Parents Weekend Set

Parents Weekend at SJMS will be Oct. 14-16. A schedule of on-campus activities has been planned and time has been allowed for parents to spend with their Cadets.

Parents are asked to register at the Vanier Academic Center when they arrive on campus.

Activities of the weekend will kick-off with a varsity football game against Wakefield at 7 p.m., Friday, Oct. 14. Following the game, Cadets will be permitted to go on pass until midnight.

Passes, for Cadets without a parent-pass, will end at 11 p.m.

Saturday activities will begin with registration at 8 a.m., Oct. 15. Teachers and staff members will be available for personal conferences both Saturday and Sunday mornings in their classrooms and offices.

The annual meeting of the St. John's Foundation, an organization of parents and friends of the School, will be held in

Nichols Dining Hall at 12 noon. Cadets are required to attend this meal.

Following the luncheon, the Cadets will be permitted to go on pass.

A special Chapel service will be held at 10:45 a.m. Sunday, Oct. 16 in the Banes Gymnasium. The service has been moved to the gym to accommodate everyone who wishes to attend including parents of the 96th corps, faculty and staff and trustees of the school.

The Pass-in-Review has been set for 12:15 p.m. Sunday on Perkins Field. Cadets will have free-time until the weekend officially ends at 5 p.m., Sunday, Oct. 16.

School Benefactor Dies in Lincoln, Neb.

Memorial services for Walton C. Ferris sr., were held Friday, Sept. 2, at the Roper and Sons Mortuary, Lincoln, Neb. Mr. Ferris, a benefactor and long-time friend of St. John's Military School, died Aug. 30 at his home in Lincoln.

Ferris and his wife, Elizabeth, gave the School all 2,500 shares of common stock in National Manufacturing Company, Lincoln, in January 1982. This summer they made a further gift of land and buildings.

The Ferrises have been benefactors of St. John's for over 30 years. Funds for the Ferris shop building, now a part of Clem-Ferris Hall, were given by Mr. and Mrs. Ferris. Shop equipment and kitchen equipment in Nichols Hall have been other gifts.

The Ferris awards given at Commencement for outstanding work in shop and mechanical drawing were endowed by Mr. Ferris.

Their son, Frederick, was a student at St. John's in the 1950's.

Developed by the Ferrises over the past 50 years, National Manufacturing now is a sprawling, 16-building complex in the northeast part of Lincoln. One of its best-known products is the "walking" lawn sprinkler.

SJMS Hosts Post Rock Teachers Service Day

A group of 175 teachers from the eight Post Rock League Schools and three guest schools attended an in-service training day at SJMS, Monday, Sept. 19 according to Col. Kenneth Faerber, Academic Dean.

Eleven instructors from Kansas State University, Manhattan, taught the workshops to teachers working with students from kindergarten through the senior year in high school.

Topics explored were "Examining Teacher Burnout", "Jazzing up Reading Instruction", local production of slides and overhead transparencies, classroom management, content area reading, motivation in the classroom, "Classroom Discipline: A Positive Approach", "The Teacher and the Law", problem solving in mathematics; classroom computers, and "Science: An Articulated K-12 curriculum".

All workshop sessions were held in the Vanier Academic Center.

Grade and subject area meetings were held following the workshops. Grade school sessions were held in Parkview Hall and junior high and high school subject sessions were set in Vanier Center.

Col. Faerber said the purpose of the day is to help improve the quality of classroom instruction. Teachers may take the workshop for credit toward their teaching certificates.

Another workshop will be held at SJMS Feb. 6, 1984, covering the same courses.

While the teachers were attending classes in Cadet classrooms, the Cadets attended a Military Field Day at Ft. Riley, Ks.

St. John's Military School has received a major bequest of \$76,867 from the estate of the late Marguerite Mollohan, Wichita, according to Col. Keith G. Duckers, School President.

The late Ms. Mollohan was a business partner of the late Maud Beech, who served as a St. John's trustee in the 1950's. The bequest was made as a tribute to Miss Beech.

Col. Duckers said gifts and bequests to the School during the last four or five years have an estimated market value of more than \$4 million.

The proceeds are managed by an endowment committee headed by Salina trustee, Ronald Green. Others on the committee are W.W. Baxter, Bob Kastner, Frank Norton, Dennis Poer, Tom Hampton and Duckers, all of Salina; Bill Usher, Topeka, and Dale Browning, Denver.

Browning Launches Plus-System

A network of automated teller machine systems was launched this summer by D. Dale Browning, Class of 1955, president of the Denver-based Plus System, Inc. Browning has explained the system on two appearances on The Today Show. He was interviewed by Jane Pauley.

Bank customers of banks belonging to the system will have access to their accounts from almost anywhere in the United States.

"While electronic funds transfer has been evolving in the United States for the last several years," Browning said, "the fact that consumers may now have access to their checking, savings and credit card accounts at automatic teller machines in hundreds of cities in 47 states from New York to California -- even in Alaska and Hawaii -- is an important consumer convenience never before possible."

He said Plus system plans to link ATMS at the country's busiest airports and in key vacation, business and travel spots. It presently links nearly 2000 ATMs around the country, and a total of 3,000 are expected to be operating by year-end. The figure is expected to hit 10,000 by 1988.

The nationwide electronic consumer banking system now is available to 122 million households and will expand to serve more than 17 million by the end of 1983. Services include cash withdrawals from checking and savings, transfers from one account to another, account balance inquiry and cash advances on credit cards. Federal regulations do not permit deposits to be accepted on an interstate basis. "This is a new dawn for consumer banking through creative

ACT Tests Scheduled

Junior and Senior Cadets will take the ACT assessment program exams Oct. 29.

Lt. Lou Lyda, Guidance Counselor, said, "Cadets are required to take the tests during the junior year or early in the senior year, so their results will be available in time for planning postsecondary education and careers."

The ACT assessment consists of four academic tests measuring educational development. A detailed questionnaire collects information relevant to education and career planning. The results are recommended or required by more than 2,700 colleges and universities and scholarship programs.

The registration fee is \$10.

It takes about three hours to complete the four exams in English, math, social studies and natural sciences. A sample copy of the test is available in every high school.

The program is a major service of the American College Testing program with national headquarters in Iowa City, Ia.

Dear Parent:

The school which your child attends participates in the Special Milk Program and serves milk every school day. The milk is included in tuition total.

Students from families whose income is at or below the level shown on the income guidelines scale are eligible for free milk.

All students are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

To apply for free milk at any time during the year, complete the attached application and return it to the school. You are required to provide:

- (1) the name and Social Security number of all adult household members and the name of all other household members under 21 (adults without a Social Security number must indicate they do not have one);
- (2) total household income (see explanation below);
- (3) the signature of an adult household member.

An incomplete application cannot be approved. If information is missing, your child will be denied milk benefits. Eligibility status may be verified by the school or other officials at any time during the year.

The racial/ethnic category information will be helpful to the school so officials can be assured that everyone receives benefits on a fair basis. You are encouraged to complete that section, but it is not required.

If your child is approved for milk benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases. If you are not eligible now, you may wish to apply later if your household income decreases or your family size increases.

The following information is provided to assist you when completing the application.

TOTAL HOUSEHOLD INCOME — Report current income based on last month's income. Attach an explanation if last month's income is not a good indicator due to unemployment or other causes.

Persons with steady monthly income should multiply by twelve the income received last month to figure current annual income.

Persons with fluctuating monthly income (seasonal and temporary workers, farmers, and self-employed persons) should refer to the attached guidelines for reporting income from private business operations.

FOSTER CHILDREN — A foster child is considered a one-member family if the welfare agency is legally responsible for the child. Welfare payments which are specifically identified by category for personal use of the child and funds personally received by the child are considered the child's income.

Within 10 days of receiving your complete application, a school official will notify you whether or not your children are eligible. If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application, you may wish to discuss it with the school official. If you wish to review the decision further, you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Col. Keith G. Duckers, P.O. Box 838, Salina, Kansas 67402-0838. Other items manufactured in Lincoln range from power lawn thatchers to tools and dies for the rubber industry, and sophisticated ovens for the milling industry. S.J.M.S. President, Col. Keith G. Duckers, now serves as Chairman of the Board of National Manufacturing.

At the time of the gift to the School, Ferris wrote: "I am proud to have an opportunity to help with the edification of your students enrolled now and in the future."

Mr. Ferris was born in Solon, Mich. He taught at Northwest School of Agriculture in Crookston, Minn., until 1916, when he came to Lincoln to work for National Manufacturing, a company he bought in the 1920's.

Mr. Ferris already had patented his design for a pressure cooker, and the company soon became a major producer of pressure cookers.

In 1938, National began manufacturing a Ferris-designed walking lawn sprinkler, which moves automatically along a garden hose to water a long section of grass. During the 1940's and 1950's, the company sold 10,000 to 15,000 sprinklers each year, but sales slowed when competitors began to sell similar products.

Since the early 1960's, National has made the Roto-Raker, a power lawn rake distributed by several companies in Nebraska and other states.

Mr. Ferris was a World War I Army Air service veteran, amateur photographer and painter and was active in many community organizations, including Rotary Club. He was Lincoln's first registered Boy Scout scoutmaster.

He is survived by his wife, sons, Walton C. Jr., Mill Valley, Calif., and Fred, Egan, Minn., and grandchildren, Christopher and Kimberly, Egan, Minn.

Cadets May Fly From Wichita

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Cadets To Learn From Mistakes

Students taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test this year on Oct. 18 will be able to "learn from their own mistakes" by using information in their score report provided by the College Board, according to Lt. Lou Lyda, Guidance Counselor.

"After taking the PSAT / NMSQT, all students receive a **Report of Student Answers** which includes the correct answers and their own responses and scores. They also receive their own test booklets so that they can review the actual questions, see which ones they got wrong, and try to figure out the correct answer and why they may have missed it," Lyda said.

This process can help students learn from their own mistakes by encouraging them to understand the reasoning involved in finding the right answer, an ability which will be useful for future school work.

The PSAT/NMSQT is co-sponsored by the College Board and the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. Since 1959, more than 26 million students have taken the test, which measures verbal and mathematical abilities.

By taking the test, students discover how they rank among students taking the test across the country. It also provides a preview of the College Board's Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), taken by many college-bound students. The PSAT/NMSQT is also the qualifying test for students wishing to participate in competitions of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

Chapel Council Starts Work
