Commencement Is Almost Here!

Many Activities Set for May 25-28

The 84th Corps of Cadets will become another chapter in the history of St. John's Military School following Commencement ceremonies Sunday, May 28. The Commencement exercises will be the climax of a weekend of activities at the School.

The Commencement schedule will open with an Awards Convocation at 7 p. m., Thursday, May 25 on Perkins Field.

Activities on Friday, May 26 are the annual Alumni dinner in Nichols Dining Hall, second Awards Convocation on Perkins Field and the presentation of "Stalag 17" by the SJMS Drama Club and a band concert in the gym.

Parents may meet with teachers and staff members from 9 to 11 a. m., Saturday. The St. John's Military School Foundation luncheon will be at 12 noon at the Hilton Inn. Military Field Day will get underway at 2 p. m. on Perkins Field.

The Senior Ball will begin with the senior receiving line at 7:30 p. m. in Memorial Hall. Dancing will be to the "Pagan Ballet" combo. At intermission the 1971-72 edition of the Crack Squad, commanded by Michael Hawkesworth, will drill and the change of command made.

Taps will be at 1 a. m.

Parents wishing to attend celebrations of Holy Communion on Commencement Sunday may do so at 7:30 a. m. at Christ Episcopal Cathedral and 6:30 or 8 a. m. at Sacred Heart Catholic Cathedral.

Cadets Visit Ft. Riley

The Cadets were guests of the First Aviation Battalion at Ft. Riley May 13 according to Ma. James H. Hamilton Jr., Senior Army Instructor.

The Cadets were formally welcomed at 9 a. m. and were taken on helicopter rides, viewed a static display of aircraft, saw the synthetic training orientation and observed operations in the weather post and the tower.

The Baccalaureate service will be at 10:30 a. m. in the Marymount College Fine Arts building auditorium. The speaker will be M. Dean Hargrove, motion picture and television producer, Hollywood, and a member of the SJMS Class of 1955.

A buffet luncheon will be served at noon from Nichols Dining Hall on the SJMS campus. The First Infantry Band, Ft. Riley, will play a concert during the lunch hour.

Commencement will begin at 1:30 p. m. on Perkins Field with the processional with music by the First Infantry Band.

Presentations planned for the afternoon include awarding of senior diplomas; the passing of the Hardy Sabre from the commander of the 84th Corps to the commander of the 85th Corps, and recognition of "The Brigadiers".

These ceremonies will be followed by the final retreat parade and last formation of the 84th Corps. That Corps will be dismissed forever.

Following the dismissal, the seniors will form a line to receive the congratulations of family and friends.

A class on the M-16 rifle and range procedures was conducted at 1 p. m. Cadets then fired the M-16 in six relays. The Cadets returned to Marshall Field to observe skydivers conducting live jumps.

"Old Boy", TV Producer To Be Baccalaureate Speaker

A successful television writer and producer from Hollywood who was graduated in the Class of 1955 will return to Salina to give the Baccalaureate address during commencement weekend.

M. Dean Hargrove was graduated from St. John's in 1955 with the rank of Cadet Captain. He earned a letter in basketball and was the football team manager. But Hargrove is best remembered by the "old timers" at St. John's for the skits he and Larry Rice presented frequently in the School's dining hall.

He drilled with the Civil Air Patrol Crack Platoon in regional and national drills during his last two years as a Cadet.

After graduating with a degree in political science from Wichita State University, Hargrove attended the graduate school at UCLA in film writing.

"Then I just began writing", he said. His first script for a "Maverick" show sold and a few months later he was hired as a staff writer on "The Bob Newhart Show". His name began showing up on the credits of some of the major television shows such as "The Man from Uncle".

Stepping up from writing, Hargrove became the associate producer and then producer of "The Name of the Game" series.

Hargrove explained, "It's not that difficult a step from writing to producing. Producing is almost a natural extension of writing in television."

Hargrove's younger brother, Phil, is also a graduate of SJMS.

According to Cecil Smith writing for the TV scene in "The Los Angeles Times", Hargrove, 35, is one of the brightest of the young producers at Universal Studios—and one of

the most interesting. He wrote: "He is a large, rather quiet lad from Kansas and one of the top writers in the business."

He made a series of films last season within the context of the Gene Barry segments of the Name of the Game that were perhaps the most astonishing material any producer ever fitted into the limited confines of a series.

Among his productions were Philip Wylie's chilling view of the future, "L. A. 2017"; "Passport to Palermo", a mad Italian comedy directed by Ben Gazzara, and "All the Old Familiar Faces", a film in which he used a Greek chorus to narrate the story.

This season Hargrove is acting as executive producer on the "Columbo" series (starring Peter Falk) and in the same capacity on a new series, "Madigan" with Richard Widmark starring.

Hargrove and his wife, Parvaneh, has one son, Robert. They live in the Westwood area of Los Angeles.

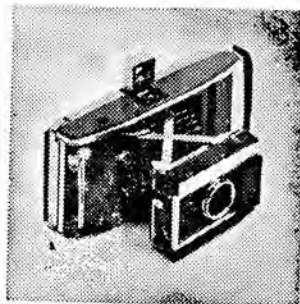

Trío of Young Coaches To Build Football Program

A trio of young coaches, headed by Bob Long, 24, former Kansas State football flanker, will be in charge of rebuilding St. John's Military School's football fortunes.

Long will be assisted by Billy Martin and Tom Michael.

St. John's will return to football next year after a 10-year lapse.

Col. Keith Duckers, St. John's Superintendent, and Lt. Gary Tucker, Athletic Director, were on hand as the new coaches signed SJMS contracts in the new offices of Vince Gibson, KSU football coach, April 7.

Long, from Kansas City, attended Wyandotte High School and was graduated from Kansas State two years ago. For the past two years he's been a graduate assistant at K-State while working on his master's degree. Long and his wife, Mary Lou, will live on campus.

He will teach 7th and 8th grade science and physical edu-

cation. Long will assist as wrestling coach and run a weight-lifting program.

Gibson praised Long as one of the top coaching prospects ever to come through his program at K-State.

Billy Martin, a former Wellington All-State lineman, attended the U. S. Military Academy at West Point prior to transferring to Washburn University, Topeka. A 90-foot fall in combat tactics at West Point ended Martin's football career at the Academy and forced his resignation from the Army. He transferred to Washburn where he will be graduated with a degree in English Language Arts this spring. He will teach Eng-

lish and speech at St. John's.

In addition to assisting in football, Martin will be the assistant track coach and the supervisor of the winter intramural program. He is single and will live off campus.

Michael, a Seaman High (Topeka) product, was an All-Northeast Kansas back in high school and an All-State American Legion baseball player. He played junior college football at Hutchinson prior to transferring to Pittsburg State. He will teach mechanical arts at St. John's.

Michael will assist in basketball and will be the head track coach. He is married and his wife's name is Jo.

St. John's has recently joined the Western Division of the Dwight Eisenhower League in Central Kansas.

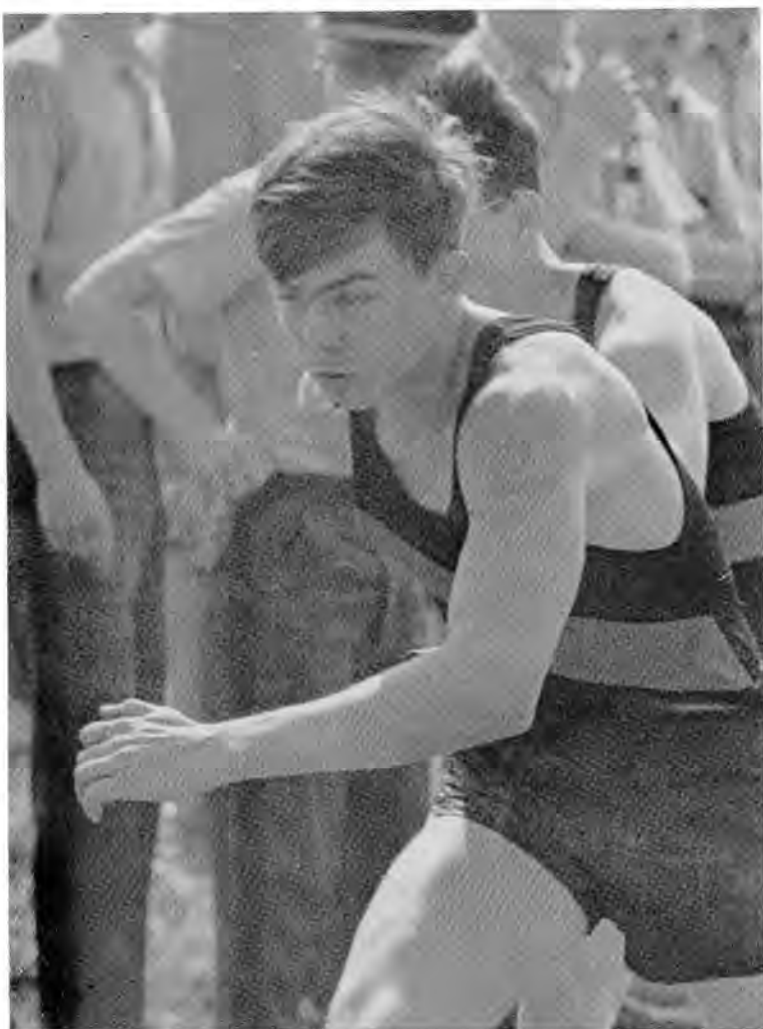

Thinclads End Season

The St. John's Upper School trackmen closed out the season with one first and one second place out of four meets in a wet season.

The top trophy came on the School's home track as a strong showing in the field events led the thinclads to a 75-72 win over Tescott.

Mike Burton and Mark Faulkner were both double winners for the Cadets. Burton won his gold medals in the shot put and the discus while Faulkner collected his six team points in the pole vault and long jump.

Winning single first place medals for the home team were Jim Tisdale in the 100-yard dash, and John Matzen in the high jump. Jim Bunting tied for a first in the high hurdles.

Faulkner three times this year tumbled the St. John's pole vault record before settling for a 11-3 mark at the Wichita Collegiate Invitational. The invitational was the Cadet's last meet and they took a second with 75 points behind Collegiate's 114. Berean Academy took third and Central Christian took fourth.

In the first meet of the season, the Cadets entered the Bennington relays where they took a ninth place on six points by Faulkner in the high jump and the pole vault.

The other meet of the season was the Sacred Heart Invitational where the Cadets had a weak showing in a field of many schools much larger than St. John's. The Cadets were rained out of the Tescott Relays.

Head Coach Bruce Cummings was very pleased with the season, finishing the year with more than 25 boys out for track. In explaining the scheduling, he stated he had tried to schedule two types of meets—the meets where the Cadets competed with schools in their class and could come home with many medals, and the meets with the better trackmen in the state such as Sacred Heart.
