## The 88th Year Opens With More Cadets

The 1975-76 School year began Sept. 1 with another increase in enrollment. A year ago school opened with a 30 percent increase in enrollment and this year's 167 was above last year's opening figure.

Cadets in the 88th Corps come from 20 states, Nicaragua, Venezuela, Puerto Rico, Trinidad, Costa Rica, Australia and Germany.

The largest delegation of Cadets is from Kansas with 62 followed by Colorado with 35. Texas is represented by 11 students; Nebraska, 10; Oklahoma, six; and Iowa, five.

## Public Affairs Director Named

Thomas E. Wright has been appointed Director of Public Affairs at St. John's Military School. The new position was just recently approved by the School's Board of Trustees according to Col. Keith G. Duckers, Superintendent.

"He will be coordinating all existing and future programs in the areas of development, public information and alumni affairs," Duckers said. The goal, he added, is to "further enhance public support of St. John's objectives and accomplishments."

Wright, 37, is a native of Topeka. He received a bachelor's degree in political science, magna cum laude, from Washburn University of Topeka and a master's degree in journalism and mass communications from Kansas State University.

A former radio - television newsman, he became news director of WREN, Topeka, in 1964. Two years later, he was appointed an administrative assistant to the mayor of Topeka, and city youth opportunity coordinator. His primary duties related to public information and special projects as well as organizing summer jobs for youth campaigns. He has done free-lance news reporting, magazine writing and public relations consulting.

Wright is a member of the Society of Professional Journalists, Sigma Delta Chi, the Association of the U.S. Army, and the Public Relations Society of America.

He is married to the former Mary Jule Montgomery, a public health nurse assigned to the Salina area office of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

## Five New Officers Join 1975-76 Staff

Five new faculty and staff members joined St. John's Military School at the beginning of the fall term.

Maj. Andrew L. Tucker, 45, will head the Junior ROTC department as Senior Army Instructor. Tucker retired from the Army this summer after 25 years service. His last assignment was at Fort Riley as officer-in-charge of post computer operations. He entered the Army as a private in 1950 and served a combat tour in the Korean War as a platoon leader. Two combat tours in Vietnam were spent as adjutant general at Cam Rahn Bay.

He spent nearly four years as an instructor in data processing at the Adjutant General School, Ft. Benjamin Harrison, Ind. and was a basic training instructor at Ft. Rucker, Ala. Tucker received a B.S. from North Carolina University and attended Florida State, Indiana and Kansas State universities. He replaces Maj. Richard Stamm.

Sgt. 1/C David Shono, 29, will be a JROTC instructor and Rifle Team coach. A 12-year Army veteran, overseas all but three years, he recently completed the Advanced Non-commissioned Officer Course, U.S. Army Infantry School, Ft. Benning, Ga., and was cited by the commandant as an Honor Graduate.

In Vietnam, he was a helicopter door-gunner and later an infantry squad leader. A

former instructor at the 1st Army NCO Academy, Ft. Knox, Ky., Shono attended the University of Maryland and Kentucky State University. He replaces M/Sgt. J.E. Resetz.

M/Sgt. Ronald R. Hockett, 46, will serve as the tactical officer for St. John's Lower School. He served 27 years in the Army, all as a military policeman, retiring three years ago. Much of his later service was as an administrator of MP units, reporting to the provost marshal. Hockett completed two combat tours in Vietnam and was an instructor in the U.S. Army Europe NCO Academy. He fills a vacancy created by retirement of Sgt. Richard Lipps.

Capt. Gerald Woody will be assisting in the Lower School. He has 28 years teaching experience, most of it in Kansas, ranging from a one-room country classroom teacher to coach, principal and superintendent. A former Air Force Officer, Woody holds B.S. and M.S. degrees from Kansas State University. He succeeds the late Capt. Bruce Cummings.

Lt. Danny Traub, 23, will serve as industrial arts instructor and assistant track coach. He recently received a B.S. from Concordia Teachers College, Forest Park, Ill., and previously attended junior college in Winfield.

## Funeral for Maj. Cummings Held in School Chapel

The American flag fluttered loosely in the warm September sun. Beneath its half-mast shadow, a double line of Cadets stood at attention, saluting the hearse as it rounded the Jordan fountain and the Memorial Plaza.

The School Color Guard escorted the hearse around the bull-ring after the police escort brought the hearse to the School gate.

On the chapel lawn were members of the faculty and staff to welcome Bruce Cummings on his final return to the School. The Lower School instructor died of cancer, Thursday, Sept. 4. The Cadets came to attention as the hearse entered the campus and held that salute until it came to a stop a few minutes later in front of Armstrong Chapel.

Bearing the casket from the hearse were eight of Maj. Cummings' boys. Most of the pall bearers had been his students since they were in the seventh grade.

Maj. Cummings had been an instructor at St. John's for 14 years. Before that, he had taught at Sylvan Grove and Tescott and was principal of the Tescott High School for

eight years. He had bachelor and master's degrees from Pittsburg State college.

He was born Oct. 28, 1915 at Coalgate, Okla. He was a member of the Episcopal Church and the Masonic lodge.

Survivors include the widow, Marie, two sons, John, Manhattan, and Keith, Lansing, Mich.; his mother, two brothers, two sisters and three grandchildren.

Officiating at the service were the Very Rev. Sylvan Law, Dean of Christ Episcopal Cathedral, and the Rev. Loyd Holifield jr., School Chaplain. Burial was in Franklin cemetery, Tescott.

The Cadet casket bearers were Ivan Williams, Mike Page, Slade Fiero, John Livingston, Gary Cavey, John Evans, Randy Krueger and Allen Leavitt.

The family suggested memorials to St. John's Military School.

## SJMS Says Farewell

The impact Bruce Cummings had on the lives of many boys perhaps was best illustrated by the eight Cadets who were the casket bearers. He fought a valiant fight against cancer during the summer months because he hoped that when fall came he would be on the football practice field with the team.

Another interest was track and his teams did well. A fitting memorial to Captain Cummings would be a track on the campus where running skills could be sharpened.

Captain Cummings will be missed but the memory of the life he lived will continue to be an inspiration to many men throughout the nation who were "his boys".

## Ambassador's Address Attended by 50

A major address by a U.S. Ambassador to Japan from 1969 to 1972 was attended by 50 Cadets from the Social Science department at Bethany College, Lindsborg, Sept. 23.

Dr. Armin H. Meyer was at Bethany college for a series of lectures and discussion. His major address was "Groping for International Equilibrium". Before his appointment to Japan, Dr. Meyer served as U.S. Ambassador to Iran, 1965-69 and to Lebanon, 1961-65.

In Japan, Meyer supervised negotiations for the reversion of Okinawa, assured the continuation of the United States-Japan treaty of mutual co-operation and security, and eased the shock of President Nixon's diplomatic breakthrough to China.

He is the author of the book, "Assignment: Tokyo -- An Ambassador's Journal," published in 1974.

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## Chapel Needs New Organ

An opportunity to provide a needed improvement in Armstrong Chapel awaits friends of St. John's Military School.

A Baldwin Fantasia organ can be placed in the chapel with added donations of \$2,000. The organ, a versatile console instrument, would be used for Chapel services and individual Cadet lessons.

It will replace the old organ which, although still functional, is "nickel and diming us to death" according to the Rev. Loyd Holifield, Jr., Chaplain and Director of Religious Activities.

He said the present organ is over 20 years old and requires a "great deal of expensive annual repair to keep it functioning properly."

The organ will be supplied by Hough Piano & Organ Co. of Salina. Don B. Hough, owner, said the Baldwin Fantasia retails for \$4,300. All but \$2,000 has been pledged.

Hough, husband of St. John's music teacher, Nedra Hough, said the Fantasia has "rhythm and fun things as well as the traditional organ specifications." It has a 25-note pedalboard with 61-note solo and accompaniment manuals. The amplification is a self-contained, transistorized, three-channel system with 100 watts of power. Those interested should contact the Superintendent, the Chaplain or the Director of Public Affairs.

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# Cadets Win 8-0 In Season Opener

A 26-yard touchdown scamper by senior halfback Gary Cavey capped a 57-yard drive and gave St. John's an 8-0 victory over White City on the Cadet field Sept. 12 in the season opener for both teams. SJMS was the only high school in Salina posting a win that night.

The score, which came with 7:15 left in the game, was set up by sophomore tackle Marty Johnson's second fumble recovery of the night. After the recovery, it took the Cadets just four plays to reach paydirt.

Junior quarterback Tom Miller, running the wishbone for coach Paul Kellogg Jr., carried for eight yards on the first play and then gave the Cadets a first down at the White City 25-yard line with a 23-yard jaunt.

Senior fullback John Evans, who led all rushers with 64 yards, was thrown for a one yard loss on the next play but Cavey, who gained 45 yards on that night, took a pitchout from Miller, skirted right end and turned on the speed to beat the defenders to the goal line.

Freshman halfback Slade Fiero then bulled his way around left end for the two-point conversion.

White City had two more chances to score, the last coming with 1:28 remaining. But Miller ended that drive, intercepting Huskie quarterback Tony Glessner's desperation

pass at the St. John's 35-yard line. The Cadets then ran out the clock.

The win was the Cadets' third in a row, including the last two games of the 1974 season.

Neither team could mount any offense in the first half, the Cadets being hampered by 55 yards in penalties and an early fumble.

White City's only real threat came late in the third stanza when the Huskies moved from their own 30 to the Cadets 17-yard line. But on the 11th play of the drive, sophomore halfback Richard Kasten fumbled after a thrust into the line and Johnson pounced on the loose ball.

## Glasco Downs Cadets, 13-8

Two big scoring plays by Glasco on the Cadet field, Sept. 19, spelled defeat for the Cadets as the Bulldogs squeaked by 13-8 in the Eisenhower West division league football opener for both schools.

Although the Cadets dominated the game statistically, Glasco came up with a couple of outstanding defensive stands. St. John's outgained the Bulldogs 140-84, but could score only one touchdown, that coming with 9:37 left in the game on a one-yard run by fullback John Evans.

The TD was set up by a pass interception by safety Tom Miller who returned it 18 yards to the seven. Four straight carries by Evans produced the score.

Glasco's first score came late in the opening period on a 49-yard halfback option pass. The extra point kick was not good.

At the half it was still 6-0 as the Cadets were stopped on the Bulldog two-yard line on a fourth down play as time ran out. St. John's got the chance

to score because of a blocked quick kick attempt by tackle Ed Hebb with 53 seconds left.

It took just 14 seconds for the Cadets to fall behind 12-0 after the second half began as Loe took the kickoff back 82 yards. The extra point was good.

The leading ball carrier for the Cadets was Evans, who toted the ball 27 times for 68 yards.

The St. John's defense was outstanding but three lost fumbles hurt the offense.
