1971-72 Year Begins With 10 Percent Enrollment Increase

Classes began Sept. 7 at St. John's Military School with a 10 percent increase in enrollment over opening day figures for the 1970-71 year according to Col. Keith G. Duckers, Superintendent.

Col. Duckers said that to the best of his knowledge he knew of no other military school in the country that was opening with an increase. After experiencing three years of declining enrollments, Col. Duckers said he was encouraged and feels that prospects are bright for St. John's.

He said, "Frankly, I'm most encouraged. I'd like it better if we had 200 Cadets, but when I realize that we are probably the only military school which didn't suffer another decline this year, I have to be pleased. I'm convinced that the pendu-

lum is swinging back because our programs are so greatly needed with the current crisis in public school systems."

The Cadets in the 84th Corps come from 19 states and five areas outside the continental United States. The largest delegation is from Kansas with 53 followed by Colorado with 38. Other states represented are Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Arizona, Hawaii, Virginia, California, New Mexico, Illinois, Iowa, Wyoming, Utah, Nevada, Michigan, Texas, Alaska and Minnesota. the U. S. hail from Saudi Arabia, Nigeria, Sumatra, Italy, and Kwajalein Island.

Yearbook, Slide Show Are Journalism Projects

The journalism program at St. John's has been revamped this fall to include more Cadet activity in journalistic projects of the School.

Ten Cadets are currently enrolled in the class, taught by Lt. Robert D. Stevens. The class produces the yearbook. Brian Jacobs has been named editor of the book which is to be published by American Yearbook Company, Topeka.

The hard-bound book will include 128 pages with more color than last year. The theme and color of the cover, as well as design, will be a secret, Jacobs said. He promised more activity pictures and a greater attempt to present the activities during the last three months of school. The final deadline this year is the latter part of February to guarantee a May delivery.

The slide program—a Cadet presentation about the School—has been adopted as another class project as it enters its second year. Last year the program was presented 32 times in 11 cities in three states and on television twice.

The program, which includes a recently revised script and more than 100 color slides, made its debut at a District Lions workshop at Rock Springs Ranch, Sept. 25.

The program is available for use in Kansas all during the school year and Lt. Stevens encourages patrons and friends of the School to book the program for club meetings. The slide presentation takes about ten minutes and this is normally followed by a "question-and-answer" session.

If enough interest is shown, the program will be taken to Oklahoma and Texas during Christmas furlough and then to

Colorado during the spring break.

John Beckner is coordinator for the program. Other members currently involved are Ron Greer, Ken Harper, Mark Harper, Mark Faulkner, James Croke, Tom Fiske, and Jacobs.

Photo coordinator this year is Paul Turner. Dana Tretheway, although not a member of the class, is assisting with the photography. Mike Hawkesworth is in charge of picture sales. The individual Cadet pictures for underclassmen were taken in September. They will be sold later this month for \$5 a package.

The senior pictures were also taken last month. At that time seniors signed a voucher for a \$10 deposit. This month they will receive at least eight proofs from which to choose. Price lists will be available at that time and the seniors will be allowed time to mail the proofs home for parental consideration. The finished pictures will be ready by Christmas.

Croke has been named Cadet coordinator for the newspaper. John Matzen is handling all advertising and Ron Greer is business manager. The entire journalism class will serve as reporters and photographers from time to time.

Peter Knoblock will supervise the public relations activities done by Cadets and Tom Fiske will take charge of the special projects including the yearbook dance. Mark Stigall is currently the Cadet liaison with the military department.

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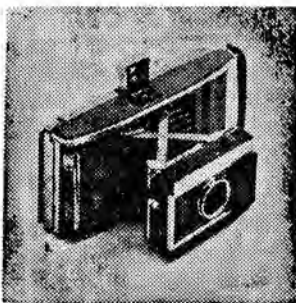
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
