to prove to themselves that they had what it takes to complete this most grueling of marches.

The St. John's contingent consisted of seven junior and senior cadets, who agreed to march the course in the "military heavy" category, meaning that they had to carry a pack that weighed somewhere in the neighborhood of forty pounds, over the entire 26.2 mile length of the course. The St. John's cadets were the only high school ROTC class that chose to participate in the military heavy category, and I can tell you that I was very impressed with the grit, determination, and "staying power" of our guys. Six of them finished the march and the one who did not finish, walked 22 miles, became severely dehydrated, and was given fluids intravenously at the 22 mile marker. (cont. page 5)

The website is bringing in a tremendous number of inquiries each day.

We have set in place a Summer program for the first time. That initiative is well under way. The Admissions Office and Business Office have established new pay options for tuition and fees. We have established a new Retention Team Concept that provides incentives for all employees to provide meaningful ways to mentor and counsel our boys and encourage them to return to SJMS.

Our Board of Trustees has been diligently working through a very effective committee system that brings a very active posture to our meetings. A number of significant efforts are underway. We have been authorized to pursue property purchase for the purpose of developing a camp for our boys. We have engaged the services of the Hartsook Companies, Inc. to lay out the plans for a capital campaign that would benefit every phase and constituency of the school. Our enrollment efforts and our marketing undertakings have been analyzed and assessed. I can say with confidence that we are looking at every part of our program to make it the very best it can be. These next 150 days will be critical to all of us as we develop the programs, recruit the cadets, and retain the corps that will become the 115th for St. John's Military School.

Let me share some goals that I have for this school during the next 6 months:

- Establish horseback riding program for cadets.
- Create cafeteria style dining in Stevens Mess Hall
- Develop Middle school AMS program.
- Develop Middle school leadership training program (continued on page 18)

He played football, baseball and was captain of the basketball team in his senior year. Also in his senior year, he served as a member of the Chapel Club and was Commander of "B" Company.

After graduating from St. John's, Mr. Browning attended Kansas Wesleyan University, majoring in psychology and history. He received his degree in 1959. While going to college, Mr. Browning worked at St. John's as a counselor and resided on campus. Upon graduation from college, he continued to work at St. John's for four more years as an instructor. He also served as an Assistant Commandant and basketball coach. He left St. John's in 1964.

After leaving St. John's, Mr. Browning enrolled in graduate school at the University of Chicago and was also accepted on the Executive Training Program for Continental Illinois Bank in Chicago, Illinois. (continued on page 10)

ANOTHER SUCCESS!



Terry Cupps was his "usual strong-to-the-end self," remembers friend and classmate Bill Meidell. The reason he put it that way was because of Terry's approach to life. There were no such thing as barriers. When he was in kindergarten he contracted polio

and was told he would not be able to perform like other kids. "Let me tell you, in brevity, how wrong they were. Not only did he walk and run, he played football, joined the paratroopers after graduation from St. John's (over 200 jumps), and then became a Kansas Highway Patrolman," said Meidell. Meidell continued, "Terry Cupps' funeral was a sad but uplifting experience and only led credence to the old adage, 'Life's Short.' He was one hell of a guy."


Bringing Home the Medals

State of Kansas Scholarship Contest produces 14 medals for SJMS

For the first time in St. John's Military School history, cadets participated in the State of Kansas Scholarship Contest during the month of February. The contest is sponsored by the Office of Assessment and Educational Measurements of Emporia State University. A total of 238 schools participated in the eightieth annual competition with 8,633 students participating in 21,084 subject entries.

Eleven middle school students and thirty-seven high school students participated for St. John's. Cadets competed at three levels: the state level, class level with 2A and 3A schools, and at the league level.





their Outstanding Performance During AF

Formal Dress Mess Honors the Cadets for





Here's a toast to the 114th Corps of Cadets! As part of the first Dress Mess, the Corps was treated to a sumptuous buffet dinner and entertainment by Richard Holmgren. Following dinner, the Kansas Scholarship Awards were presented. At the evening's conclusion, President Albert led the Corps in a toast to the Commander in Chief, the Armed Forces, the ladies and the cadets.

999 Revisited!

The 114th Corps of Cadets under the dedicated and caring leadership of its Battalion Commander Peter Wilcox maintained the tradition of military excellence at St. John's by earning a score of 999 out of 1,000 on the Annual Formal Inspection (AFI) held on May 2, 2002. The Muleskinner Battalion has earned an average score of 996 over the previous five years. All of the hard work put into preparing for the inspection each year has paid off as the cadets have earned the reputation as being the premier Army JROTC within the 4th ROTC Region's 2nd Brigade. The Brigade is based out of Ft. Carson, Colorado and includes the states of Colorado, Wyoming, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, and Minnesota, with over 300 high school JROTC programs. The cadets have had the highest AFI score in the Buffalo Brigade for six straight years.

The inspection began at 0900 when the Battalion Executive Officer Josh Crenshaw, serving as Commander of Troops, the Honor Guard, SJMS Band, and Corps of Cadets welcomed COL Celotto on the Tear Drop. The band sounded great, the Honor Guard looked sharp, and the Corps marched exceptionally well, forming a wonderful first impression of St. John's and the 114th Corps of Cadets.


The Battalion Staff briefed the inspection team at 0930, while the companies prepared for the in-ranks inspection in Banes Gymnasium. The many rehearsals paid off as the staff earned 99 out of the 100 points that were possible on the briefing. The inspectors commented that it was an outstanding briefing and one of the best that they had seen this year.


The in-ranks inspection was worth 200 points and each of the companies spent many hours getting ready for it. This was the fourth straight year that all of the companies earned perfect scores and the corps picked up 200 more points. Each of the cadets was standing tall and looking good as the inspectors made their rounds, checking each uniform and asking questions of every cadet. Yes, they were nervous, as every St. John's graduate knows, but they all stepped up to the challenge and it was an impressive sight to see. Battalion Staff members S-1 Jeremy Crenshaw, S-3 Brendon Harris, S-4 Rex Robichaux, and S-5 George Norton had each of their respective areas of responsibility inspected and each earned a perfect score of 50 points. Jeremy made over 5,000 entries into the cadet database and every administrative record for the upper school cadets was subject to being checked. Brendon was responsible for all of the weekly training schedules that he had written over the year and also accounting for all of the training time spent in JROTC by the upper school cadets. Rex had the daunting task of taking the inspector through a four and one-half page checklist and accounting for all of the government property on campus. The inspectors said that this was the first time all year that they had not found any deficiencies in the S-4 area. George was responsible for the public affairs program at St. John's and the interface between JROTC and all of the available

Spotlight on the Board of Trustees

Dedication of Former Cadet Larry Britegam Helps St. John's Move Into the Future



My association with St. John's Military School dates back almost 100 years. My

mother's grandfather (my great grandfather) was a building contractor from Kansas City. He built several buildings in Salina in the very early 1900's and built a family home on Santa Fe, which my brother-in-law and his wife now live in.

One of those buildings, St. Barnabas Hospital, the first hospital built in Salina, was built on the grounds of SJMS around 1907. Although initially the Bishop ran the hospital, the agreement when it was built was to give it to the trustees of St. John's when it no longer was used or needed as a hospital. In 1923 that happened and the building became known as the Junior School Building. In my recent research of the building I found that the total cost of construction of the building was about \$20,000. Almost \$3,000 less than it costs for a cadet to go to St. John's today for one vear.

I attended St. John's from 1967 to 1969 as a student. As coincidence would have it, I lived in the

same location that my great grandfather had built a building almost 70 years earlier.

My time at St. John's became a very important time in my life. Although the school was going through a tough time, as was our country, St. John's was still playing a very important role for kids throughout the United States.

St. John's was not an easy time for me. Being from Salina and going to school at St. John's and seeing all of my friends with a lot more freedom than I had was difficult to take. Yet, it was one of those defining moments for me that all of us have in our life. It gave me a focus, an inner drive and destination that I was lacking before I attended St. John's. Although I went back to public school after 2 years, I have often wondered what direction my life would have taken if I had graduated from St. John's.

As with many kids who attend St. John's, I stayed away for 10 to 15 years after I left. After I graduated from



college and went to work at Sunflower Bank, I started getting very involved in the community. Keith Duckers, one of my mentors and a close friend, asked me to get involved with the St. John's Foundation. I soon became President of the Foundation and my volunteer time at St. John's was off and running. In 1989 I went on the Board of Trustees and I am just finishing my second 6 year term on the board. I am also finishing my 2-year run as Chairman of the Board of Trustees and was Chairman of the search committee to hire President Albert. It was the second search committee that I had the honor of being

on to hire a President for St. John's.

I have also been on numerous committees at the school and served as Chairman of both the fund drive for the Lyman Linger Middle School Building and the Stevens Center.

There are many issues that have kept me involved in St. John's. My family connection, the friendships that I have developed, and my deep sense of loyalty to the school.

As with all organizations that survive over 100 years, St. John's has always had a way of surviving. Dale Browning has always told me that God truly does care about St. John's, and I think he is right. There have been many times over the years when St. John's was going through a tough time. Each time however, fate stepped in and provided an opportunity to get through the crisis. I too believe that St. John's was put here for a reason and its mission is far from being over. The current board is very focused on assuring that the long-term viability of the school remains on track.

As we all can see, the physical structures at St. John's have changed dramatically over the years. All old buildings have either been replaced or remodeled. The current board is in the middle of developing both a short-term and a long-term plan for the campus and our endowment funds.

We now have an endowment fund that helps supplement tuition costs with scholarship dollars. It also helps fund an ongoing maintenance program to keep the school in great shape. Although not near enough, we need to focus even more energy on the development of our endowment fund.

Our educational programs continue to develop and technology will play a very important role in the future. We continue to spend a lot of money and time in developing technology as a part of the curriculum.

Faculty and staff, religion, structure, discipline, a sense of family, and activities still form the core values of St. John's. I am constantly reminded of the deep commitment of the staff that truly is the backbone of the school. They can be as tough as they need to be and turn around and put their arm around a cadet and tell them everything will be fine.

It has been 35 years since I have been a student at St. John's. The student body today is much more street wise, more tuned into world events, has a higher knowledge of the world we live in, yet must deal with many more issues than the cadets of my generation did. But, the opportunities in their life will be unlimited. It really is up to them to decide what direction they go after they leave St. John's.

Yet in some respects, the cadets today are the same as they have always been. Most are looking or needing a more disciplined life.

My vision for St. John's is broad and very exciting. I feel a very personal obligation to assure the viability of the school for years to come.

I do not see us increasing our enrollment significantly, but I believe we could add another 20 to 30 kids.

We must work now to increase our endowment fund. It will be the one vehicle that can sustain the school forever. We should have an endowment today with \$50,000,000 to \$100,000,000 in it. I know the money is out there. We need to work at reconnecting with many alumni.

I also see us building three to five additional buildings in the future. I would like to see an alumni center and museum of historical memorabilia that dates back to the start of St. John's. I believe you cannot find your way into the future if you do not know where you have come from. To me, sharing the history of St. John's with the current corps and increasing that process into a more concentrated part of their time is imperative. Also included into that building would be the administrative offices and a performing arts center for the cadets to use for assemblies, meetings, and plays.

We also need to build a new gymnasium, an indoor swimming pool, and a sports complex with a new football field, baseball field and track.

The needs are many, and the needs for a school like St. John's remains strong. I cannot tell you how excited I am about the future of St. John's. The opportunity to build the school into a world-class organization has never been better. I think the best is yet to come.


