The Muleskinner Battalion has earned an average score of 997 over the last seven years. All of the hard work put into preparing for the inspection each year has paid off as the cadets have earned the reputation as being the premier Army JROTC within the 4th ROTC Region's 2nd Brigade. The Brigade is based out of Ft. Carson, Colorado, and includes the states of: Colorado, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, and Minnesota with over 300 high school JROTC programs. The cadets have had the highest AFI score in the Buffalo Brigade for seven straight years.

The inspection began at 0900 when the Battalion Executive Officer, Nick Dockery, served as the Commander of troops as the Honor Guard, SJMS Band, and Corps of Cadets welcomed COL Dennis on the Tear Drop. The band sounded great, the Honor Guard looked sharp, and the Corps marched exceptionally well, forming a wonderful first impression of St. John's and the 115th Corps of Cadets. The Brigade Commander, COL Dennis smiled as soon as she stepped out of the car and commented that the Corps looked sharp.

The Battalion Staff briefed the inspection team at 0930, while the companies prepared for the in-ranks inspection in Banes Gymnasium.



Excerpts from an email from Peter Wilcox to President Albert dated 2-16-03 . . .

I have not forgotten the moment that changed my life forever. I want you to know that to this day I am glad to be at Virginia Military Institute (VMI). I am doing well. From the moment I walked into the Jackson Arch the words, "YOU MAY BE WHATEVER YOU RESOLVE TO BE" jumped out at me. It makes me think, especially during the Rat Line, which I'm sure you're well aware of. Although it is over, I carry a lot of memories of leadership characteristics that the Cadre possessed. It reminded me of when I was in 8th grade and came to St. John's as a New Boy. Foreign to the environment, a haircut that didn't fit a military manner, a body whose physicality of military was unknown. Now it seems almost the opposite. Thanks to a place (SJMS) who truly shaped my character and maturity to model that of a true American citizen.

Academics are difficult and challenging. It's not like high school where you can take thirty minutes to study for a test; it's more like studying for three hours or more! But that's OK, that's life, that's hard work.

The many rehearsals paid off as the staff earned 100 out of the 100 points that were possible on the briefing. The inspectors commented that it was an outstanding briefing and one of the best that they had seen this year.

The in-ranks inspection was worth 200 points and each of the companies spent many hours getting ready for it. This was the fifth straight year that all of the companies earned perfect scores and the Corps picked up 200 more points. Each of the cadets was standing tall and looking good as the inspectors made their rounds checking each uniform and

asking questions of every cadet. Each cadet had to study a list of 60 questions and was asked two questions from the list. The pride and determination to succeed was evident in the faces of the cadets.

The Corps with the Color Guard performed a pass in-review after lunch with COL Dennis and Robichaux as the reviewing officers. Once again the cadets showed what they are made of as they earned 149 out of 150 points. The inspection team commented about how impressed they were with the way the cadets marched. It was a truly impressive sight to see


as the band, with cadet Kevin Kerns up front, led the way. Cadets Fernando Batalla, Nick Adams, Patrick Johnsen, and Jordan King led their companies as the Corps gave a dominating performance on Perkins Field.

The final score of 999 out of 1,000 was the result of many hours spent preparing and checking every little detail in an effort to get it "just right." Every St. John's Old Boy should be proud of what the 115th Corps accomplished that day.



Fencing Takes a Foothold at St. Johns






Above: Gum Ngaak receives a smooth pass of the baton from Brandon Lee during a relay race.


