Apollo 15 Astronaut to Visit SJMS

J. Irwin to talk to Corps of Cadets

Astronaut James B. Irwin, lunar module pilot for Apollo 15 (July 26-Aug. 7, 1971) will be on the St. John's Military School campus Wednesday, Oct. 10.

He will be met in Kansas City by Col. Keith G. Duckers, St. John's superintendent, and be flown to Salina in private aircraft arriving at 12:45 p.m. He will speak to a joint meeting of Lions, Rotary and Kiwanis clubs at 1 p.m. at the Hilton Inn. Irwin will show a movie and describe the Apollo flight to the moon.

He will be honored by a parade by the 86th Corps of Cadets at 6:15 p.m. and will be the honored guest at dinner following.

Following dinner, he will speak in Armstrong Memorial Chapel to Cadets, trustees and their wives, faculty and staff personnel and their wives or husbands.

SJMS Gets Honor Rank

St. John's Military School was designated an Honor Unit for the 1972-73 School year. Notification was received from Col. Paul M. Fletcher, Headquarters, U.S. Army Third ROTC region, Ft. Riley, during the summer.

The honor ranking was based on an evaluation of the Junior ROTC program by the 5th Army's annual formal inspection board last spring.

Colonel Fletcher wrote, "I extend my congratulations to you, the faculty, the ROTC instructor personnel and the Cadets for an outstanding performance during the school year."

Knight Heads Battalion Staff

Members of the Battalion staff for the 86th Corps of Cadets and the Company commanders were assigned by Lt. Col. Paul H. Kellogg, Commandant.

Roy Knight is the Battalion commander and the Battalion executive officer is Mark Thomas. Members of the staff are Mark Harper, S-1; Walt Webb, S-2; Dana Tretheway, S-3; Fred Johnson S-4 and Robert Hansen, sergeant-major.

Company commanders are Michael Heywood, "A"; Duane Bay-singer, "B"; James Wellman "C" and Lance Bove, Headquarters.

Since Aug. 1, 1972 Irwin has been president of High Flight Foundation, Colorado Springs. High Flight is a non-profit group which he founded to share his faith in God through speeches, publications and retreats. The name "High Flight" was taken from the title of a poem and the word "high" implies an elevation of spirit and "flight" connotes activity and involvement in life.

Irwin was one of the 19 astronauts selected by NASA in April, 1966. He served as the lunar module pilot in 1971 and his companions were David Scott, spacecraft commander, and Alfred Worden, command module pilot. Apollo 15 was the fourth manned lunar landing mission and the first to visit and explore the moon's Hadley Rille and Apennine mountains.

The lunar module, "Falcon", remained on the lunar surface 66 hours and 54 minutes and the two astronauts logged 18 hours and 35 minutes each in extra vehicular activities during three separate excursions.

USED ROVER

Using Rover-1 to transport themselves, Scott and Irwin performed a selenological inspection and survey of the area and collected approximately 180 pounds of lunar surface materials.

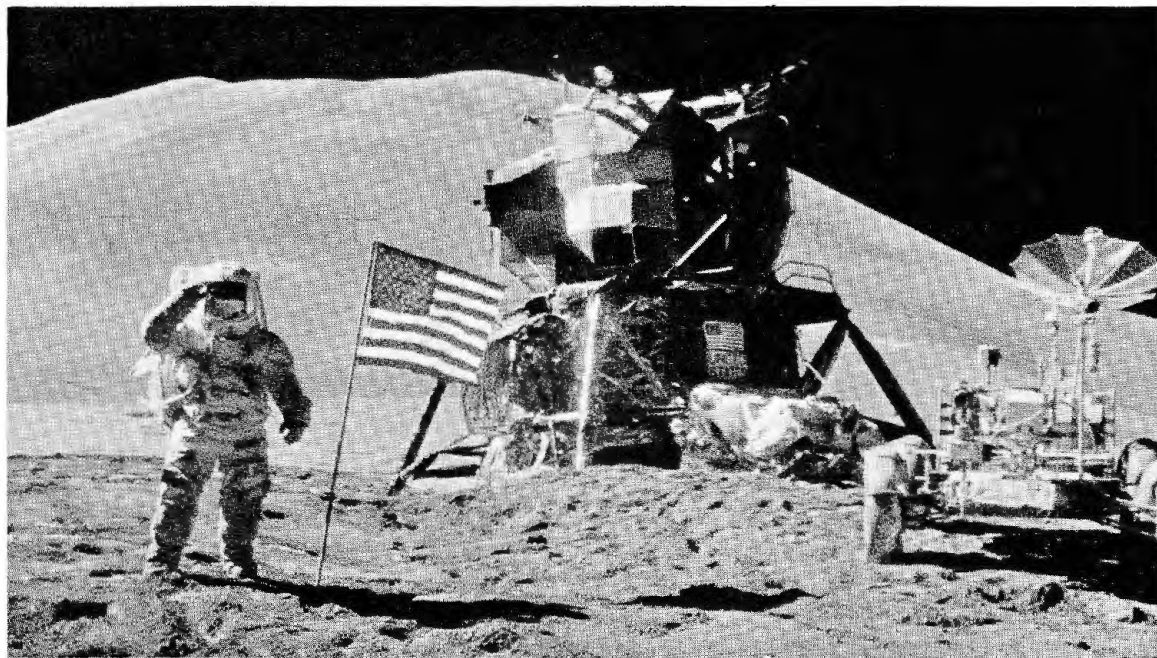
Apollo 15 ended with a Pacific splashdown and recovery by the USS Okinawa.

Col. Irwin, who retired from the Air Force and NASA, July 31, 1972, was commissioned in the Air Force following graduation from the U.S. Naval academy in 1951. He was graduated from the Aerospace research pilot school in 1963 and from the Air Force Experimental test pilot school in 1961. He also served as a F-12 test force pilot. During his military career, Irwin accumulated more than 7,015 hours of flying time—5,300 in jet aircraft.

Irwin has been the recipient of many awards and medals. He and his wife, Mary, are the parents of four children.

"On the Moon", says Irwin, "I felt God as I had never felt Him before in my life." Last summer he invited ex-POW's, their families and families of military men still missing in action to a series of week-long retreats at a YMCA camp high in the Colorado mountains. "We felt that the POW and MIA families had been wined and dined and given everything materially", he explained in an interview in Newsweek magazine, "but that they had received nothing spiritually."

Irwin's visit to Salina was arranged by Donald Leach, Pueblo, Colo., a St. John's trustee and a friend of Irwin.

Memorial Fountain Area, To Be Dedicated, Oct. 21

The Memorial Plaza and Edith L. Jordan Memorial Fountain will be dedicated at St. John's Military School at 3 p.m., Sunday, Oct. 21.

The area immediately in front of the "bull-ring" was cleared during the summer. The area was filled, a plaza area and a fountain were added. The fountain plays in a three-pattern cycle and at night is illuminated by orange lights.

The old flag pole was removed and a new 75-foot aluminum pole was installed Oct. 5. A group of Cadets and faculty members planted the area Sunday afternoon, Oct. 7. Hedging and evergreens were added around the benches surrounding the fountain plaza. Grass seed was planted and it is hoped will be green by dedication time.

The St. John's Band will open the ceremonies by playing "The National Anthem". Col. Keith G. Duckers, Superintendent, will make a short talk and introduce the guests. The Rev. Loyd Holifield jr., Chaplain, will give the Prayer of Thanksgiving. A short address and the Blessing of the fountain, plaza and flag pole will be made by the Rt. Rev. William Davidson, Bishop of the Episcopal

Diocese of Western Kansas and president ex-officio of the St. John's Board of Trustees.

Lt. Col. Paul H. Kellogg, Commandant, will give the reading "Our Flag". The Cadet Prayer will be given by Mark Thomas, Battalion executive officer. The benediction will be given by Bishop Davidson.

Col. James B. Irwin will be presented a plaque naming him as Honorary Commander of the 86th Corps of Cadets of St. John's Military on the occasion of his visit to the campus.

Episcopal Schools Official to Visit SJMS

The Rev. John Paul Carter, New York City, Executive secretary of the National Association of Episcopal Schools, will visit the St. John's campus, Oct. 14 and 15. The association is made up of 1200 Episcopally-related schools including choir schools, day schools, military schools and other types of learning institutions.

Fr. Carter will preach at the 12 noon services in Armstrong Chapel, Sunday, Oct. 14. The Rev. Loyd Holifield jr., Chaplain, will officiate. Mrs. Nedra Hough, music teacher, and the choir will provide special music.

Activities for Monday include attending the faculty staff meet-

ing, visiting classes in religion, math, English, industrial arts and Lower School reading. During the afternoon he will meet with various department heads and at 4 p.m. will meet some of the Cadets in the Spencer Cadet Center.

ROTC Under New Command

The Junior ROTC program at St. John's Military School is under new jurisdiction as a result of reorganization in the Department of the Army.

The Continental U.S. Army Command structure was reorganized July 1. Headquarters training and Doctrine Command was developed and is responsible for individual training education and combat development including management of ROTC. The ROTC region headquarters were established at the sites of the ROTC summer camps at Ft. Lewis, Wash.; Ft. Riley, Kans.; Ft. Knox, Ky. and Ft. Bragg, N.C.

St. John's is in the Third ROTC region with headquarters at Ft. Riley. Third Region is made of eight states: Alabama, Arkansas, Kansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas. Within this area are 65 universities and colleges with senior ROTC programs and 207 high school and military school with junior programs.

New Materials Added to Library Shelves

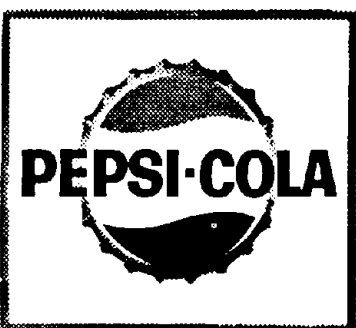

PSAT/NMSQT To Be Given Oct. 23

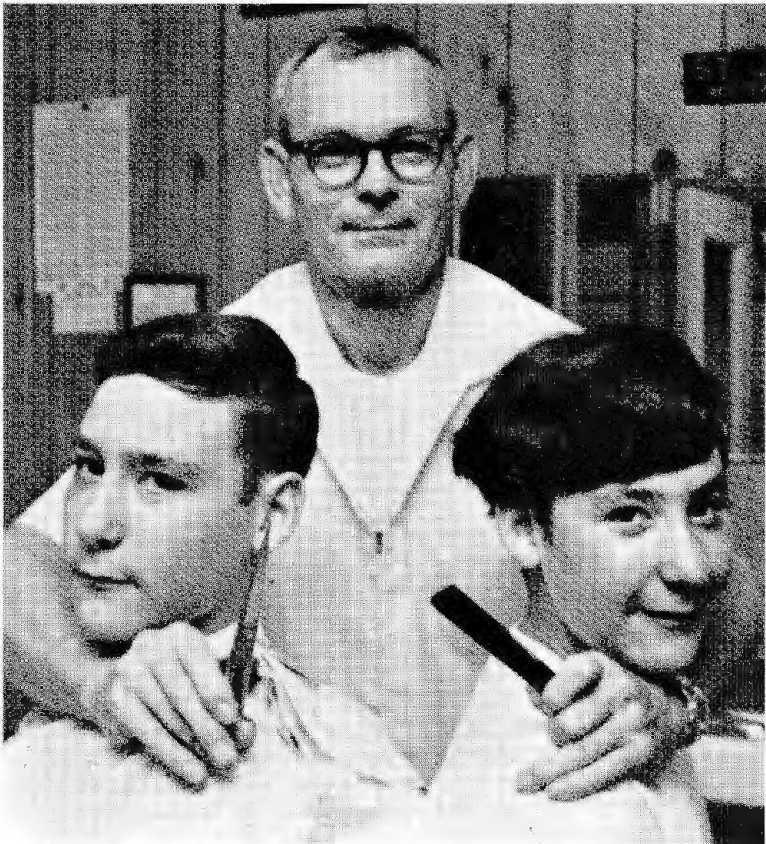

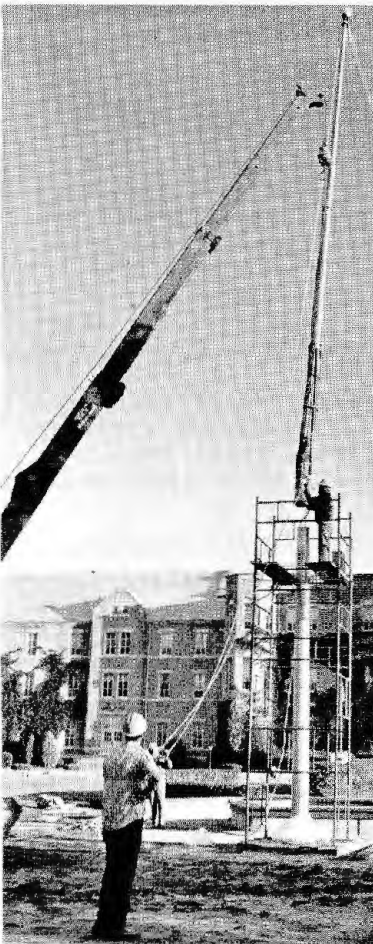

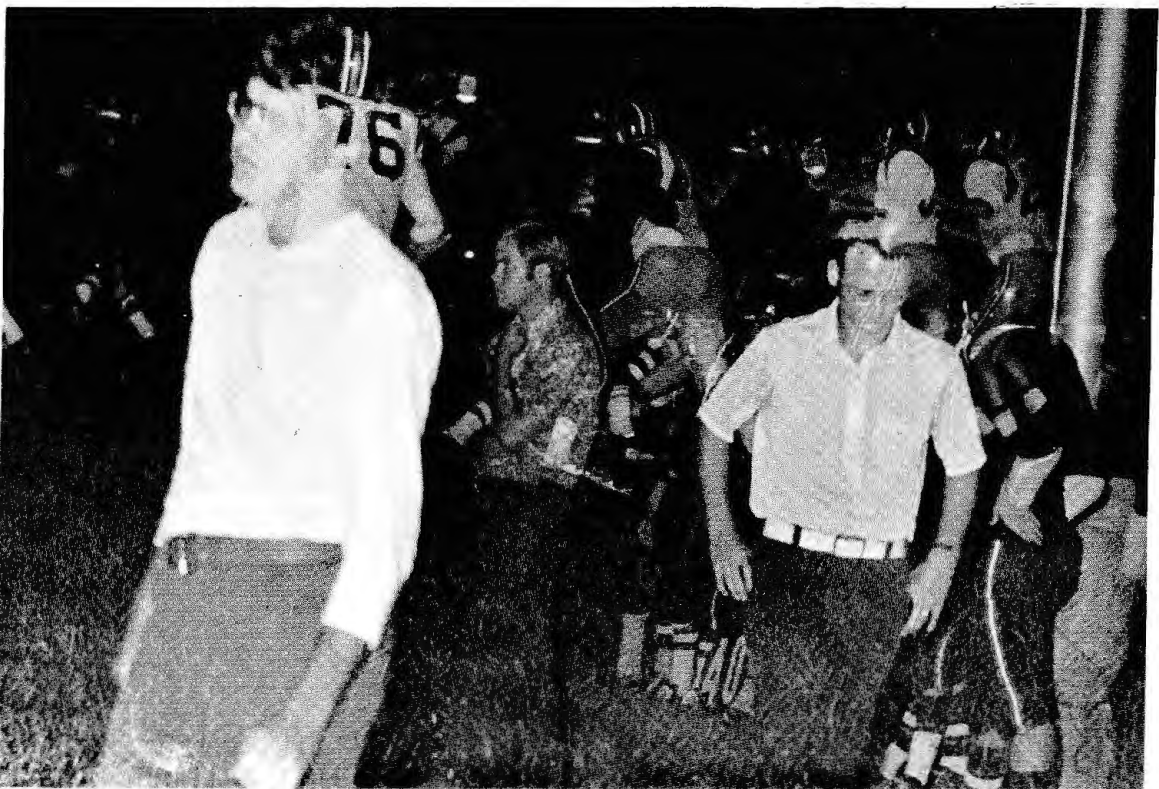

The Tescott Trojans capitalized on a pair of big plays in the first half and St. John's mistakes in the final two quarters to defeat the Cadets 12-6 in an Eisenhower league football game on the Muleskinner field, Sept. 14.

Tescott shocked the Cadets quickly when Roger Oetting picked off a deflected pitchout on the third play from scrimmage and returned the ball 43 yards for a Trojan touchdown. The extra point conversion kick was blocked.

Starting from their own eight-yard line, the Trojans moved the

ball out to the 16-yard line where Oetting took off on an 84-yard run for a touchdown. The Conversion try failed again.
