Salina Drive Begins For Sports Complex Funds

The Salina section of the fund drive to raise \$650,000 to build a sports complex at St. John's Military School has started.

The co-chairmen of the Salina drive were named by the national co-chairmen, Honald Leach, Pueblo, Colo., and Mrs. M. Clare Miller, McPherson. They are Col. John F. "Mike" Scanlan, executive vice president of the Salina Airport Authority, and R. Bruce Johnson, Saline County farmer and a St. John's graduate in the Class of 1920. His brother, Carl Johnson, is a graduate in the Class of 1922.

Leach said that it is hoped that half of the \$650,000 can be raised in Salina. The other portion of the money will be raised in other categories of the drive.

Johnson was a member of the St. John's Board of Trustees from

1948 to 1951 and has served on the School's development council. He was a representative in the state legislature for eight years being elected four times. He and his son, Wayne, farm west of Salina.

Johnson said, "During all of these years, I have been an admirer of the work that has been done with thousands of youth at this Salina based institution. I have accepted this challenge because I feel there are other Salinians that feel the way I do about St. John's".

Col. Scanlan, 143 Fairdale, was base commander of Schilling Air Force Base from 1964-66 and supervised the base closing. He began the "Waiting Wives" housing project at the base as the Air Force moved out and the Vietnam War accelerated. He returned to Salina as vice-president of the Authority in October of 1968 following retirement from the Air Force after 28 years of duty.

Varied Materials Available in Library

A number of new releases have made an appearance on the shelves of Clem Library. Included in the materials are records, filmstrips, maps, prints and reproductions of documents.

A large collection of science material deals with astronomy, planets, gravity, heat, electricity, volcanoes, oceans, water, the human body, atomic power, rockets, navigation, man in space, satellites, and clocks and watches.

Books on history and biography include "Eisenhower, American Hero", "St. Helena Story", "American Heritage Book of Indians", and "Pictorial History of the American Indian".

A class session is held in the Clem library for students in the Lower School each week. The third through fifth graders come on one day and a class period is devoted to each of the sixth, seventh and eighth grades.

During the period the Cadets are taught library skills, see films or video tape recordings, check out books, or just talk about books.

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Young Cadet Scientists Try Many Experiments in School's laboratories

"Beware—scientists at work!"

The doors of the St. John's science labs perhaps should carry this warning during the extra study periods before school and during the noon hour.

"More Cadets are attending these sessions than we have enrolled in the science classes", according to Maj. Kenneth Faerber, Director of Studies Admissions.

Lt. Col. R. L. Guernsey, Science Department chairman, said, "The Cadets really enjoy it. We have a good set up. The eighth, ninth and tenth graders are the most interested in the program. I think the seniors just are involved in other activities."

"We have made the lab facilities available to students with the interest and desire to investigate. Projects are limited only by the availability of materials. No credit is given for this work but there is a reward in satisfying of scientific curiosity. Many Cadets just come to observe the work of others."

John Livingston has been trying to produce hydrogen, methane, gas, oxygen and nitro-cellulose from a variety of elements. He is generally regarded by fellow lab workers as "The Chemical Menace". John has been known to break a few flasks and doesn't have much money to go on pass as a result of his chemical experiments.

Tom Giblin has done glass blowing; produced acetylene and methane gas, and made a thermometer.

Chuck Hanna raised a culture of protozoans and made microscopic examinations. He's also tried the glass blowing project.

Marc Siewert's folly was trying to fill a balloon with hydrogen. When he let it go it "went off like a rocket" nearly taking Marc along. (That's an unusual way to go AWOL, Marc.)

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He has also made a colloidal garden from water, glass, magnesium sulfate, nickel nitrate, copper sulfate, cobalt, aluminum sulfate, and ferric sulfate. He's produced nitrogen.

Master Teachers

Supervising all this learning activity are two master science teachers. Col. Guernsey is the faculty member with the longest tenure at St. John's. He is a graduate of the University of California and earned his master's degree in biology from Kansas State Teachers college, Emporia.

Returning to St. John's this year was Mrs. Fred Trump. She earned a B.S. degree in chemistry from Michigan State University and has done graduate work at the University of Hawaii, Marymount College, and Kansas State U. She taught at SJMS during the 1970-71 term. After teaching at Salina Central High School, she returned to St. John's because she enjoys the smaller classes and the flexibility of the learning program. She teaches chemistry, physics, general math and Algebra I.

In supervising the projects, Col. Guernsey may be heard to say, "Now I assume that was washed out carefully before you started this new project."

Randy Krueger made a colloidal garden and produced a plastic product.

Many Observers

Frequent observers are Mark Huber, Larry Nealley, Ed Weil, Grant LaMora, and John Shaver.

One Cadet rushed through the door saying "Excuse me, I've got to get into my other world."

Krueger's latest project was to make hydrogen and nitro-cellulose from distilled wood fermented corn.

Matt Baker created a vacuum by using an Erlamier flask and water. He's also worked on sugar distillation.

Steven Engle made a fire extinguisher using various chemicals and created a chemical garden.

Steve Gray has been working with glass-blowing, stretching and etching designs. He's done some work with electrolysis of water.

Bob Furedy has been working with wood distillation, water distillation and glass blowing. He and Gray have worked together on projects involving electronics.

But back to the "Chemical Menace"—Livingston. He was trying to make carbon monoxide by direct union of carbon and oxygen but instead he created a Carbon bomb.

Well, boys, keep up the work. One of you may accidentally find a solution to the current energy crisis.

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SJMS Riflemen Start Firing Competition

The St. John's Rifle team has started competition and has placed in several matches. Scores are not available yet for several events that have been fired.

The Cadet team of Mark Thomas, Tom Rudolph, Bill Hanna and Allen Leavitt placed first in the Central Kansas Gallery Rifle League in a match fired at Abilene, Nov. 15. Top scorer for the Cadets was Thomas with a 269. The team total was 1011.

The Cadets won a match Nov. 19 in the Cadet Armory, fired against a team from Ft. Riley. Scoring were Roy Knight, 277; Thomas, 264; Rudolph, 247, and Hanna, 256 for a team total of 1044.

The Cadets lost a North Central Kansas League match at Delphos, Nov. 26. The team score was 1007.

In a match fired at Leavenworth High School, Nov. 17, the Cadet first team placed third among the 12 teams entered. Firing a total of 1023 were Knight, Thomas, Rudolph and Hanna. Knight placed third in individual scoring with a 266.

The second team fired 892. Members of the team were Larry

The scores from the Texas A & I and Robert C. Cole high school postal matches have not been received. The Cadets also fired in the Oklahoma State University matches at Stillwater, Dec. 9. Those scores are not yet available.
