ROTC Inspection To Take 3 Hours

The Inspection of the junior ROTC unit at St. John's Military School will be conducted in a three-hour span by three officers this year according to Maj. James Hamilton, Senior Army Instructor. The date is set for April 20.

In previous years the inspection has taken most of a day. Maj. Hamilton said the new procedure was previously used by the Fourth Army and since the Fifth Army is now connected with that group, it will be the plan used this year.

The inspecting officers will be Col. George B. Robbins, Professor of Military Science, New Mexico Military Institute, Roswell, N. M.; Maj. Lester Jenkins, Fifth Army headquarters, Ft. Sam Houston, Texas, and Captain Magee, also from NM-MI.

The time for the inspection has not been established according to Maj. Hamilton.

When the officers arrive on campus, they will be greeted by a Cadet Honor Guard and the Band. They will meet with the Superintendent of St. John's, Col. Keith G. Duckers, and other school officials before being briefed by the Cadet Battalion Commander, Lt. Col. Michael Hawkesworth.

Following these ceremonies, the officers will inspect administrative records in the military department, instruction curriculum, and supplies.

The Cadets will be inspected in ranks before the exit interview with the Superintendent and members of the ROTC staff.

Maj. James Hamilton, senior Army Instructor in the ROTC group at St. John's for two years, has been assigned new duty in Vietnam beginning June 30. He will be graduated from Marymount College May 21. His wife, Cindy, and family will remain in Salina during his Vietnam tour.

Nominated by the Army to replace Hamilton is Maj. Richard L. Stamm, a native of Washington, Kans. His nomination has been accepted by School officials pending an earlier arrival date than that established by the Army.

Maj. Stamm is an infantry officer and Army Aviator and has served in Japan, Korea, Germany and Vietnam.

He is currently completing work on his bachelor's degree at Auburn University in Alabama. He is married and the father of two children.

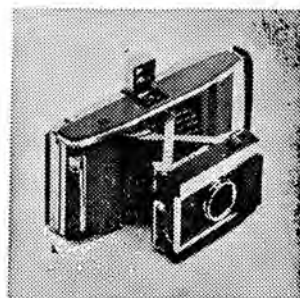

Ken Cochran Speaks To SJ Lettermen

Ken Cochran, basketball coach at Marymount College, was the speaker at the annual Lettermen's dinner at 6:30 p.m. Saturday, April 15.

Cochran, after only two years of coaching at the formerly all girls school, took the Spartan basketball team to a 30-0 regular season and 32-2 overall. His team was ranked sixth nationally in the NAIA regular season poll. The team competed as the NAIA representative in the National AAU tournament.

During the past three years, Cochran has compiled a 73-12 record. While serving as head coach at Marymount, his teams have lost only seven games.

Prior to coaching at Marymount, Cochran was head basketball coach at Kansas Wesleyan for seven seasons. He won Kansas Conference titles in 1967 and 1968. In 1970 his team posted the best mark of all Kansas colleges with a 21-4 mark. He was voted both KCAC "coach of the year" and District 10 NAIA "coach of the year" for the '70 season.

In addition to his basketball coaching success, Cochran has an enviable high school and college baseball coaching record. He won two state titles and one runnerup in high school and legion coaching; and his college teams at Wesleyan during five seasons won three championships and two second place finishes.

He was a four-sport letterman at Joplin, Missouri High school. He attended Graceland College, Lamoni, Iowa and Kansas State College, Pittsburg, where he earned collegiate letters in basketball, football and tennis.

Cochran was a member of the 1956 Olympic exhibition baseball team that played in Melbourne, Australia.

Lettermen in all varsity sports at St. John's were honored at the dinner.

Watson Matches Fired

Eighty-eight shooters participated in the Third Tom Watson small bore invitational tournament April 7-9. Teams represented were Christian Brothers College, St. Louis; Parkwood and Memorial High Schools, Joplin, Mo., High School; Kansas State College; University of Kansas; Capital City Gun Club Junior Team; Lincoln University, Jefferson City, Mo.; Leavenworth High School; and St. John's.

Individual shooters came from three states.

The first match was held in April of 1970. There were 42 competitors from three states. Last year the number of shooters doubled over the first year.

The match is named for M/Sgt. Tom F. Watson who retired from military duty in 1969 after 24 years of service. His last assignment was as senior enlisted instructor at St. John's Military School where he served also as rifle team coach.

During his 24 years he served in World War II, Korea and Vietnam. He is one of the few infantry soldiers to have the third award of the combat infantryman's badge.

St. John's came out the big winner in the tournament as they collected five trophies and numerous medals.

Sophomore Roy Knight paced the Cadet sweep of the junior division of the tourney winning the junior division aggregate score with a 543 as well as being a member of the four-man team which topped its category. From Weatherford, Texas, this is Knight's first year on the Cadet squad which is coached by Sgt. Charles Eidson.

Other members of the junior winning four-man team were Gordon Crumby, Robert James and Brandon Bowers. Their score of 2109 was four more than the Christian Brothers College of St. Louis 2105 2nd place finish.

The Cadet's two-man team, consisting of Crumby and James topped that field with a 1066. Second was Memorial High School of Joplin with a 1060.

James R. Wood, Emporia, topped the senior division with an aggregate score of 561. The Delphos four-man team was top with 2118 in the senior category and two-man team honors went to Kansas State College of Pittsburg. Eleven points behind in

the senior category two-man team race was the St. John's team of Mark Stigall and Kent Mosher.
