Festival of Thanksgiving Is A Two-Day SJMS Tradition

Plans are being made for the two-day Festival of Thanksgiving at St. John's Military School. The Thanksgiving activities are a tradition at the School.

Visitations with teachers and staff members are scheduled for Wednesday, Nov. 24. Col. Keith G. Duckers, Superintendent, said, "These visits give the staff an opportunity to share with parents their opinions of a Cadet's work and his life at the School."

Classroom visitations and conferences are scheduled from 9 a. m. to 12 noon, Nov. 24. Appointments may be made in the main office.

Activities will get underway on Tuesday evening, Nov. 23, with a Band Concert at 5:15 p. m. followed by Retreat parade at 5:30 p. m. Parent passes will be authorized from 5:45 to 10 p. m.

A "Get Acquainted" coffee sponsored by the SJMS Foundation will be held from 2 to 4 p. m., Wednesday, in the Conference Room, Vail Hall.

Members of the School's Board of Trustees who are also members of the Mule-Skinners Club (a group dedicated to helping make the School better) will host an informal social hour for parents from 5 to 6:30 p. m. Wednesday, Nov. 24 at the Trade Winds Motel.

The "Miss Sound-Off" Dinner will be held at 5:30 p. m.

The Thanksgiving Ball in Memorial Hall will begin with

the faculty receiving line at 8 p. m. to be followed by the "Miss Sound-Off" pageant and the Grand March.

The Crack Squad, commanded by Mike Hawkesworth, will make its first performance for parents following the Grand March.

Dancing will end at 11 p. m. with taps set for 1 a. m.

Activities on Thanksgiving Day will begin with the St. John's Foundation breakfast and meeting at 8:30 a. m. at the Hilton Inn.

The 84th Corps of Cadets led by the School Band, will leave campus at 10 a. m. for the march to the First Presbyterian Church in downtown Salina. The Service of Thanksgiving will begin at 10:45 a. m., 15 minutes earlier than in previous years. The preacher will be the Rev. Loyd Holifield Jr., School Chaplain. Col. Duckers said "Most parents do not have the opportunity to hear the School's chaplain preach during the year. We think our patrons will enjoy this privilege."

The Turkey Dinner will be served at 12 noon in the 4-H Building. Col. Duckers said the chef has been instructed to serve promptly so that football fans can get to a TV set to view the Oklahoma-Nebraska game being nationally televised that afternoon.

Thanksgiving passes end at 9:45 p. m. Thursday, Nov. 25, with taps coming at 10 p. m.

The regular schedule resumes at 6:30 a. m., Friday, Nov. 26, with classes set for both Friday and Saturday.

Cars may not be driven by Cadets unless accompanied by a parent or an adult approved by the parent.

Overnight passes are not granted during the Thanksgiving Festival.

North Central Report Prompts Further Study

Staff and faculty members are in the process of studying recommendations made during the study and evaluation conducted last year for the North Central Association of Secondary Schools and the Kansas State Department of Education according to Lt. Paul Sommers, NCA steering committee chairman.

The visiting committee in its evaluation report said: "The faculty, administration and board of trustees deserve praise for organizing and conducting the self-study in an efficient and objective manner. It was a pleasure to visit St. John's Military School and to work with the staff in the interest of educational improvement. It is our hope that the self-evaluation study and the team evaluation have set in motion a process which will strengthen the School's educational program, improve morale of faculty and students and insure for St. John's a bright future in the Salina community."

Lt. Sommers said that the strengths of the School are the small classes, dedication and preparation of the teaching faculty, an adequate library and the time made available for study periods, both free and supervised. The least commendable aspects were inadequate financing and limited facilities.

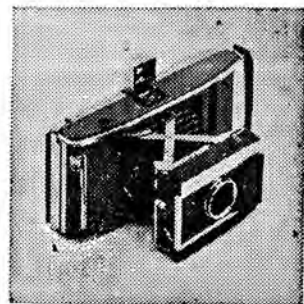
