My teaching career spans 37 years and thankfully most of those years have been spent celebrating the accomplishments of my students and sharing the milestones they reach as they move on to build their lives. All that changed the morning of May 11, 2016, when I received a call from the mother of one of my students who had graduated from St. John's just a few days before...the trembling tone of her voice and the message she was relating will never leave my mind and heart. Her son Jake Whitting and two of his traveling companions, John Yoder, and A.J. Ricketts, both due to return to St. John's next fall, had tragically been taken from this world in an auto accident. From that moment on, the St. John's family was forever changed. The outpouring of support for the families who lost their sons was incredible. The word spread like lightning throughout the St. John's community. "Old Boys" who attended St. John's recently were in disbelief, "Old Boys" from past corps offered their condolences. Current parents opened their homes to offer a place of repose to reflect and remember Jake, A.J., and John. What we remember will vary from person to person...but one thing is for sure, each of these young men left an indelible mark on St. John's and left it a better place. Wendy Stein



Jake spent seven years at St. John's and was just a child when he started his journey. Whitting quickly became a favorite among his classmates. He walked with a swagger and had a twinkle in his eye. Jake stood out because his energy surpassed the others. His athletic talent was evident very early and he became an integral part of varsity athletics at St. John's. During his junior and senior years, Jake set passing and catching records on the gridiron and became the core of the basketball team as a high scorer and great playmaker. His high school career landed him a spot on the Santa Barbara City College Vaguero football team. In addition to his contributions athletically, Jake rose through the ranks to command Alpha company his junior year and was named battalion commander his senior year. As one of his last requests to the 128th corps, he joined the battalion on the Browning Parade Field doing pushups in honor of and thanking the parents for all their support. Jake's English teacher, Chris Zerger, worked closely with Jake on his college English class. Zerger explains, "Jake loved haiku and we discussed a passage by the poet Kobayashi Issa who writes about a 'world of dew' and the fact that we know life is impermanent and fragile. Jake was a deep thinker, an introspective soul. I always told him that instead of playing football he should major in literature or philosophy. He would smile and then say no."

Jake was one of a kind and will be remembered for all his many contributions to St. John's.



John came to St. John's at the beginning of his sophomore year. Having only been at St. John's for two years, his potential became quickly apparent. John's infectious smile spread cheer in the barracks and the academic building. Well liked by his peers and the St. John's staff, John could light up a room with his energy and smile. Assigned to Bravo company, he played the pied piper role among the younger Cadets. Admired by the middle school Cadets, John acted as sage and mentor. At his memorial service, his older sister mentioned that when John's parents Mark and Deborah traveled to the Philippines to adopt six-year-old John, they found all the smaller children looked up to and adored John. This natural ability to lead and his winning smile gave John all the components necessary to work and live in Bravo company. He joined the soccer team at St. John's and became a crucial part of the Muleskinner offense. Playing with finesse and vigor, he looked unencumbered by gravity as he reached up to catch a pass or kick a goal. On the basketball court, he could travel with the quickness of a panther. Lightning-fast transitions on offense and a blistering three-point shot were part of his signature on the basketball court. John was named to the 129th battalion staff as the command sergeant major.

John will be remembered for that smile and for being grateful for the opportunity to live and grow in a country far away from his birthplace. He made the best of his time at St. John's.


A.J. Ricketts was a presence among the corps of Cadets. Quiet by nature and unassuming, A.J. towered over most of his St. John's brothers and enjoyed the camaraderie of life at St. John's.


A.J. was a "New Boy" as a sophomore and spent much of his first year getting used to life in the United States. Born in Nigeria to Ifeoma and Akin, A.J. was a proud man and spent his days at St. John's quietly taking care of business. He was a member of the SJMS drill team, the Black Knights.

When he first came to St. John's, A.J. found it difficult to adhere to the rules and regulations required of Cadets. As he settled in, A.J. grew to accept the structure and discipline of the school and decided to make the best of his situation. Before finals, A.J. mentioned to one of his teachers, "Ma'am, I think I understand now what I need to do to succeed next year." His Honors English 11 teacher remembers, "During a classroom discussion of Toni Morrison's The Bluest Eye, A.J. took my breath away with his insightful and mature analysis of a very complex and challenging novel. He wasn't afraid to share the fact that the novel showed him we must love one another, that everyone deserves love. He felt so much compassion for the novel's protagonist Pecola, a little girl whose innocence is systematically destroyed by the cruelty in the world. I was so moved by A.J.'s candor and insight. I told him so. This occurred only a few weeks before the end of the school year."

A.J. would have been a senior during the 2016-2017 school year and will be remembered fondly by both the staff and his peers.





St. John's special order #1-16, Cadet Major Justin Gilbert is designated Battalion Commander of the 129th Corps of Cadets, by order of Major George Stelljes, Commandant of Cadets, St. John's Military School.

During the graduation ceremony, the battalion commander (BC) named to lead the next Corps of Cadets participates in a ceremony with the St. John's flag. The colors (St. John's flag) is handed to the commandant of Cadets, from the outgoing BC. The Commandant of Cadets then hands the colors to the incoming BC. The colors are crossed from side to side to ensure the flag passes over the heart of each participant. It is a solemn ceremony meant to signify the completion of the outgoing commander's tour of duty and the beginning of the next commander's commission. With the official transfer of command completed, Colonel Jake Whitting transferred the heavy weight of the responsibilities of command to the shoulders of Cadet Major Justin Gilbert.





During the past 33 years (my tenure at St. John's), it has become very apparent that St. John's is special because of one constant: it's the people who make a difference. The campus is stunning, the grounds are manicured, and the buildings ship shape...but it's the folks who manage the day-to-day business of helping turn boys into men that really matter. Brian Bell reaches the boys on many levels...first and foremost in the quest for growing into responsible young men. On the following page you will gain a bit of insight into what it means to work at St. John's and learn that St. John's is a special place...because of the people. Wendy Stein



"The most rewarding part of my job is when a cadet decides to start making positive choices. The first success that young man has is a very powerful one, and I feel fortunate to be a part of that process."

Brian Bell, known as Cpt. Bell to hundreds of St. John's youngest Cadets, works in Bravo company as the senior military advisor. This might very well be even more challenging than his two tours of duty, one at Ft. Riley and one in Iraq while in the United States Army.

Bell joined the St. John's military staff working with Charlie company in the 118th Corps of Cadets. Like other members of the military staff, Cpt. Bell has served in numerous positions. During his 10 years of service, he's been a military advisor, who assists the senior military advisor, the in-school suspension officer, and now fills the role as senior military advisor. The senior military advisor position brings with it more responsibility for the overall day-to-day operation of the company. Many times, the senior military advisor is called upon to return to campus when off shift to help deal with special situations. When asked to describe why he enjoys working in the barracks, he responded, "Working in the barracks is the most interesting portion of the job. There isn't a spare moment or a shortage of something to do. We affectionately call Sage Hall 'the hive,' and it can be exactly that with middle school cadets moving constantly. There is never a dull moment."

Like other St. John's staff members, Cpt. Bell is also involved in numerous events throughout the year that serve to enhance Cadet life. Bell serves as Scout Master for Troop One, the first Boy Scout troop formed at St. John's many years ago. The scouts travel with Cpt. Bell and his assistant scoutmaster Sgt. Micah Stahl to the Trappers Rendezvous event which helps scouts celebrate scouting and encourages networking. Harvey County West Park, south of Salina, Kansas, is turned into an old-fashioned wilderness campground where thousands of Boy Scouts from across the country come for black powder rifle shooting, tomahawk throwing, trading, and bartering. This event has become a favorite of the St. John's scouting program and a work-intensive trip for the adult sponsors. Camping equipment, food, water, extra clothing, and first aid gear needs to be packed and transported to the event and the sheer numbers of scouts in attendance requires Bell and Stahl to remain vigilant throughout the event!

Bell also coaches the middle school soccer team through the fall soccer season, giving up time with his own two young sons, Porter, 8, and Ethan 4. Both boys can often be seen tagging along with their dad as he logs many extra hours both at school and at sporting events. Each year the middle school Cadets look forward to Cpt. Bell sponsored camp outs.


Bell also tries to make life at military school feel more like home and sees s to it that the Cadets have the opportunity to trick or treat in Salina neighborhoods and to go Christmas caroling with Katy England, first lady of St. John's.

Bell explains, "I hope that cadets learn from me the value in doing what is right and what is fair, that it is possible to be both. I want them to see that the way you treat people is how they will treat you, that understanding isn't always an impossibility." It's clear from the way the younger Cadets respond to fellow Cadets, their teachers, and the Salina public that most of the Bravo Cadets have learned that lesson well.

Cpt. Bell is working on earning his Bachelor's Degree in Elementary Education from Fort Hays State University.

He is married to Lisa and they will celebrate 15 years of marriage in May of 2017.

For those that know Cpt. Bell and have worked closely with him, it comes as no surprise that he is fiercely loyal to St. john's and believes in our mission to provide each Cadet with the opportunity to grow spiritually, morally, intellectually, and physically. A cancer survivor, father and husband, Cpt. Bell is another reason St. John's continues to flourish and attract and retain quality young men.



with a silent and live auction help raise additional funds for scholarships. Build your foursome and plan to join us on the links of the beautiful Salina Country Club for a great day of golf!


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
