1944

At the close of the basketball season, the school gym will be torn down; to be replaced by the new mess hall combination. The lumber and nails must be saved as they are scarce and cannot be gotten easily . . . The Junior School along with their officers attend morning chapel right after breakfast. The session is more informal than that for the older cadets who make their morning devotions just before school . . . Dear Editor: I think this school should have a School Court. The faculty and the Cadets could get together and elect a judge and jury. A court like this would eliminate grudge "hooks" or unnecessary squad.

NOVEMBER -- 1954

For the second time in less than a year, Cadets from St. John's will see President Dwight D. Eisenhower. The 34-man Crack Platoon will participate in the Armistice Day parade at Abilene and later be present at the Eisenhower Memorial when the President will dedicate the new wing . . . Idle Talk by I. Ben Hadd said, "S-Club puts juke box in the Rec Hall. A working miracle . . . if it works, it's a miracle." and "maybe sticky fingers would aid the Crack Squad."

NOVEMBER -- 1964

The yearly Interior Guard was posted acting as a deterrent to

any Halloween mischief directed against the school. The Military IV class challenged the Cadets of the other three military classes to a type of war game during the guard . . . Disregarding the traditional shovel, Col. R. L. Clem, Superintendent and Rector, mounted a bulldozer to turn his shovel of dirt at groundbreaking ceremonies for the new 88-Cadet Lower School barracks building. The groundbreaking marked the beginning of construction of the largest building to be constructed in recent years on the campus . . . A large crowd attended the Thanksgiving festivities at the School. The Cadet Corps marched to church on Thanksgiving morning to the music of the Drum and Bugle Corps. Following the service in Christ Episcopal Cathedral, the annual holiday dinner was served to 800 in the 4-H Building, Kenwood Park.

NOVEMBER -- 1974

50 dozen doughnuts and 10 gallons of cider were consumed by the Cadets of the 87th Corps at the Halloween Howl . . . St. John's Military School's 15-game losing streak is over. The Cadets, who hadn't won a game since the final contest of the 1972 season, scored a 24-16 win over Bennington in Eisenhower Western division football play . . . Many Cadets pass "Old Boy" Tests . . . NHS sponsors a Book Fair.
