Federal Inspection Day Is Early This Year; To Be March 1

The annual formal inspection of the junior ROTC program at St. John's Military School is scheduled about six weeks earlier this year according to Maj. Richard L. Stamm, Senior Army instructor. The date has been set for March 1.

Inspection dates in all junior ROTC schools have been scheduled early this year so that inspection results can be compiled and the results returned to the Schools by Commencement.

Inspection Team Five from the Third ROTC region with headquarters at Ft. Riley will visit St. John's. Team members are Maj. Adam Klys and Capt. Brian Cooper.

In recent years the inspection period has been shortened from a whole day to a half-day schedule.

The inspection team will arrive on campus at 9 a.m. and will inspect the honor guard. At 9:15 a.m., the team will meet with Col. Keith G. Duckers, Superintendent; Lt. Col. Paul H. Kellogg, Commandant, and Maj. Kenneth C. Faerber, Director of Studies/Admissions.

Briefing the visiting officers in the Armory will be Cadet Battalion Commander, Roy Knight III and the Battalion Sergeant-Major, Bob Hansen and other members of the Battalion staff.

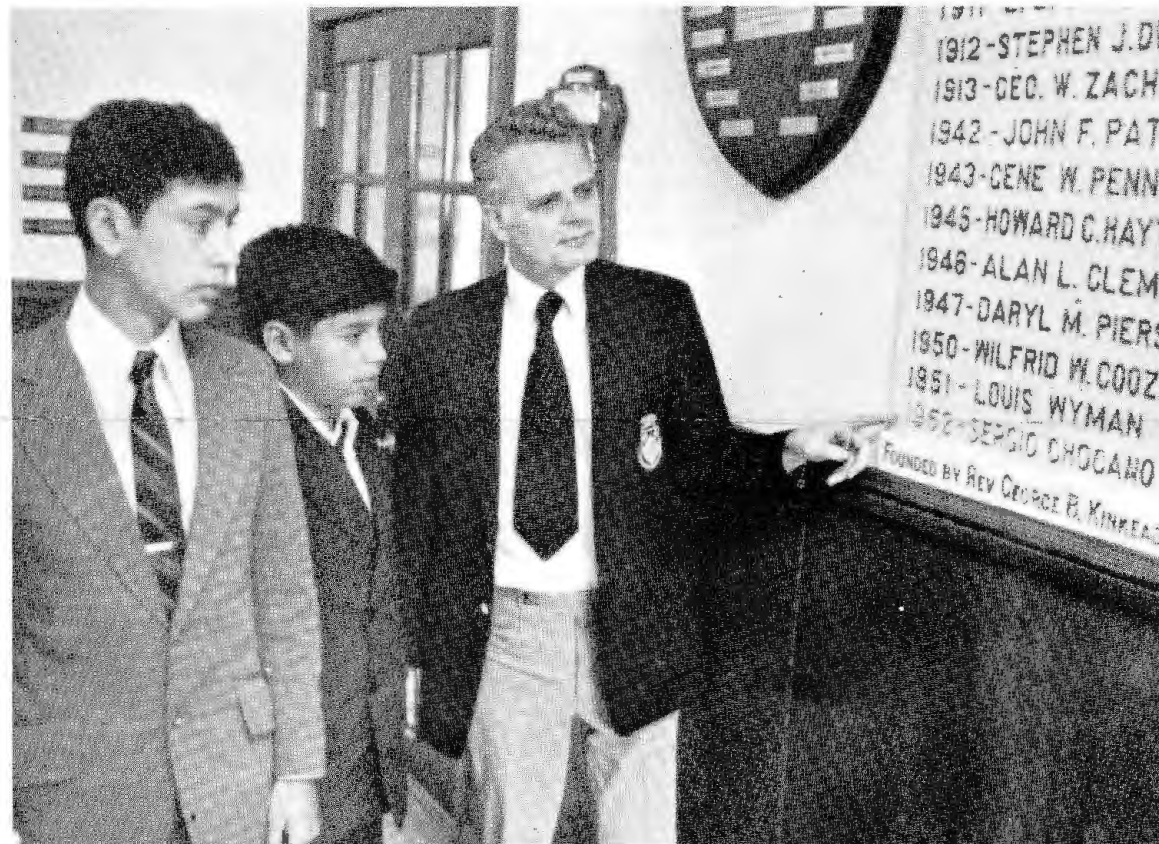
One officer will inspect supplies and administrative records while the other visits the Cadets in their rooms.

Inspection in ranks in the formation area will begin at 10:45 a.m.

A pass in review is scheduled for 11:30 a.m. in case of inclement weather the Crack Squad will perform in the gym.

The inspection form will be completed at 11:45 a.m. and the exit briefing will be held at 12 noon.

St. John's has been designated an honor school each year it has been in the program.

The Chocano Tradition Continues at St. John's

At first, Julio and Carlos Chocano are having a little difficulty understanding their teachers and other Cadets at St. John's Military School. The two new Cadets arrived at the beginning of second semester and didn't speak or understand English.

Julio, 14, and Carlos, 16, are from Guatemala City, Guatemala, and have come to Salina to attend school and learn English at the same time.

Although they're a little baffled by the language barrier, Carlos is confident that, once they learn the customs, they will like it.

After all, four other members of the Chocano family did!

Twenty-seven years ago, Sergio and Federico, the oldest brothers of the Chocano family, came to St. John's, conquered the same language problem and were able to complete five years of school work in four. Known as Sam and

Fred, both captured many honors. Sergio was the Cadet Battalion commander in 1951-52 and was the winner of the Gordon prize, given by Salina industrialist J. J. Vanier, to the Cadet best combining excellence in academics, leadership and athletics.

Sergio and Federico went on to graduate from the University of Colorado and are now engineers in Guatemala.

Two older sisters attended Marymount college and another sister would like to attend Salina's Sacred Heart high school if a foster family can be found.

Julio and Carlos were brought to Salina by a cousin, Mrs. Hutch-

inson, who explained that Mr. Chocano believes in the American way of life and education. She said that children in affluent families in Guatemala are waited upon by servants and never learn the value of hard work which Mr. Chocano considers important.

Carlos and Julio are taking one English course taught in Spanish. Most of their other courses this semester are concentrating on vocabulary and readings to help them learn the language.

The School's chaplain, the Rev. Loyd Holifield Jr., knows Spanish well enough to serve as a translator and make the transition to American life easier.

Julio would like to go on and study medicine, while Carlos wants to become an engineer.

... A tribute

(Editor's Note — The following tribute to Ted Jones, who was killed in an auto accident last fall, was written by Capt. W. C. (Bill) Beaver II, Class of 1963. Bill is working for a doctorate in British Imperial History at the University of Oxford, Oxford, England. His address is Wolfson College, University of Oxford, Oxford, OX26NN, United Kingdom.)

When you walk in Vail Hall you can find Ted Jones's photograph there with the Class of 1961. I commend it to your attention for Ted was a remarkable fellow. Indeed, we younger cadets regarded Major Jones as an anachronism — he was an all-around Cadet, a four-year man, proficient at sports, superior at academics, in numerous activities, and an efficient leader. We who found our new corporal stripes heavy regarded Ted as the last example of a calmer, more stable Cadet from an unchanging past, a mellow past which probably existed mostly in our minds.

Nevertheless, stable and proficient he was in an era of extra-curricular change as the Corps began to leave the relaxed Civil Air Patrol atmosphere for the more formal Army environment. This metamorphosis presented the Cadet officers with leadership problems. We were provided with an instructive black-white comparison between some who tried to lead by popularity alone and Jones who accomplished the important tasks with what seems now, as then, to be a maturity beyond his years. He was the last C. O. to rule with a small staff (Captains White, Bryant, and Ross). I trust that Colonel Guernsey found that these four officers, with a total of seventeen years at St. John's, served our School well.

Ted was proud of St. John's because it afforded him with opportunities no normal high school could provide. He recognized it then and made the most of it. His subsequent successful career in academics, ecology, and the law shows that he made a practice of seizing the initiative. Major Jones is dead but the lesson of his life at St. John's remains.

Show Concern for Others

As I make my way through the Corps every day, I often talk with a lot of people on different subjects. THE subject in which I have most wondered and which is most commented on is: why don't people work with one another and at least try to help each other?

It appears like some of us try to live only for ourselves. We don't seem to care what happens to our best friends just as long as we don't get brought in the middle of it even though we know that we might be able to help him. We can't even show a little kindness to one another, let alone try to take another person's feeling into consideration, and help him out once in a while. I think that we all should try to be more aware of others around us and try to help out when we are able. I know that it won't hurt to step off a pedestal every now and then to lend a helping hand to someone in need. I know that you might think you are everything, have everything, and are a success but if you can't show a little brotherly love and concern for people around you, you are nothing. Love will endure all things and is kind to those who help others as well as themselves, so show some love. It doesn't hurt and you might even be a better person for it.

When these students are graduated, they may have as many as 12-15 college hours of credit which are transferrable to other colleges, according to Capt. Sommers.

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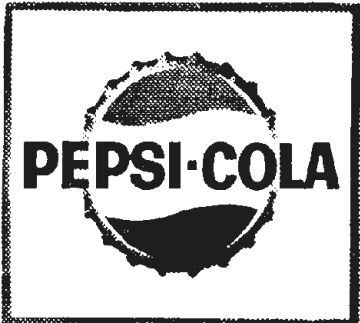
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A LAST SALUTE

Copy of 1910 SJMS Ad Given

Betty Braddock, director of the Cultural Heritage and Arts center, Dodge City, and a member of St. Cornelius Episcopal Church, has contributed a copy of an ad about St. John's Military School found in a 1910 issue of "The Kansas Magazine."

The ad reads: "This institution, founded in 1887, has adequate facilities for supplying the most complete training for boys, up to college age. It undertakes not only their mental development but physical culture and advancement in the qualities of character which belong to a good citizen. To this end it supplies an environment whose influence is strong enough to impress the average boy with permanent results.

"Only suitable boys are desired. St. John's does not undertake to deal with boys who need harsh discipline. Its method relies upon the honor and responsiveness of the boy."

"Some military schools use machine methods. St. John's does not. While organized on military lines, it nevertheless has the atmosphere of a family, and home-like features which are much appreciated by the Cadets."

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Knight Fires Top Score in Postal Match

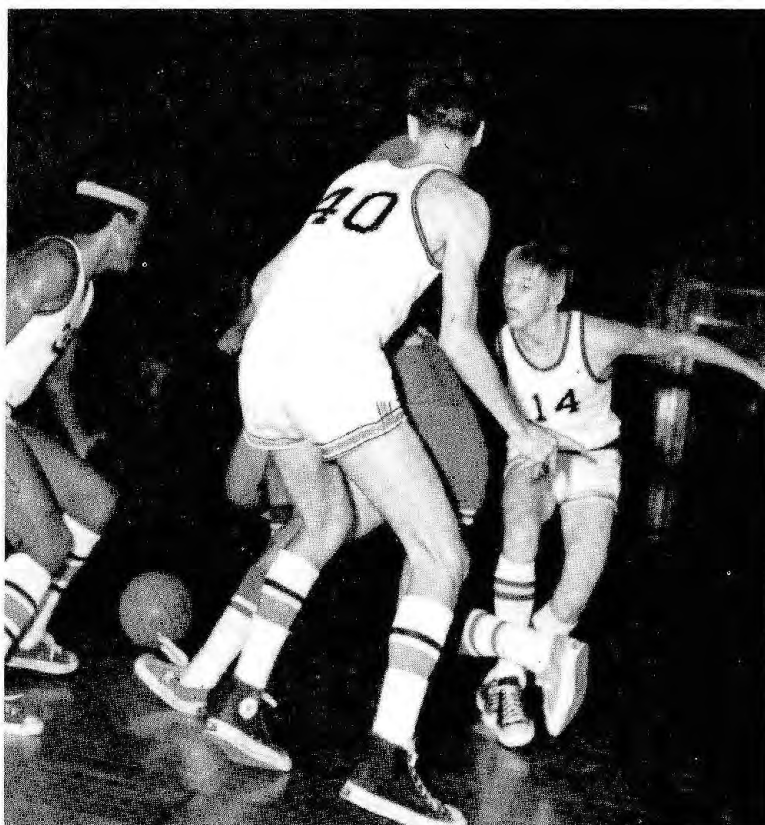
