




 \mathbf{A}_{s} I write this article we are just days away from our first enrollment registration for the 2002-2003 academic year. Honoring a Hero's Legacy

Lt. Col. Paul H. Kellogg, USMC, retired, passed away July 19, 2002 at the age of 85. He is survived by his sons, Paul H. Kellogg, Jr., Peter J. Kellogg, Phillip A. Kellogg; a brother Frederick A. Kellogg, eight grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren. Col. Kellogg was preceded in death by his parents, James. E. and Ethel A. Kellogg, his loving wife Mary B. Kellogg, and a brother Harry J. Kellogg.

Col. Kellogg was a U. S. Marine dive bomber pilot in the Guadalcanal invasion against the Japanese during World War II. He was wounded in a fiery plane crash and received The Purple Heart and was awarded the

Distinguished Flying Cross.

After a convalescent period in the U. S. for wounds suffered in the Guadalcanal, he returned to fly combat missions during the Philippine Island invasion against the Japanese during World War II. Message from the Commandant Jerry Bradley

Although it seems like just yesterday that the 114th Corps of Cadets marched into history, we are quickly approaching that time when we "do it all over again," by forming the 115th Corps, and beginning the 2002-2003 school year. We are looking forward to the year ahead, and to welcoming back to St. John's, the young men who will make up the leadership of this Corps of Cadets.

A great number of "Old Boys" have opted to return this year, so we are at present looking at the many leadership positions we have vacant, and considering those officers and noncommissioned officers who are returning, for assignment to positions of leadership and responsibility. In addition, for the first time, we will conduct a Drill Instructor School, where we will select young men who desire to be New Boy trainers and train them in the discipline of Drill and Ceremonies, the Conduct of Formations, and in the art of inspecting New Boy cadets both in the dormitories, and in ranks. This year the cadet drill instructors will be solely responsible for the training of New Boys.

I have been in touch with Major Robichaux and have informed him that for the most part, the selection of leaders for the 115th Corps will be his responsibility. The only positions which are filled at this time are that of Battalion Commander, Command Sergeant Major, and the Presidential Liaison Officer. If you would like to request a particular job, I recommend that you contact Major Robichaux and discuss your desires with him.

We have created a new military department position this year, that of Middle School Commandant, and filled that position with Major Carl Lloyd, a gentleman from Oak Ridge Military Academy in North Carolina. Major Lloyd, his wife Teresa and two sons, ages three and five, will reside on the St. John's Campus. We have also added two new military advisors, Master Sergeant Steve Davis, who recently retired from the United States Army and lives in Abilene: and Staff Sergeant Fred Beck, who comes to us from Massanutten Military Academy in Virginia. Staff Sergeant Beck will reside in Mize Hall, and both gentlemen will work in Mize Hall as night Military Advisors for Headquarters and Charlie Company.

I hope you all are having a wonderful summer. I am looking forward to seeing you at Leader, Football, Soccer and Rifle Camps, or at the beginning of the new school year.

A familar face on campus, Barb moves out of the classroom into the new Director of Communications office, working mostly with publications.






Fred Beck

Not a new face, but a new office - Roy will now serve as the Student Activities Director, coordinating all athletic events and school functions for students.




David Potts





Foundation re-named to give the group more focus and identity



The Parent - Staff Organization, AKA The St. John's Military School Foundation - your PTA, has been renamed to give the group more focus and an identity apart from other campus organizations.

The association has been an integral part of the school for many years. The PSO is an association made up of SJMS staff, parents, alumni and patrons. The organization has two primary purposes: the first and foremost is to provide support and enrichment opportunities, academic as well as extracurricular, for all cadets. The PSO has accomplished this by sponsoring four activity days per year, sponsoring five cadets to attend the Presidential Classroom in Washington D. C., honoring Seniors with class rings and by approving grant requests made by teachers and military personnel. A special scholarship fund has been established to help cadets who would not otherwise be able to attend, take advantage of the many special trips sponsored by staff members.

The second purpose of the PSO is to provide an avenue by which parents can become knowledgeable about cadet life and to participate more actively in their education. The *Skirmisher* publication will have a special section reserved for news from members of the PSO about fund-raising and special activities sponsored throughout the year.

A board, made up of patrons, parents and staff that meet biannually to consider grant requests and organize fund-raising efforts, governs the SJMS PSO. The current board is dedicated to increasing membership in the organization and continuing the excellent fund-raising ideas that have been implemented most recently.

The new name reflects both the mission and membership of the PSO and through our section of the *Skirmisher*, the board hopes to become more visible to the patrons, parents and students of St. John's Military School.

To be sure we need to educate our boys in the basics of mathematics, English, science, and social studies. St. John's boys should develop skills in thinking and organization and we want them to be equipped in the languages and social skills, but we are failing them if we do not recognize what is happening in the work place and what demands are being made of those who leave here.

Please understand that SJMS is not changing its philosophy with regard to the basic issues of education, but there is and will be a greater emphasis on determining the greater need of the cadet so that he will be more able to focus on some established paths for success and Option Development (a new program for SJMS).

This is shared with you in hope that we can create partners who will assist us in funding this critical component in our curriculum. In an effort to secure this funding I am seeking several grants to help us. As you consider ways to assist the boys of St. John's I hope you will seriously consider the technology effort. These are not fun-and-game activities, but serious hands-on curriculum pieces that enable our boys to make sense of the theory of education. This is practical application. Thank you for your positive consideration of this initiative.

I conclude my column on a sad note. As many of you are aware, the St. John's Community has suffered a terrific loss this summer with the passing of a great American, Col. Paul Kellogg, former Commandant of the school. I do not have the words to express our loss, nor are any of us really able to assess the great and enduring impact the gentleman soldier had on the boys who attended St. John's under his tutelage. As you will note, a significant part of this publication pays tribute to him.

On November 10, 2002, the Corps will assemble for a memorial service to Col. Kellogg here on the SJMS Campus. We invite all of you to attend this special time in memory and reflection. The service is planned to begin at 2:00 pm. A buffet luncheon will precede the service. I trust that you will join the 115th Corps of Cadets at this special campus event.

In addition to this special service St. John's Military School has established the Paul Kellogg Memorial Fund. This fund to be placed in the school's endowment is for the purpose of creating a lasting memorial scholarship in the name of the late Commandant. Memorial contributions may be made to St. John's Military School in the name of Paul Kellogg.





Osiah Buntin Commencement Address

Major General Josiah Bunting, superintendent of the Virginia Military Institute gave the 114th Commencement speech. 



eter Wilcox Farewell Address





Camp Challenge Cadets attend JROTC


Cadets attend JROTC summer camp at Fort Sill







Hot Kids, Hot Fires, Cool Pots

Brows sweated, fires blazed, and glazes melted as several participants of the Summer Enrichment Program got the chance to get their hands dirty with some primitive firing techniques. Spending a week with art instructor Scott Wiedeman, students discovered alternative techniques of decorating ceramics.

Starting with Pit Fire methods evolved from Mexican and Native American pottery, the guys set up a 1.5' deep pit lined with wood shavings into which the pottery was nestled and then sprinkled with copper carbonate and salt to create various color fuming patterns. After covering with newspaper and wood scraps, the pit was ignited. After a couple hours of intense heat and refueling, the fire was allowed to smolder, and the pottery was removed. Although the results were partially determined by reduction (depriving oxygen underneath the shavings) or oxidation (salt and copper fuming in open flame), the pottery yielded surprising and often pleasing designs created by the fire.

The week concluded with a Raku Fire, an Americanized version of a Japanese pottery method. The students chose either a crackle glaze or copper metallic glaze for their pots in conjunction with taped designs which, by leaving unglazed, would result in black, carbonized areas. The pottery was then loaded into an outdoor kiln and fired to about 1750°. Then begins the excitement as pots are pulled red-hot from the kiln, with tongs and protective gloves, and placed in a tin can with with a combustible such as newspaper. Upon igniting, the cans are quickly covered, placed inside another can and covered, and allowed to smoke inside this reduction atmosphere. Results and procedures were dictated by the choice of glaze. Those using the crackle glaze waited for a moment and allowed the glaze to cool and begin "crackling" before placing it in the tin can, where smoke would darken the cracks. Those with copper glaze waited 10-20 minutes before removing the pot from the tin can and immediately quenching the pot in water in order to "freeze" the metallic finish of the copper.

Despite to 90° + weather, the students enjoyed the break from the classroom and the chance to experience the "cool" fire. Those participating included Brandon Blackmon, John Burnett, John Davis, David Doelman, James Elmer, Drew Gorman, Jordan Harman, Jason Jay, Nathan Koenig, Sean Morgan, Nick Romero, Joe Serieno, and Jordan Thompson.

Col. Kellogg was also awarded the many commendation medals for flying combat missions against communist forces in support of the U. S. Marine infantry unit during the Korean War.

After retiring from a twenty-two year service to the Marine Corps in 1964, he served as the St. John's Commandant of Cadets until 1986.

Former St. John's President, Keith Duckers last saw Kellogg in May at St. John's graduation.

"He looked like he was 55, a lean and trim hard-nosed Marine," Duckers said.

The chance for Kellogg to become cadet commandant came two years after he started with St. John's. Duckers said Kellogg worked with 3,000-plus boys in the hours they weren't in class. His bull-dog face and gravelly voice were an initial obstacle in meeting people, but parents and boys grew to love him, Duckers said.

"At first they were scared, but by graduation he had mothers kneeling down in front of him because he was so good with the boys," continued Duckers.

A bust of Kellogg is displayed near the school's main entrance. Duckers said he can't imagine a better role model.

"He was absolutely a patriot. He taught the boys to love this country." Keith Duckers said.

A memorial service is being planned to honor Col. Paul Kellogg in conjunction with the Marine Corps' birthday and Veterans Day.
