Senior Cadet Wins State VFW Contest

Senior Cadet, Douglas Lahey, was named the state winner of the VFW Voice of Democracy speech-writing contest. Bill Dugger of the local VFW post, made the announcement during dinner Jan. 27 in Nichols Hall.

Lahey was the first place winner in the contest held in Salina during December. At that time he won over contestants from the other high schools in Saline County. The tape of the speech was then submitted in the district event which Lahey won and then the state contest.

Entrants wrote and tape recorded three to five minute essays on responsibilities to freedom.

As Kansas winner, Lahey will go to Washington, D. C. March 4-7 to represent Kansas in the national contest.

In addition to the all-expense paid trip, he will have the opportunity to win one of several scholarships being offered in the national contest as well as receiving a scholarship from the Kansas VFW.

Lahey was awarded a \$250 scholarship to the college of his choice as the winner of the local contest.

Lahey, 17, son of Dr. and Mrs. Duane Lahey, Littleton, Colo., is the sergeant-major of the 84th Corps. He is a member of the Crack Squad, the wrestling team and the Key club. He enrolled at St. John's during the last part of his junior year.

He will be sponsored in the national contest by the VFW Post and Auxiliary 1432 of Salina.

Mrs. A. Y. Hardy Died Jan. 10 In Denver

Funeral services for Mrs. A. Y. (Annabelle) Hardy were held Jan. 12 in Denver. Mrs. Hardy died Jan. 10 at Fitzsimmons Hospital after suffering a stroke shortly before Christmas.

An English teacher at St. John's Military School from 1954 to 1966, Mrs. Hardy joined the staff after teaching in the Denver school system for many years. She resigned her position at St. John's in May of 1966 for health reasons.

Her husband, the late Colonel Hardy, worked with the military department and the commandant's office at St. John's before his death in 1961. The Hardy Rifleman trophy is given each year in his memory. And the Hardy Sabre which is passed each year from the retiring Cadet commanding officer to the new commanding officer was given as a memorial to this man.

The Hardys were associated with Colorado Military academy in Denver for many years before coming to St. John's.

In addition to their work at the school, Col. and Mrs. Hardy visited prospective Cadets each summer in Albuquerque and Santa Fe, N. M. and in southern Colorado.

A memorial fund to honor Mrs. Hardy in the Clem Library has been established.

Mrs. Hardy is survived by two sisters and several nieces and nephews.

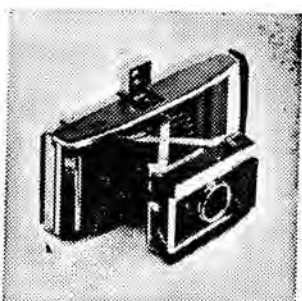

South High Principal Talks to SJMS Teachers

The St. John's Teachers Association sponsored a faculty forum recently for St. John's teachers featuring Dr. Floyd Coppedge, principal of Salina South High School.

He spoke on independent study for every student and cited examples from the program now on a trial basis at South high. The school is one of 34 model schools across the nation under the guidance of the National Association of Secondary School Administrators.

He invited teachers from the St. John's faculty to come to South to observe their program in action and talk with some of the participants. Preliminary plans are underway for this visit, according to Mrs. John Weckel, association president.

Individualized study has been underway on an individual basis for the last year in both the English and social science de-

partments and was instituted this fall in the math department. This is above and beyond the normal extra help and special tutorial programs the school offers.

The association also served hot chocolate and donuts to the Cadets during a night of final week study. The refreshments were purchased from the association's treasury.
