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Commencement Starts Centennial Celebration

Emotions Were High As School Year Ends

Rain failed to dampen the emotions of the large group attending the 1987 Commencement at St. John's Military School, Sunday, May 24.

From the processional of the 99th Corps to the dismissal of the Corps forever, emotions ran high and tears were shed during the address and the traditional "handle" ceremony.

Cadets and staff woke to a foggy, drizzly morning and ceremonies were moved to the Banes gym.

The invocation, the Lord's Prayer in Indian language, was given by the Hon. George Tallchief, Tribal Chief, Osage Indian Nation, Pawhuska, Okla. The "old boy", 1927-32 was dressed in his full ceremonial regalia.

Comparing his days as a Cadet to those of the 99th Corps, Col. Albert J. Ransom, Commanding Officer of the Marine Corps Air Station, Camp Pendleton, held the audience spellbound during the address. Ransom graduated in the class of 1956. (Excerpts from his speech will be found elsewhere in *The Skirmisher*.)

After the presentation of diplomas the graduates of 1987 joined the many old boys in attendance for the "handle" ceremony. The handle was salvaged from Vail Hall and has been touched by all Cadets graduating from the School.

The gym was completely ringed with the graduates and

old boys. The new alma mater was sung with John Ryberg, former Trustee, leading the singing.

Named Honor School

SJMS was named an "Honor School with Distinction" for its 21st consecutive year. The honor is a result of the Annual Formal Inspection of the Junior ROTC program.

Travis Klopfenstein was awarded the Gordon Prize. Making the presentation was Colonel Ransom, a '56 winner of the prize and it's present donor. Other former winners Larry Rice, Jimmy Lee Armstrong, Mark Thomas and Eduardo Vaccaro participated in the ceremony.

Kevin Smith was named Commander-elect of the 100th Corps of Cadets. Commander of the 99th, Klopfenstein presented Smith with the Hardy Sabre, symbol of command at the School.

Following the benediction by the Rt. Rev. John Ashby, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Western Kansas, the ceremonies were moved outside to the tear-drop area for retreat and the final pass in review.

With the last fading echo of "Taps", the 99th Corps was dismissed forever.



THE FLAGS GO UP

100 Flags Raised To Start Centennial

The new brick driveway was scrubbed, the grass was manicured, the Cadets stood tall as the thrilling moment arrived.

The crisp clear notes of reveille echoed across the Jordan Plaza.

For a brief moment before acting drum major Tom Keil, '85, directed the School band in playing the National Anthem there was dead silence.

More than a thousand St. John's faithful broke into an ovation as they viewed the spec-

tacular site - 100 American flags on gleaming white 18-foot poles floated gently on a cool spring breeze.

In the center of the campus,, 14 Cadets had hoisted the largest American flag in Kansas to complete the setting.

Keil was called out of "retirement" to lead the band, because Cadet Maj. David Dumler was at one site raising his own memorial flag.

Circling the tear-drop were 99 other Trustees, old boys, faculty and other friends hoisting the flag they had provided.

Moments before, the huge iron gates at the main entrance were opened to admit the band, 100 Cadets carrying folded flags and the rest of the Corps.

As the flag bearers arrived at each pre-determined position, they presented the flag and assisted in the raising.

Following the ceremony, a Kansas National Guard M-60 A1 tank rumbled into position at the main gate.

Promptly at 8 a.m. the tank's cannon was fired as 84 runners took off on a 6.6-mile run to Kansas Wesleyan and back.

Guests enjoyed a continental breakfast in the President's yard and awaited the return of the runners before departing to the parade site.

St. John's Centennial year was underway!

Freedom Isn't Free

... Says Astronaut

Freedom is not free Brig. Gen. Joe Engle, (USAF-Ret.) told an audience of over 700 at the Centennial banquet and military ball at the Salina Bicentennial Center, Saturday, May 23.

Engle, a native of Chapman, Ks., was one of 19 astronauts selected by NASA in 1966. He was the commander of the space shuttle Columbia flight in November 1981, and commander of another shuttle flight in August 1985. He also was backup lunar module pilot for the Apollo 14 moon mission.

Engle commended the Cadets for learning to set goals and for learning discipline. But he said that they had also learned to question. He said, "You have earned that right because we have a precious thing called freedom."

Engle continued, "Since 1861, one million Americans have died defending freedom, liberty and our way of life. America had fruitful acres but they were made great fields by the men who cultivated them. There were forests but they were made great by the men who harvested them."

During his talk, Engle asked the junior and senior Cadets to take off their school rings and lay them on the table.

Then he continued: "The oyster has absolute security. It has a house. It opens its shell to eat but the oyster is not going anywhere."

"God made the eagle. It is threatened. It is building and (Con't. on Page 6)

COMMENCEMENT--1927

The greatest stride forward that has been made for St. John's in many years is the adoption of a new basis of operation for the school. The old method of a board of trustees is again in operation. Col. W.L. Ganssle, who has been superintendent for the past 12 years, will remain in that capacity. Of special interest is the fact that Col. Roy W. Perkins will return to the school as Commandant. Col. Perkins was Commandant at St. John's in 1924-25 when he resigned to accept another position. (Editor's Note: Perkins Field is named after the late commandant). . . The Military Ball was held at Memorial Hall. Promptly at 9:30 p.m., the Cadet major and his date led the Grand March followed immediately by members of the class of '27 and their ladies . . . Of all the activities at St. John's, the Crack Squad easily holds the highest place in the minds of the cadets. Its drill demands the closest attention and requires the most excellent display of military precision on the part of its members. .

COMMENCEMENT--1937

St. John's to keep fiftieth anniversary. Alumni are urged to return. Eighteen seniors are graduating. The institution is making a special effort to get all the alumni possible to return for Commencement festivities. St. John's had not had a very active alumni organization. (Editor's Note - Some things never change.)

COMMENCEMENT--1949

No longer can the school campus be termed the "weed patch" of North Santa Fe. Starting last summer Major Guernsey got some of the mowing equipment in condition and began a systematic trimming of the lawns and terraces. . .

COMMENCEMENT--1967

The cornerstone for the new Spencer Cadet Center will be put in place during a special ceremony as part of the Commencement weekend activities . . . Brig. Gen. John A. Seitz, Commanding General of Ft. Riley, will be the speaker at the Baccalaureate service . . . Salina homes were opened to Cadets on Sunday, May 7. The Cadets met their hosts at various Salina churches. Following church services, the Cadets were guests in the homes for dinner . . . Rain dampens senior outing at PECUSA.

COMMENCEMENT--1977

The one-act play, "The Tell Tale Heart" won a first division rating at the Regional speech and Drama festival and will now be entered in state competition . . . In the name of the Trustees, faculty and staff of St. John's Military School, I want to say, "Congratulations to the Class of '87 of the 99th Corps."

At the same time, I offer our best wishes to the Class of '88 of the 100th Corps.

In a moment the ring you have been waiting for will be placed on your finger by the person you have selected.

It's a simple, yet handsome ring--a band of white gold, a black stone, the School crest, your name--either the 99th or 100th Corps.

While I referred to it as a simple ring, it carries with it a tremendous amount of meaning. One senior Cadet told me it would be like receiving and wearing a piece of the School. The ring you will wear is a piece of the School. The ring you will wear is a piece of St. John's--not a piece of Sage Hall or Perkins Field, but a symbol of the many persons who touched your life and the experiences you have had here in Salina.

Your ring embodies the past, the present and the future.

The first day you arrived on campus you were confused, shy, uncertain, insecure--and a few of you were downright mad.

Stop for a moment and think. Can you begin to count the number of persons who have in some way touched your life and helped you become what you are today?

Stop for a moment and consider the many experiences you have had--both good and bad. Think of how you felt this morning when the 100 flags went up! Think of how you felt going down Santa Fe in the parade!

Only each of you individually can describe what it felt to you when you stepped through that arch.

Your ring is a symbol of each of these experiences, of each of the persons who has touched your life, and of what you will become as the result.

Your ring is a symbol of the present. It is a sign of who each of you is as an individual. It represents you as you are today. It represents what is deep inside--the love, the fear, the potential, the uncertainty--whether you are a graduating senior--or a junior who will return to help lead the 100th Corps.

It is a sign of who you are as a class. It speaks of the bonds of friendship that exists among you. It speaks of the "come-from-three touchdowns behind in the 4th quarter" football victory you experienced last fall, of SAT and ACT tests, of a Crack Squad trip and a hundred other happy memories. It speaks of questions about the future, of who you are and where you are going.

Your ring is a symbol of the future. It represents your dreams, your hopes, your goals--those things you are able to become and those things you are able to help others become.

While your ring means very much to you today, the day will come when you will lay it aside. When that day comes, do not lay aside your dreams, your hopes, your aspirations.

Your life lies ahead. Treasure it -- appreciate it -- and thank God for it.

You may now put on your ring.

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"I Envy Your Future" Says Marine Colonel

"I envy your future, don't let it slip through your fingers, reach out, grab it and grow with it" said Col. Al Ransom, Class of 1956 and commander of the Camp Pendleton Marine Air Station, during his commencement address, Sunday, May 24.

Addressing the 99th Corps, Ransom said, "I cannot help but reflect on the past, in what I call the end of an era and a new beginning."

"The future holds unlimited opportunities. Technology has opened the doors. When I started flying 28 years ago, the planes were rather primitive. It was up to the individual. Now the planes are computerized and tell you what to do."

In the world of computers, Ransom commented, "You ain't seen nothing yet."

"St. John's has shown you the way. And like all old boys come back and be proud to have been a part of the history of St. John's."

In reflecting on the past, Ransom said, "St. John's is not a building. It is people like the Clems, Guernseys, Howers, Duckers, Foncks and the Loys.

They were like our parents and we loved them for it. With the 1987 graduating class it has been the people that have loved and helped you."

He said, "I stand before you as an officer of the Marines, so I'll address two constant questions. Lt. Col. Oliver North, right or wrong, an overzealous Marine who thought he was carrying out the guidance of the commander in chief. I will not pre-judge the Marine Security guards but in over 200 U.S. embassies throughout the World Marines have protected them with honor since World War II. Marines don't quit."

"I also stand before you as an old boy grad of '56 and my love for St. John's is just as strong as my devotion to the Marine Corps."
