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SJMS Cadets Play Stock Market Game

The St. John's Cadets are playing in the Kansas State University Stock Market Game again this year.

Cadets in the Lower School have participated for several years. This year teams from the Upper School are involved in the competition according to Lt. Doug Randolph, Mathematics teacher.

The game is to teach the Cadets the function of the stock market. Seven teams, four from the Lower School, are involved with 27 Cadets participating.

One of the Lower School teams has ranked first in the Manhattan region among 69 teams and are also ranked first in the state of 412 teams. The team of Richard Jenkins, Troy Hudson, Larry Bedard and Randy Cash have held that position since the game started

a month ago. They hope to remain in that position for the final six weeks of competition.

Outdoor Adventure Planned for Summer

A summer outdoor adventure trip for SJMS Cadets is planned for June 4 to 17. The trip will be a recreational and educational experience according to trip organizer Lt. Col. Kenneth Faerber, Academic Dean.

Other sponsors will be Maj. Gerald Woody, Lower School director; Lt. Doug Randolph, Lower School teacher and Lt. Gene Johnson, Upper School math instructor.

The group will spend four days visiting various points of interest enroute to Ely, Minn. A day will be spent in Ely preparing for the wilderness adventure. Five days will be spent camping, canoeing and fishing.

A day will be spent in Ely for rest before the three-day return trip to Salina.

Points of interest to be visited enroute include the Willa Cather Pioneer memorial, Red Cloud, Neb.; Pioneer Village, Minden, Neb.; Rosebud Indian Reservation, Badland petrified gardens

and Badlands all in South Dakota; International Falls and Pelican Lake in Minnesota.

On the way home the Cadets will visit Gooseberry Falls in Minnesota; St. Croix Falls State Park in Wisconsin; Rochester, Minn.; Iowa Great Lakes region; Shenandoah, Ia.; view Indian Wood carvings in Troy, Kans.; visit the Pony Express Station in northeast Kansas and stop to see the First Capitol of Kansas at Ft. Riley before returning to Salina.

Transportation will be provided by two 12-passenger vans.

Cost of the expedition is \$600 and includes all transportation, meals, admissions fees, rental of canoes, tents and camping equipment.

Centennial Chairmen Named

The General and Honorary Chairmen for the St. John's Military School Centennial celebration running from Commencement 1987 through Commencement 1988 have been appointed according to Col. Keith G. Duckers, School President.

D. Dale Browning, Denver Banker, Class of 1955, former trustee and an honorary trustee, has accepted the appointment as general chairman of activities. Former School Superintendent Col. R.L. Clem, Denver, Colo., will serve as honorary chairman.

The centennial year will begin at Commencement 1987 with the graduation of the 99th Corps of Cadets and carry through a full year culminating with the final centennial celebration with the graduation of the seniors in the 100th Cadet Corps.

Lt. Col. V.B. Loy's "History of SJMS" is being updated and will be published and ready for distribution at the 99th Commencement. A companion book, generally a pictorial history, depicting the first 99 years plus a more complete year-long section on the centennial year is being planned.

President Duckers said that at least four major events are

planned for the year. The first will feature the Church and its role in the founding and history of the School.

In the fall of 1987, probably in October during Parents' Weekend a military-patriotic event will be planned. It is hoped, according to Duckers, that former Battalion commanders and now career officers such as Al Ransom, Steve Erb and Ray Garvey, will provide ideas for the event.

A mid-winter major event will honor former trustees, former faculty and staff, friends in Salina and throughout the country. Duckers said, "hopefully we will have a national personality as a banquet speaker."

The final event will be the Centennial Commencement featuring a giant alumni reunion.

Ideas being discussed by Browning and Duckers are a number of special things such

as the selection of an All-American Crack Squad or former S-Club members selecting the outstanding SJMS athletes of the century.

Sarah Duckers, daughter of President Duckers, who spent all her life on campus, thinks a reunion of all the "faculty kids" that grew up on campus would be fun.

President Duckers asked, "Would old boys, faculty, staff and patrons go through your memorabilia and see what you might have that could be used in connection with the celebration such as letters, pictures, newspaper clippings, yearbooks, etc. A good way to respond might be to get out a tape recorder and record memories of your St. John's years."

Browning said that there is a great deal of work to be done, but it is quite easy to get excited about the event. "Initially, we hope to be able to convey that enthusiasm to others and that will have a multiplying affect," he added.

"Interview The Interviewer" When Looking For A Job

EVANSTON, IL — Careful planning before a job interview will help you ask the right questions -- and avoid the wrong ones, says Philip Clement, President of DeVRY, INC., one of the largest networks of technical education institutes in North America.

He notes that asking questions not only helps you learn more about the position and the company, but also demonstrates your interest in the job. Researching the company beforehand -- by reading annual reports, quarterly financial statements, and articles in trade magazines and local newspapers -- most of which are available at the library -- will be of additional help.

"When an interviewer asks if an applicant has any questions," says Mr. Clement, "the person who isn't prepared, or knows very little about the company, gives the impression of not really being serious."

By contrast, he says that an applicant who asks good questions appears to be more interested in the position, and that interest could be the deciding factor leading to a job offer. However, he cautions that applicants should be careful in their selection of questions.

What You Shouldn't Ask. "The first mistake many applicants make is to ask how much money they will earn," Clement explains. "This is one matter the employer will discuss at the right time. The same goes for topics such as vacations, days off, and fringe benefits."

What Should You Ask? Clement notes well-thought-out questions might include:

- What will my exact responsibilities be?
- What type of equipment will I work with?
- Who are the company's major customers?
- Does the company plan to expand into new markets and/or product lines?
- How much growth does the company anticipate in the

next few years? Where will it come from?

- If I perform well, what can I expect in the way of added responsibilities and advancement?

Clement stresses that knowing what to ask is not enough: "Preparing for the entire interview is essential. Many technical institutes and colleges now offer classes and workshops to help students develop proper interviewing skills. The DeVry Institute of Technology, for example, require that students take a course in career development before they graduate.

"The interview is the key step that leads to a job offer," adds Clement. "For that reason, it may be the most important step."
