Physical Fitness

The Twenty Thousand Mile Journey

Last year, St. John's Military School initiated the "Go for a Thousand" running program. The purpose of this program is to encourage the cadets, staff and faculty to incorporate running into their physical fitness routine and to encourage them to adopt a physically active and healthier lifestyle.

Each participant in the program maintains a running log and records every mile that they run. SFC Rob Cruce manages the program and tracks each participants program. Individuals are awarded for their accomplishments at various milestones throughout the program. Awards are given at the 25, 50, 100, 250, 500 and 1,000 mile benchmarks. Tee shirts, long sleeve tee shirts, polo shirts and jackets are presented as these levels of running are accomplished.

The program has grown in popularity and the participants in the corps of cadets have logged over 16,000 miles as of February 2006. The staff and faculty have run over 3,900 miles. Daniel Clive was the first middle school cadet to go over 100 miles. Father Ron Longero was the first individual at St. John's to reach the one thousand mile goal.

Ray Parker Signs With Butler

In the spring of 2003 Raymond Parker entered SJMS looking for direction as many young men do. I had the opportunity to talk with Raymond a short time explaining that joining sports at SJMS would make his transition to the school easier. Cadet Parker agreed to return in the fall to play football.

His sophomore season he put 100% effort into becoming the starting tailback. As I watched Raymond play, it was apparent that he was a special football player, and that he had the talent to play at the college level. Parker decided to attend a few football camps during the summer in Nashville and Kansas City to improve his game. At both camps he earned awards and became serious about becoming a high school athlete.

2 During his junior season Raymond

was eager to show what he had learned. With the help of his team mates Raymond was able to accumulate 1650 yards, and scored twenty touchdowns. He was invited to several prestigious combines to display his talent, and also received an invitation to the All American Combine in San Antonio, Texas. All through the spring colleges such as Kansas, Colorado State, Auburn, Dodge City, and others contacted SJMS coaches about Raymond's talent and abilities.

Raymond was excited to repeat his performance from the previous year during his senior season at St. John's. Unfortunately he sprained his ankle in the second game placing him on the sideline for three games. After he returned, Parker went on a mission to reach the thousand yard mark. Raymond achieved his goal

ending the season with 1240 yards and 12 touchdowns. Colleges once again started calling, and Cadet Parker started taking visits to decide where he would begin his college football career.

On February 3, 2006 Raymond signed his letter of intent to play for the Butler Community College Grizzlies. He chose this school to continue shooting for his dream of playing for a division one school. Butler has been a three time national champion since 1999, and has a well established program to send players to division one teams.

Raymond and his teammates helped put SJMS on the map as he worked toward his goal.

Of the four peaks of our ALPS, Spiritual Growth is perhaps the most difficult to quantify. One can measure academic excellence. One can measure increased physical fitness in an individual. One can even observe good leadership development. So how do we know when a cadet has achieved spiritual growth and how does it come about? Is spiritual growth tangible?

Because St. John's is a school with deep roots in the Christianity as lived through the Anglican tradition we must, as a matter of faith begin with Jesus the messiah. So we naturally look to Holy Scripture to give us some guidance. First. when Jesus was asked which commandment was the greatest he replied, "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself." The besetting sin discussed again and again in the Bible was Israel's failure to be faithful to God and in the worship of God. The Bible presents us with the revelation that God has revealed Himself to Abraham and his seed as the One and only God. There were no others. Therefore Israel's and our only option is to love and worship God who has created, mercifully dealt with an unfaithful people, and delivered them from oppression time and time again. It is why Jews constantly remind themselves of God's mercy in the Exodus and why we as Christians continue to celebrate the greatest revelation of all, God's self revelation in Jesus his messiah.

Spiritual Growth

Spiritual growth depends then upon our growing relationship with God. Spiritual growth is directly proportional to one's own growth in relationship and thanksgiving to God. It also comes about through one's increasing knowledge and need for dependence upon God to save and to heal. The Apostle Paul instructs us in his first letter to the Corinthians (3:6), "I planted, Apollos watered, but God caused the growth." Therefore at the root of spiritual growth is God's action in causing growth. What we do here at St. John's is in the plainest sense to till, plant and water the soil of our cadet's souls.


In order to make possible the spiritual growth of a cadet toward God and his neighbor St. John's does several things through the ministry of the chaplain. The first is daily chapel. Each day we come together to pray the prayers of the Church and to make time available for personal prayer. William Temple once Archbishop of Canterbury said of people in worship, "As they thus serve Him, they leaven society...' So through worship we hope to find people who will leaven society. And so, it is through the repetition of the prayers, the Psalms and the lessons that cadets are challenged and comforted with the reality of God who is merciful to those who follow him. In time most cadets will memorize the regular prayers. It is also through the daily routine that they come to learn the story of God and of His Son Jesus who has come to save us from our own selves. As we head into the future, cadets will be not only hearing the great Biblical stories, but will also have teaching to accompany those stories so that they will be more equipped to incorporate them into their own lives if they choose. Plans are also being made for our cadets to have more voluntary options to grow spiritually. Another is for the chaplain to be able to have more time to build one to one relationships with the cadets.

So is spiritual growth tangible? The apostle, Paul, writes, "The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control." It is these characteristics which become more evident in a human that bear witness to spiritual growth. Spiritual growth is tangible in this sense. So, while spiritual growth is dependent upon God's action we have a part to play through good teaching and worship, our cadet's also have a part to play. They have to be willing participants. My faith though, is in the Lord that the Lord will do his part as our cadets participate in the various activities which help open them to spiritual growth.

There is another aspect to spiritual growth which bears evidence. That is the moral growth that comes with spiritual growth. While not directly connected to our life of worship, prayer and study of God through the Anglican tradition, **CHARACTER COUNTS! certainly** intersects with what we are trying to do. Beginning next fall we will be fully participating as a whole school community the values and principles of CHARACTER COUNTS! a national coalition of schools communities and organizations dedicated to the character education of youth. Currently an implementation team is being trained in the "Six Pillars of Character" as well as the "Ethical Decision Making" process. As a school community we will be applying these principles not only to cadets but to ourselves as well.

The reality is that here at SJMS we are doing more than classroom educating. We are training the whole person for a life of service in this world in which we live. What we hope is that when our cadets leave here they too can be a bit of leaven in society.

Leadership Development

Upon arriving at St John's as the Commandant of Cadets I decided that for the first year I would spend the majority of my time observing and learning about life at SJMS. My main focus was on learning about Cadets and the many challenges they face every day. It was intriguing to see that these young boys, some as young as 12 years of age, quickly adapt to this demanding way of life. Their daily schedule posses challenges and demands that most adults would have a difficult time managing; yet these young warriors go about their daily routine with relative ease. From the time they wake up at 0600 hours in the morning until lights out and "TAPS" is sounded they have very little time to relax and find time to do what most boys the same age are enjoying in the public sector.

With that brief introduction I will get to explaining why I have made some changes aimed at recognizing the achievements of the majority of the SJMS Cadets! One of my first observations was that we spend a tremendous amount of time and energy counseling and disciplining the cadet who perhaps does have a difficult time adjusting to the rigorous and demanding schedule he is faced with as he arrives on campus. Ranging from restricting a cadet from going on "Pass Gate" to marching the dreaded punishment tours, countless hours are spent monitoring and accounting for compliance with these activities. Unfortunately while all this is going on the cadet who did follow the rules, learned about traditions and excelled in the classroom is virtually forgotten. This situation becomes more critical when statistics show that the majority of cadets fit into the latter group.

With the total support and advice from the President and other members of the Staff and Faculty I went about exploring possibilities to reward cadets who meet and in most cases surpass the standard at SJMS. While cadets enjoy promotions in rank and decorations for their achievements I was searching for immediate recognition and rewards that would send the message that following the rules and doing well in academics is very important.

The first step was developing training sessions that


would prepare cadet leaders for their mission in training "New Boys". To this end, with the help of 1SG Blair, We developed a "Squad Leader Course" and a "Platoon Leader Course". These two courses of instruction are designed to teach Cadet Leaders how to properly use their leadership skills. The instruction also addresses counseling techniques, methodology in motivating young people, and describes the different styles of leadership and when to use a particular style. Cadets who exhibit potential for the formidable task of leading and training cadets are selected to attend these courses and are rewarded with certificates, ribbons and appropriate positions and ranks within the Corps of Cadets.

Secondly, I developed a way of recognizing cadets who go about their daily schedule and perform admirable in the Leadership and Academic Arenas.


These young men not only meet the standard but in effect raise the bar to a new and higher level. These hard chargers are the standard bearers for SJMS and are glowing examples to be emulated by the other cadets. Their immediate reward is a Certificate of Achievement recognizing them in front of their peers, a special meal in their honor and an additional remain overnight pass (RON). This award is called the "Cadet of the Quarter" and their pictures are proudly displayed in a window case outside of Vanier Hall.

Finally the 118th Corps led by the Battalion Commander has re-instituted the Honor Code. The majority of the work is being done by the Battalion Staff with MAJ Mark Polzella providing guidance and assistance. It was a very proud moment when the entire Corps of Cadets stood up and loudly recited the honor code oath prior to departing for Christmas Break. The 118th Corps in unison proclaimed "A Cadet Will Not Lie, Cheat or Steal, Nor Will They Tolerate Those That Do". The work continues to insure that the Honor Code is fully implemented and orchestrated by the cadets. This is a major step for the Corps.



Old Boys Assure the Future of St. John's!





Commencement Speaker Named

Lieutenant General (Retired) Robert D. Beckel has been named Commencement speaker for the 2006 graduation exercises.

Lieutenant General (Retired) Robert D.Beckel was born January 2, 1937 in Walla Walla, Washington. He earned a BA from the Air Force Academy as a member of it's first class and a MS degree in international affairs from George Washington University in 1971. He completed the Naval Command and Staff Course in 1971 and the National War College in 1975.

General Beckel was commissioned a 2nd Lt. upon graduation from the Air Force Academy and received his pilot's wings in June of 1960.

He was a member of the U.S. Air force Aerial Demonstration team, the Thunderbirds, from 1965 to 1967. He was selected to fly the solo position in demonstrations throughout the world. Beckel served as a flight commander of the 614th Tactical Fighter Wing in Vietnam where he flew 313 combat missions.

Beckel served in numerous critical positions throughout his distinguished military career to include Chief Aide to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Commander of the 100th Combat Support Group, Commander of the 410th Bombardment Wing, Commander of the 7th Air Division SAC, Commander of the Air Force Academy, Director of Operations for the Deputy Chief of Operations for the U.S. Air Force, Chief of Staff Headquarters Strategic Air Command, Deputy Chairman NATO Military Committee and Commander Fiftieth Air Force.

The General is a command pilot with more than 4,400 flying hours. His awards include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal, Distinguished Service Medal, Silver Star, Legion of Merit with Oak Leaf cluster, Distinguished Flying Cross with four Oak Leaf clusters, Bronze Star Medal, Meritorious Service Medal and Air Medal with 15 Oak Leaf clusters. He was named to the Helm All-American basketball team in 1959.

Upon retirement, Beckel served three years as Vice President of a specialty chemical company and eight years as Superintendent of New Mexico Military Institute.

He is married to the former Donna Lee McAdams of Walla Walla, Washingon and they have two children.


Shooting Stars



To Cell or Not to Cell



The leadership of the 118th cops of cadets thought that it might be time to suggest that cell phones be allowed as a reward. A cell phone proposal was given to LTC Tony Pino, Commandant of Cadets by Garrett Cote, Spencer Terry and Hunter Lobertini.

Pino decided that the proposal should be brought to President Fox for his approval.

Below is the policy as stated by Pino and distributed to the cadets.

- The Battalion Commander and the Battalion Staff living in the Stevens Center have been authorized to have Cell Phones in their rooms. They must abide by the following rules.
 - The cadets must maintain a minimum grade point average of 3.0 or higher
 - The Cadets must maintain an "A" in deportment
 - The cellular phone is not to leave their living area under any circumstances other than for use on pass gate or otherwise authorized by the Commandant
 - The cell phones are not to be brought into the academic building or any other area of instruction for any reason whatsoever.
 - Cell phones will not be brought to intramurals, athletic events, drill and ceremony or to other activities on campus.
 - Cadets may take their cell phones on activities off campus if requested by the sponsor of the activity and authorized by the Commandant.
 - Cadets may not lend their cell phones to other cadets for their personal use.

Company Commanders will be authorized cell phones under the same parameters/rules as outlined above for the Battalion Commander and his Staff. Cell phones are a privilege and not a right and may be confiscated if cadets do not comply with the guidance as stated in paragraph 1 of this MFR.


- Cell phones may be confiscated by any member of the SJMS staff and faculty if they observe any deviation from the above stated rules.
- Confiscated phones will be turned in to the Commandant or Deputy Commandant.
- Retention is our business and placing trust and confidence in cadet leaders goes a long way in making this Institution a great place for learning both in the Academic arena as well as in the leadership arena. 
