Three Senior Cadets Vying For Academy Appointments

Three Senior Cadets have started procedures which may eventually result in appointments to one of the three military academies at West Point, Annapolis and Colorado Springs.

Mike Heywood, Kirkwood, Mo., is trying for an appointment at all three schools. He is a candidate for nomination by Rep. James Symington Jr., St. Louis.

Roy Knight III, Weatherford, Tex., hopes to be appointed to the Air Force Academy. He plans to be nominated by Sen. John Tower, Texas, and also is eligible for nomination as the son of a MIA. His father has been missing in action since 1967.

Walt Webb, Dodge City, is a candidate for West Point. He hopes to receive one of Rep. Keith Sebelius' nominations from the first district of Kansas.

All three Cadets have taken the ACT and SAT tests required and will take the achievement test of the Scholastic Aptitude testing program. Much time will be spent taking tests and being interviewed for the positions.

Mark Thomas, Manchester, Ks., is a candidate for the ROTC scholarships which provide for tuition, books and some allowance for living expenses.

Memorials of Beauty Are a Human Tradition

(Editor's Note: The following is a portion of the address given by the Rt. Rev. William Davidson, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Western Kansas and president ex-officio of the St. John's Military School board, at the dedication of the Memorial Plaza, flag pole and the Edith Jordan Fountain.)

"We are here in the human tradition to observe that there has been set up here a fitting memorial. It is and will be a thing of beauty. It will remind us that the God of beauty and of peace is present here; that the living may enjoy the benefits of this construction, while at the same time it can remind us of those in whose memory the offering is made and those who have so generously provided us with these gifts.

"The water of the fountain will shoot forth and rise up to be for us, if we will have it so, the living fountains of which Jesus said: 'Anyone who drinks the water that I shall give will never be thirsty again, for the water I give will turn into a spring inside him, welling up to eternal life'. The flowers and planting will give beauty and fragrance for all who enter to see and breathe and enjoy. Some will say we should have asked that the memorial might have been a new dormitory, but Jesus spoke for beauty when the woman anointed his feet with precious ointment and wiped them with her hair. The disciples said, 'Why wasn't this ointment sold . . . and the money given to the poor' but Jesus told them, 'The poor you

will always have with you, but you will not always have me.'

"The seats and plaza will be for rest and relaxation where Cadets and others may come in time of stress or fatigue or just to be quiet and meditate. Jesus himself sought out the Garden of Gethsemane where he and his disciples could go and pray and rest. He said: 'Come to me all you who labor and are overburdened and I will give you rest.'

"The flagpole will fly the colors of our nation . . . and give us cause to lift our head and our eyes to higher realms and mightier causes than we can see if our heads and eyes are always inward and downward . . . The brave and dedicated astronaut, Colonel Irwin, who was on this campus, saw this flagpole and noted that it pointed to outer space and the moon on which he had walked. This pole will be in his honor but I pray it will also help us to make his convictions our own — that God reigns in this universe, that He controls and guides our lives and purposes and that we can and must put our trust in Him now and forever.

"The fountain, the flowers and shrubs, the plaza and the flagpole you see all blend into a beautiful, practical, wonderful, inspiring whole. We at St. John's receive these gifts most thankfully. We dedicate them to God's glory and in memory of those beloved who are departed this life, but whose presence among us will linger still in the memorials we have here."

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Apollo 15 Astronaut's Movie, Talk Were an Inspiration to 86th Corps



Col. James Irwin Speaks

A downpour of rain (five inches in 24 hours) failed to dampen the enthusiasm surrounding the visit of Col. James B. Irwin, astronaut on the Apollo 15 flight to the moon.

Irwin was a guest of the Cadet Corps at dinner Oct. 10 in Nichols Dining Hall. Following dinner he showed "his home movies of his vacation of the summer of 1971" and provided his own narration.

Before showing his movies in Armstrong Memorial Chapel, Irwin traced his boyhood and early life for the Cadets. He said that he always wanted to fly but ended up a midshipman at the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis. Irwin said he wanted to resign but he said, "my parents wouldn't allow me to sign the necessary forms".

For the adventuresome Irwin, one of 12 Americans to leave footprints on the moon, getting to Salina had comparable perils. The former astronaut and retired Air Force colonel was flown to Salina from Kansas City in a private plane furnished by J.J. Vanier, Salina. Col. Irwin and Col. Keith G. Duckers, Superintendent, who met Irwin in Kansas City and accompanied him to Salina, landed at the height of a driving rain and electrical storm.

Irwin arrived in time to "wow" a joint meeting of Rotarians, Lions and Kiwanians at 1 p.m. luncheon at the Hilton Inn.

But, to Irwin, now something of an evangelist, "any day on earth is a good day — rainy or sunny". He is president of High Flight foundation, Colorado Springs, a new Christian outreach organization.

A slight man now wearing collar-length hair, Irwin speaks easily but firmly of his faith. He told the Cadets, "My experience on the moon strengthened my faith in God as the Great Creator . . . You feel that faith deep down inside you when you're out there in space and see the precision with which He controls things." He stressed the importance of realizing that "God is here, there and everywhere."

The mission was, he said, "A renewed experience with God. I saw the beauty of His creation . . . The trip strengthened my faith in God as the Great Creator . . ." "You feel that faith deep down inside you when you're out there in space and you see the precision with which He controls things . . . There is no doubt in my mind that God created the earth and the moon and all things . . ."

Although he's left the space program and the Air Force, Irwin said he'd go to the moon again.

"But this time, I'd like to go down to the Cape, put on my suit and get aboard. After all, I invested five years of my life — or that time was invested in me — and I never knew until lift-off that I really was going to go."

His movies showed many aspects of the trip: Hadley Mountain, a 15,000 foot peak; Hadley Rill, a cavern 1,000 feet deep and 4,000 feet wide; Genesis rock, the oldest known rock in the universe, returned to earth by Apollo 15; the operation of the lunar rover ("for \$8 million you might expect something unusual in a car," Irwin quipped); the departure from the moon and the splashdown in the Pacific with one of the three parachutes not operating. ("We came

down on two 'chutes and a prayer" he said, "and anticipated a hard impact; we were not disappointed.")

"It was so great to breathe the air of earth, to see the Pacific, to eat some earth food . . . and drink something besides Tang!"

Irwin answered questions from the Cadets for more than 30 minutes following his movie and talk.

How does he feel when he looks at the moon these days? "Well, it takes a few seconds to realize I've been there. And then I realize it's my favorite vacation spot. I call

it 'my moon'. We've gotten rather proprietary since we planted our flag there."

Roy A. Knight Jr., Cadet Battalion Commander, presented Colonel Irwin with a plaque making him the Honorary Commander of the 86th Corps of Cadets. The Rev. Loyd Holifield Jr., Chaplain, read the inscription to be on the dedication plaque to be placed at the base of the new flag pole.

Irwin then presented to Knight for the school an autographed photo of Apollo 15's lunar base on the moon. The color picture is being framed and will be on display in the Clem library.

Irwin's visit to Salina was arranged by Donald Leach of Pueblo, Colo. Irwin was unable to leave Salina following his talk to the Cadets that evening and made the return trip to Colorado Springs

the following morning accompanied by Jack Vanier, a St. John's "old boy" and a member of the Board of Trustees and Colonel Duckers.
