## 97th Cadet Corps Welcomes Parents

## NCA Evaluation Team Visits SJMS

The Evaluation team for the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools is visiting the St. John's Military School campus Oct. 9-11.

Schools accredited by the North Central Association must conduct a self-study and be visited by an evaluation team every seven years to maintain accreditation.

During the 1983-84 school year, faculty, staff, Cadets and trustees participated in a self-study of various programs at the School. Results of this study were then published and are being used by the visitation team.

Capt. Lou Lyda, Guidance Counselor and chairman of the SJMS task force, said, "a continuing evaluation of policies and procedures is necessary for a school to improve. It is hoped that the report along with the visitation will be hopeful in implementing necessary improvements that will provide us with a progressive educational program."

Dr. W.L. McClanahan, principal of Wichita South High School, is the visiting team chairman. He met with other team members at the Ramada Inn, Salina, at 2 p.m., Oct. 9 before visiting the campus.

The group was welcomed by a Cadet Honor Guard. Inspecting the Honor Guard was Brig. Gen. James Haught, US Army-Ret., Principal of Hamilton Junior High School, Wichita, and Deputy Commander of the 89th Army Reserve group.

Following the welcome, team members met with members of the faculty and staff and SJMS committee chairmen.

A social hour and dinner were held in the evening at the Salina Country Club.

Activities on Wednesday, Oct. 10 began with team members eating breakfast with the Cadets in Nichols Dining Hall. The remainder of the day was spent observing the classroom program.

## School Donor Dies

The donor of the largest legacy ever given to St. John's Military School, Lyman George Linger, died June 21.

It was announced during Commencement ceremonies May 20, 1979 that SJMS would share in a \$5 million trust established by "Old Boy" Lyman Linger.

The money is the School's share of the proceeds from the sale of Rattlesnake Ranch near Loveland, Colo. The money is placed in a trust at the Colorado National Bank, Denver.

Col. Keith G. Duckers, School president, said the military school would use its share as an endowment with the annual yield to be used for capital improvements to enhance the education of Cadets.

Linger, 75, Class of 1926, Loveland, Colo., died at his home in Loveland.

He was born Oct. 26, 1908 in Denver and was raised on the family ranch in the San Luis Valley.

Linger was educated in the Denver public schools and St. John's Military School. He attended Colorado College for three years and spent two years at Colorado A and M College, now Colorado State University.

Since 1946, Linger has been owner of the Rattlesnake Park Ranch, west of Loveland. His brands were Shepherd's Crook cross and Fish Head.

On Feb. 8, 1973, Linger was honored by the Society for Range Management for his "outstanding achievement and service." He has been a member of the organization since 1949. Linger was also cited for his service by the Big Thompson Soil Conservation District and the Forest service.

He was instrumental in creating an advisory committee to the Colorado State Board of Land Commissioners on the use of state grazing lands.

Active in Boy Scout work for many years, Linger served

## ... from the past

As a monthly feature, leading to the Centennial celebration planned for Commencement 1987 to Commencement 1988, news from **The Skirmishers** of past years will be appearing on this page.

### FALL -- 1924

Col. Ganssle (school superintendent) has been seen recently driving a new Marmon car. It is of the same type and color as his last one. This speaks well for the Marmon as this is his second one . . . The school ponies, which have been on the range during the summer vacation, were returned to the school. They are indeed in fine condition, fat and rested. The smaller cadets have great times in the afternoon riding the ponies about the campus . . . Capt. Shideler invited a small group of boys to his home and it would be going into detail to say that everyone was conspicuously present, as a change from the daily route is always welcomed. The early part of the evening was spent in singing songs. Jokes were told and the evening finished up by refreshments of ice cream and cake.

### OCTOBER -- 1954

Roger Bigler is named the Cadet Commander . . . The 68th year started with an enrollment of 112 Cadets as Col. R. L. Clem begins his 18th year as superintendent . . . New staff members are Mrs. Annabel Hardy, head of the English department; Mrs. Floss Brundage, School nurse; Lt. Jack McCandless, Junior School instructor; Miss Mary Breitweiser, secretary to the Rector, and Lt. Richard King, Junior School instructor . . . SJMS Crack Drill platoon was victorious in the Regional Civil Air Patrol drill competition last May in Omaha . . . The Cadet football team was undefeated in its first three games. Pin-point passing by St. John's southpaw quarterback Al Ransom figures in all of the Cadets' scoring plays.

### OCTOBER -- 1964

The 76th Corps is formed with an enrollment of 204 Cadets . . . Merle E. "Sonny" Morton was named C.O. of the Corps . . . Plans for the new St. John's Junior School barracks building are now in the final stages on the architects' drawing board. The building, costing \$300,000, will house 88 Cadets and will have four faculty apartments. . . The Chapel programs has been changed from daily services to four Chapel services a week. They are held Monday evening, Wednesday morning and Thursday evening along with the regular Sunday morning service.

### OCTOBER -- 1974

The 87th Cadet Corps is biggest and best in five years. Col. Keith G. Duckers, Superintendent said, "During the past decade more than half of the military schools have ceased to exist. St. John's is the only school of its type between Lexington, Mo. and the west coast with the exception of state-supported New Mexico Military Institute, Roswell . . . Jim Wellman was named Battalion Commander with Greg Paul as executive officer . . . Teachers and staff are seeing double this year with three sets of twins enrolled -- Ariel and Arnaldo Anaya, Gary and Larry Santillanes and Abel and Ernesto Anaya . . . More than 90 Cadets walked 10 miles each to raise money for the Christian Rural Overseas Program. The project was sponsored by the Key Club.

## Travel Requirements Explained

Information for furlough reservations required by the Commandant's office include the date when the reservation was made, flight time and point of departure; flight time and point of departure and destination for the return trip, and the flight number and airline name.

Lt. Col. Paul H. Kellogg, Commandant, said that a representative of the Travel agency used by the School will be on campus during Parents' Weekend. He will be at the Spencer Cadet Center at 9 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 27.

The earliest flight a Cadet can make from Wichita is 5:50 p.m. on the day furlough begins.

Kellogg cautions patrons that only the seller can change the price of a ticket. A ticket purchased elsewhere cannot be changed in Salina by a different carrier or the Travel agency.

The charter bus is used only for Thanksgiving, Christmas and Spring furlough. The bus makes a round trip from Salina to Denver and Denver to Salina. Only round trip reservations will be accepted. Patrons who wish to utilize this service will be billed directly by the travel agent.

Patrons will have the option of requesting surface transportation to the Wichita airport. Savings for air transportation from Wichita are considerable. Cadets utilizing this service will be picked up in Wichita upon their return from furlough.

**R. Bruce Johnson**, Class of 1920, died April 10, 1984. He was born Oct. 2, 1900 in Salina and was a lifetime resident of Saline County. He served four terms in the Kansas House of Representatives. He was a farmer-stockman and dairyman. Johnson had been a 4-H leader, a Rotarian, president of the Tri-Rivers fair board, a Planters State Band director, a St. John's Military School trustee and a community leader for many years.

### Milk Program Explained

Dear Parents:  
The school which your child attends participates in the Special Milk Program and serves milk every school day. Students may purchase milk for included in tuition total.

Students from families whose income is at or below the level shown on the income guidelines scale are eligible for free milk. All students are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

To apply for free milk at any time during the year, complete the attached application and return it to the school. You are required to provide:

- (1) the name and Social Security number of all adult household members and the name of all other household members under 21 (adults without a Social Security number must indicate they do not have one);
- (2) total household income by source and household member or food stamp case number (see explanation below);
- (3) the signature of an adult household member.

An incomplete application cannot be approved. If information is missing, your child will be denied milk benefits. Eligibility status may be verified by the school or other officials at any time during the year.

The racial/ethnic category information will be helpful to the school so officials can be assured that everyone receives benefits on a fair basis. You are encouraged to complete that section, but it is not required.

If your child is approved for milk benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases. If you are not eligible now, you may wish to apply later if your household income decreases or your family size increases.

The following information is provided to assist you when completing the application:

\* **TOTAL HOUSEHOLD INCOME** - Report by source and household member current annual income based on last month's income. Attach an explanation if last month's income is not a good indicator due to unemployment or other causes. Persons with already monthly income should multiply by twelve the income received last month to figure current annual income. Persons with fluctuating monthly income (seasonal and temporary workers, farmers, and self-employed persons) should refer to the attached guidelines for reporting income from private business operations.

\* **FOSTER CHILDREN** - A foster child is considered a one-member family if the welfare agency is legally responsible for the child. Welfare payments which are specifically identified by category for personal use of the child and funds personally received by the child are considered the child's income.

Within 10 days of receiving your complete application, a school official will notify you whether or not your children are eligible. If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application, you may wish to discuss it with the school official. If you wish to review the decision further, you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing:
