Former Astronaut, Dedications, Dance To Highlight Commencement 1976

A busy and varied schedule is planned for the 1976 Commencement weekend at St. John's Military School. A talk and visit by an astronaut and dedications will be added attractions to this year's activities.

Activities will begin at 6 p.m. Friday, May 21 when the Drama department presents the play, "The Odd Couple" in the Salina Community Theater. Directing the production is Mrs. Carolyn Scofield, English teacher.

A mixer for the Cadets, parents, faculty, staff and alumni will be held from 8:30 to 11:30 p.m. Friday in the Memorial Plaza area on the campus. Music will be by the Palace Drug Company group from Manhattan. Passes will end that evening at 12:30 a.m.

A busy day on Saturday will begin with a breakfast meeting of the St. John's Foundation at 8 a.m. in Nichols Hall. Parents wishing to confer with members of the faculty and staff may do so from 10 a.m. to noon. The SJMS Foundation will have a luncheon and meeting at 12 noon at the Hilton Inn.

Awards To Be Given

Awards for outstanding work during the year will be presented at a convocation beginning at 2:30 p.m. Saturday, May 22 on Perkins Field. In case of rain, the awards will be presented in the school gym.

The Commencement convocation (Baccalaureate) will begin at 8 p.m. Saturday, May 22, at Memorial Hall. Speaking will be the eighth man to walk to the moon, Col. James B. Irwin, lunar module pilot for the Apollo 15 mission (July 26-Aug. 7, 1971). Irwin is chairman of the board and chief executive officer of the High Flight Foundation, Colorado Springs, a non-profit organization he founded in 1972, after his retirement from the Air Force and the space program, in order to share his faith in God through various activities.

The Senior Dance will be held from 9:30 to 11:30 p.m. Saturday, in Memorial Hall. The Change of Command of the Crack Squad will take place during the evening. John Evans will pass on the command of the group to a member of this year's junior class.

Passes will end at 1 a.m.

A Communion Service for seniors and others will be at 7:15 a.m., Sunday, May 23 in Armstrong Memorial Chapel. A new organ has been installed recently in the Chapel and Dr. H.C. Drueger, Great Bend, Foundation President, will play a dedicatory recital. Consecration of the organ and the recently installed Browning Memorial window will be a part of the service. A Memorial window depicting St. John has been placed above the altar in the Meditation Room, just inside the door of the Chapel.

A breakfast honoring the seniors will be served at 8:30 a.m. in Nichols Hall. The break-

fast is open to Cadets, faculty and staff.

At 9:30 a.m., Sunday, May 23, the First Infantry Division Band, Ft. Riley, will play a concert while the guests arrive for the Commencement ceremonies on Perkins Field.

Dedication of the new annex to the gymnasium will be at 10 a.m. Work on the addition is nearly finished. Conducting the ceremony will be the Rt. Rev. William Davidson, Bishop of the Diocese of Western Kansas, and president of the St. John's Military School Board of Trustees.

To Give Glorious Heritage

The Commencement procession will begin at 10:10 a.m., Sunday, May 23, on Perkins Field. Preceding the ceremonies, the U.S. Army's "Glorious Heritage" in protecting the nation will be demonstrated by a colorful flag pageant. The concurrent evolution of the Army's "Glorious Heritage" along with the National Bicentennial is dramatized by the appearance of soldiers dressed in period uniforms at the time of various wars.

The "Charge to the Senior Class" will be given by Lt. Raymond E. Garvey, III, Class of 1971. Garvey, a graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, is now assigned to the 17th Engineer Battalion, 2nd Armored Division, Ft. Hood, Tex. Garvey, a Cadet for three years, was awarded the Shank Prize, given to the member of each class with the highest academic average during each year he was here. He was awarded the Gordon Prize in 1971 as the Cadet who best combined the qualities of school spirit, leadership, excellence in studies and athletics.

To Present Diplomas

The diplomas will be presented to the graduating seniors by Col. Keith G. Duckers, Superintendent, and Bishop Davidson, as president of the Board.

Honor School presentations and Army ROTC Scholarship awards will be given by Brig. Gen. Gerald Childress, commander of the Army's Third ROTC Region. He is headquartered at Ft. Riley and oversees ROTC and Junior ROTC programs in a number of states, including Kansas.

These presentations will be followed by the retreat parade and the dismissal of the 88th Corps forever.

An open house will be held in the gymnasium annex following Commencement.

A special luncheon at the Salina Country Club will be at 12:30 p.m. Sunday, May 23. Col. Irwin will present the Kansas flag he took to the moon to former Kansas Governor

High Flight President To Speak

A World War II pilot who was shot down and captured but succeeded in leading his Nazi camp commander to Christianity will speak at St. John's during Commencement Week.

Dr. William H. Rittenhouse, president of the High Flight Foundation, Colorado Springs, Colo., will be featured in an all-school convocation on May 21. He is also scheduled to speak at various Salina civic clubs and church groups during the week he and his wife, Nell, will be in town with High Flight's Mobile Space Museum.

A pilot of B-26, B-24 and B-17 bombers, Rittenhouse was blown out of the cockpit of his airplane during the famous raids over the Ploesti oil fields of Romania. Shot at by German fighters as he parachuted to earth, both of his legs were broken on impact.

He was held as a prisoner of war in Romania for a year. During that time, he led fellow

P.O.W.s in worship, slipping between P.O.W. camps for services. A film of his life as a P.O.W. was shown on national television in 1957 with actor Scott Brady playing Rittenhouse.

After the war, Rittenhouse attempted to return to Romania as a missionary but was unable to re-enter the now Communist country.

An ordained Baptist minister, he began service in various pastorates in Florida, Georgia and Texas, devoting one year to full-time evangelism.

Kansas To Receive "Moon" Flag

A state flag of Kansas, which went to the moon on the Apollo 15 mission, will be given to the people of Kansas on May 23.

The formal presentation will be made by Col. James B. Irwin, lunar module pilot on Apollo 15, during an invitation-only luncheon at the Salina Country Club. SJMS parents, patrons, faculty and staff will receive invitations.

Accepting the flag on behalf of the citizens of Kansas will be the former Senator Frank Carlson, Concordia.

Carlson is the only Kansan ever to represent the state as a Governor, U.S. Representative and U.S. Senator. He was first elected to Congress in 1934 and re-elected five times. He was elected Governor in 1946 and re-elected in 1948. He went to the Senate in 1950 and was re-elected in 1956 and 1962. He was one of the organizers of the 1952 Eisenhower presidential campaign and became a close advisor of the President during the Eisenhower Administration. His final government position before retiring was in 1964 as a delegate to the United Nations General Assembly.

An active member of Concordia's Baptist Church, the retired Senator is recognized as the founder of the annual Presidential Prayer Breakfasts over which he presided many years.

Col. Keith Duckers, Superintendent, noted Carlson's life in public service had run more than 40 years after starting with a 1928 campaign for the Kansas Legislature.

"No individual in our state can better be called a 'statesman' and none is more appropriate for receiving this gift than is Senator Carlson," Duckers added.

St. John's Military School is co-sponsoring the luncheon with the Salina Area Chamber of Commerce.

Master of ceremonies will be James L. Geisendorf, Chamber president.

Private Institutions Important to Society

"With each passing year, more and more of the private institutions that provide public services in America find themselves in financial jeopardy. In New York City the situation is extreme. When the New York Public Library, the Metropolitan Museum, the Museum of Modern Art, Columbia University, as well as New York University, are all in serious financial condition, the problem has reached critical proportions.

"Part of the tragedy is that relatively few people understand what is at stake. In fact, not many people care very deeply about the preservation of private institutions. With the expansion of government-operated services, many wonder why we need private institutions at all.

"Obviously, the problem is too large, too abstract, too intangible, too impersonal to excite the emotions. Those directly involved in particular institutions appreciate the problem, but primarily from the viewpoint of preserving particular services and positions.

"The larger issue, the issue of the alteration of the character of our society, of the elimination of opportunities for private initiative, and of the growing domination of our lives by large bureaucracies does not compel the kind of concern that civil rights, war and pollution have commanded. The reason is obvious. It is difficult to pin-point the pain. The effects are too gradual to be widely perceived and to arouse vigilant action. And yet, for many of us, there is little doubt that elimination of privately organized public services would seriously damage the vitality of life in this country."

Freedom Shrine To Honor L. Lippincott, Class of '22

The Exchange Clubs of California will present a Freedom Shrine to St. John's Military School during the Awards Convocation on May 22.

The Freedom Shrine is a unique exhibit of 28 authentic reproductions of historically famous American documents spanning the 325 years from the Mayflower Compact to the World War II Instrument of Surrender in the Pacific.

The Shrine was donated in memory of Lydon Lippincott, SJMS Class of 1922 and Cadet Battalion commander. He was a 27-year member of Exchange and, prior to his death in December, 1973, was an Area Governor of Exchange Clubs in South Orange County, Calif.

The Exchange Clubs are service clubs of business and professional men. The Freedom Shrine is an exclusive project but only one of several Exchange programs designed to promote a greater appreciation of the American heritage among the nation's young people.

School officials said the exact photographic reproductions of priceless original documents, mounted on individual laminated woodgrained plaques, would be hung in the main corridor of Vail Hall. The location is just around the corner from the L. Lydon Lippincott

Memorial Award.

"He was respected and well liked by all members and his fellow Exchangites felt that it would be appropriate to have a Freedom Shrine installed at his Alma Mater in memory of his untiring efforts to try to make America a better place to live and bring up our young," wrote on Exchange Club official.
