Flag Pageant To be Given At Commencement

The U.S. Army's "Glorious Heritage" in protecting the nation will be demonstrated by a colorful flag pageant held as part of the St. John's Military School 1976 Commencement on May 23.

The program immediately follows the academic procession at 10 a.m. on the Perkins Athletic Field.

As the 1st Infantry Division Band plays the musical background, other soldiers from various Fort Riley units will follow the narrator's description of Army contributions to the development of America by placing appropriate battle streamers on an Army flag.

The concurrent evolution of the Army's "Glorious Heritage" along with the National Bicentennial is dramatized by the appearance of soldiers dressed in period uniforms of the Revolutionary War, War of 1812,

Mexican War, Indian Wars, Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, Korean War and Vietnam. A color guard in modern uniform is included.

Battle streamers will include the Philippine Insurrection, China Relief Expedition and the Mexican Border Expedition as well as the major wars of American history.

The costumed soldiers and flags will be available for public inspection following the Commencement exercises.

The Big Red One Band will play in concert at 9:30 a.m. prior to the Commencement ceremony.

SJMS Band Welcomes Swedish King

The SJMS Band and Color Guard played an important role in the official welcome to Kansas of His Majesty Carl XVI Gustaf, King of Sweden, April 17.

The St. John's Cadets furnished the appropriate honors as the King left his chartered jet at Salina Municipal Airport to transfer to a motorcade for a four-hour visit to nearby Lindsay.

He was welcomed at the Salina airport by Gov. Robert Bennett and Salina Mayor Robert Caldwell. The King was accompanied by members of the Swedish royal court and a group of Swedish newsmen covering his 26-day visit to the U.S.

The Cadet Color Guard was able to obtain a Swedish national flag on loan from Fort Leavenworth and the Band was furnished the official welcome anthem for the King in the Swedish language which required some arranging and translation on short notice.

An artillery battalion commander in Vietnam, he has served in a variety of staff assignments including United Nations Command, Korea and in the Pentagon.

A graduate of Virginia Polytechnic Institute, he received a Master's degree in International Relations from George Washington University. He is also a graduate of the National War College, the Armed Forces Staff College and the Command and General Staff College.

Good Old Days Are Gone, But the Cozy Inn Goes On

(Editor's Note: Parts of the following article appeared in a recent edition of The Salina Journal.)

All 48 states were dry, but an order of Irish coffee probably had more Irish than coffee in it. Young girls had raised hemlines to undignified heights and were known as flappers. The raccoon coat was in, Dixieland was the sound of the day. The Great War was recently ended. At 108 N. 7th, Bob Kinkel bought the three-month-old Cozy Inn. The year was 1922.

The states, now 50, have mostly gone wet, leaving Kansas behind. Hemlines have yo-yoed down and up and are dropping again. The raccoon gave way to letter sweaters, then sweat shirts, now T-shirts—worn by a generation doing The Bump. Wars, great and not-so-great, have come and gone, changing the face of the globe.

But the Cozy Inn lives on at 108 N. 7th.

St. John's "old boys" returning to Salina consider a pilgrimage to the "Cozy" as important as a visit to the School. Sacks of "cozies" have been known to be shipped to old buddies unable to return to Class reunions. Other old boys have been known to order the pungent smelling burgers from afar. Gene Ely knows he can expect a sack of cozies when Bill Meidell comes to Salina.

For those who once were Salinans or students in Salina and now are Californians, New Yorkers, citizens of the many cities and hamlets of the USA, the Cozy and its remembered aroma, lives on in their memories.

Thomas Wolfe said "You can't go home again," but many ex-Salinans and "old boys" do and they head for the Cozy to see if it's still there; if it's still making its rare blend of hamburger mixed with ground-up onion, garnished with a pickle slice and set off with mustard and/or catsup (customer's choice.)

The Cozy is still there. The same hamburger sizzles on its griddle.

Like Henry Ford's color options for his Model T (any color you want as long as its black), the Cozy hamburger comes only

that one way. There is no "deluxe". You can't get cheese on it.

It's been that way for 54 years.

The Cozy Inn marked its anniversary March 24, celebrating the occasion with a three-day splurge at prices that might have been seen in an earlier day. Cozies sold for 20 cents each, soda pop for a dime and coffee for a nickel.

Strangely, a Cozy never sold for 20 cents on a regular basis.

For two decades the Cozy sold for a mere nickel. The hungry customer could get six for a quarter. Not until 1942 did the price rise.

Then it began to bend to the winds of inflation. Prices of everything went up and the Cozy could stand the onslaught no longer. Beef just cost too much.

Presently, the Cozy sells for 30 cents or six for \$1.70.

The Cozy was one of the earliest exponents of the "fast food" concept, now so common in the many drive-in establishments that dot this land. But the Cozy, according to Richard Pickering, present owner, remains the best burger in town.

It has been lunch for generations of downtown Salina businessmen, secretaries and store clerks. The Cadets could stretch allowances a long way by eating Saturday night dinner at the Cozy.

By its golden anniversary in 1972 it was determined that more than 54 million Cozies had been sold. Since then the cash register has rung at a rate of 8,000 burgers a week, Pickering estimates, which means the eatery is closing on the 56 million mark.

Eighteen two-man and six four-man teams were entered in the National Rifle Association sanctioned match with 44 individual shooters.

Robert McNealy, Bryan High School, Omaha, Neb., was the top overall shooter in the match, winning the prone, kneeling and individual aggregate honors in the junior division (age 18 and under).

Teams from Leavenworth High School took trophies in junior four-man and two-man team shooting.

A four-man team representing the Kansas National Guard, Topeka, won their event in the senior division as did a two-man team from the Delphos Rifle Team.
