## Rain Storm Dampens 1972 Commencement

Rain forced Commencement exercises at St. John's Military School inside May 28 for only the second time in 22 years. The outdoor ceremonies and the final retreat parade were cancelled when a heavy downpour dampened the campus at noon.

The diplomas were presented to the Senior Cadets in Armstrong Chapel on the campus. Presiding at the ceremonies were Lt. Col. Larry Dwyer, Director of Studies; Col. Keith G. Duckers, Superintendent, and the Rt. Rev. William Davidson, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Western Kansas and president ex-officio of the board.

Rain may have dampened the campus but it did not dampen the festive spirit which prevailed.

Baccalaureate speaker was M. Dean Hargrove, television writer and producer and a 1955 graduate of SJMS. Baccalaureate was held in the morning in the Fine Arts auditorium at Marymount College.

Hargrove told graduates that the attitudes of its old boys show what the School means in the lives of men. "Gene Ely is from Tripoli, Libya", Hargrove said, "He said he would not cross the street to attend a reunion at his other alma mater, Colorado University, but he came halfway around the world to be at St. John's this weekend."

The military structure at SJMS gives its graduates the self-discipline needed to be successful, Hargrove said.

He added, "A time that was memorable has now become a part of your past. St. John's gave you the incentive to grow as an individual and become creative."

He warned graduates not to waste their college years.

"You are going to experiment with new things, but leave the drugs alone. They can be dangerous and deadly."

"Even people in the entertainment field are changing their philosophy about drugs", Hargrove said, "What John Lennon said about drugs five years ago and what he's saying now are completely different philosophies."

Two key assignments for the 85th Corps of Cadets, to be formed next September, were announced at a Cadet formation during the Senior Dance, Saturday, May 27.

Jack Dennison II, Quincy, Ill., was named Battalion Commander, and James Philbrook, Los Altos, Calif., was named Sergeant-major.

## Death Claims Two SJMS Supporters

The "grim-reaper" was busy during May claiming the lives of two of St. John's Military School's most enthusiastic supporters. Miss Maud Beech died May 13 in Wichita after suffering a stroke and Wiley Baner died of a heart attack while playing golf in Scottsdale, Ariz., May 18.

Both had contributed ideas, enthusiasm and a continuing devotion to the School.

Always interested in the Episcopal chapel at St. John's, Miss Beech had the original idea for the "Key Man" recruiting program at the School. She served as a member of the Board of Trustees, the Foundation Board and was serving as a member of the Development Council at the time of her death.

Mr. Baner, the father of an "old boy", is the man who really got the St. John's Foundation "off the ground". The Foundation had been organized but it was during his term as president that it was incorporated and began to make significant contributions to the development of the School. Mr. Baner had as much fun as the "old boys" at the Class of '61 reunion in May of 1971. His continuing interest in the School was shown as he helped Tom organize the reunion and flew a number of the former Cadets to Salina for the event.

These deaths will leave a void in the greater St. John's family.

But the School is fortunate that others are already contributing their ideas, support and enthusiasm to St. John's to carry on the tradition started by Miss Beech and Mr. Baner.

Of the many, we think of Donald Leach, National Fund drive chairman for a new sports complex and man-of-the year, Dr. Paul Kimball, who flies to Salina to chair the Foundation meetings, and Mrs. M. Clare Miller, the Key Man coordinator.

St. John's will thrive as long as there are individuals like Maud Beech and Wiley Baner who will give of themselves to make St. John's the best of all Military Schools.

## Maud Beech Dies May 13 In Wichita

Funeral services for Miss Maud Beech, Wichita, a sister of the late Walter H. Beech who headed Beech Aircraft Corp. many years were at 2 p. m. May 16 at St. James Episcopal Church. She died May 13.

Born at Pulaski, Tenn., she came to Wichita in 1940. She was president of Grandview, Inc. and secretary-treasurer of Wichita Rental, Realty Service Inc., and Northeast Investment Co. Miss Beech was a Board member of St. John's Military School serving from 1954-57.

She was one of the founders of the St. John's Foundation, an organization of parents and friends of the School, and she suggested the School's "Key Man" recruiting program which was started a year ago. At the time of her death, she was serving as a member of the School's Development Council.

Col. Keith G. Duckers, Superintendent, served as one of the pallbearers at the funeral. The 84th Corps was represented by two Cadets, Mike Heywood and Duane Robison.

Miss Beech was a charter member of the vestry at St. Alban's Episcopal Church in Wichita.

## Former Foundation President Dies Of Heart Attack

Wiley T. Baner, prominent Albuquerque businessman and president of the Baner Co., died May 18 in Scottsdale, Ariz. Mr. Baner was a president of the St. John's Military School Foundation. Elected in May 1960, he started work on having the Foundation incorporated. He served on the Foundation Board of Directors from 1960-64.

His son, Tom Baner, is a 1961 graduate of St. John's. Mr. Baner was instrumental in making plans for the reunion of the class of 1961 held during Commencement weekend May 1971. Mr. Baner was a visitor to the campus at that time.

Baner collapsed while playing golf at the Arizona Country Club, Scottsdale. He was rushed to the hospital and was pronounced dead upon arrival.

A resident of Albuquerque since 1935, he was president of the Baner Co., Inc., a construction firm specializing in large building construction.

Besides his son, Tom, he is survived by his widow, Elsie; another son Richard; a daughter, Mrs. D. M. Ferebee, and three grandchildren.

## Tone Was Friendly At Urban Renewal Meeting

### ... Proposed in North Salina

The tone was friendly as a proposed four-block Urban Renewal project in North Salina was discussed at a town hall meeting in Nichols dining hall, May 24.

About 175 curious North Salina residents turned out for the meeting called by the Citizens Advisory committee. The committee, an advisory group to the Salina city commission, may later recommend the area near St. John's Military School for an Urban Renewal project. The first step was polling neighborhood opinion.

The committee is considering two small-scale projects near the SJMS campus. The first would be clearance of two blocks east of the campus bounded by Fifth, Otis, Third and Euclid streets. After clearance the two-block area would be available for re-sale to the School, which has long-range campus expansion plans.

The second project would be clearance of two blocks south of the campus, bounded by Santa Fe, Hamilton, Fifth and Otis streets. The committee is proposing that the two-block area be redeveloped as a North Salina community park.

A head count taken at the meeting showed at least 37 families and individuals own homes or rental property in the proposed project areas.

Col. Keith G. Duckers, Superintendent, said the School was "not going to hurt anybody. St. John's has been in north Salina for 84 years, and that's probably longer than any of us here tonight. We want to stay here, and we want to get along with our neighbors."

Col. Duckers said St. John's had not originally asked to buy the property east of the School. "When the north Salina area was studied several years ago, the city came to us and asked if we would be interested in buying the land under an Urban Renewal project. We said yes, but only under the condition that we wouldn't hurt our neighbors."

Spectators appeared friendly in most of their comments. A poll showed that of the 37 property owners in the area, 30 would be willing to sell their homes and move."
