## Junior Choir On Radio Show

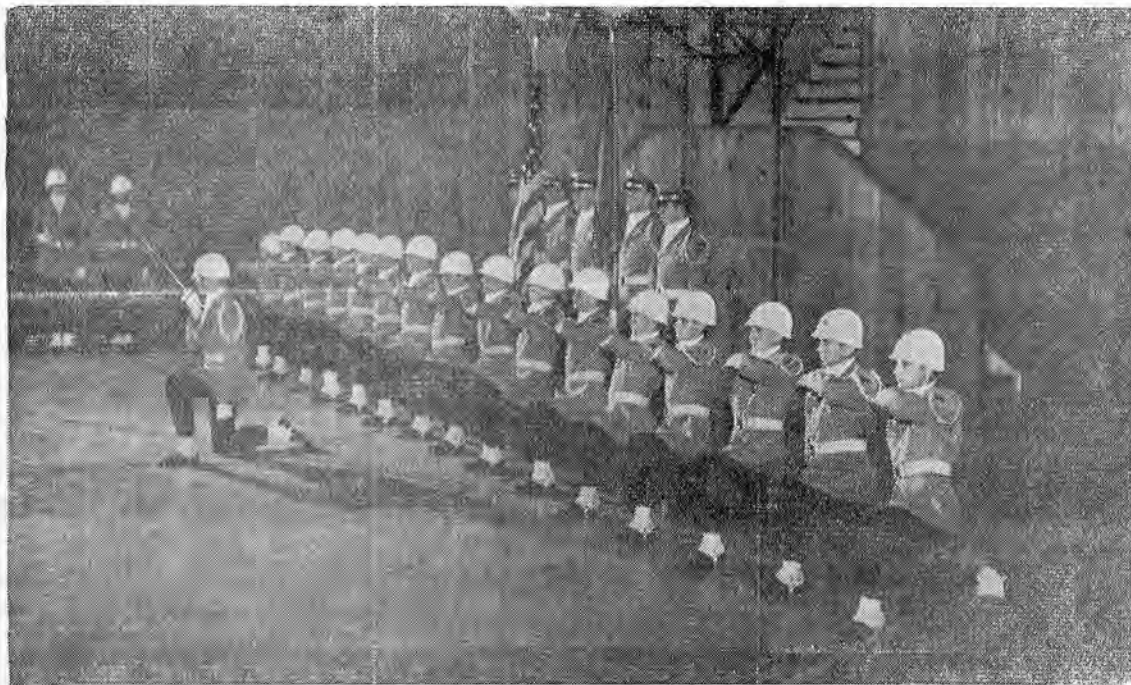
The Junior Choir under the direction of Father Pratt will be heard publicly for the first time during Christmas furlough over radio station K. S. A. L.

A gift exchange and various games took up most of the evening. Refreshments were served.

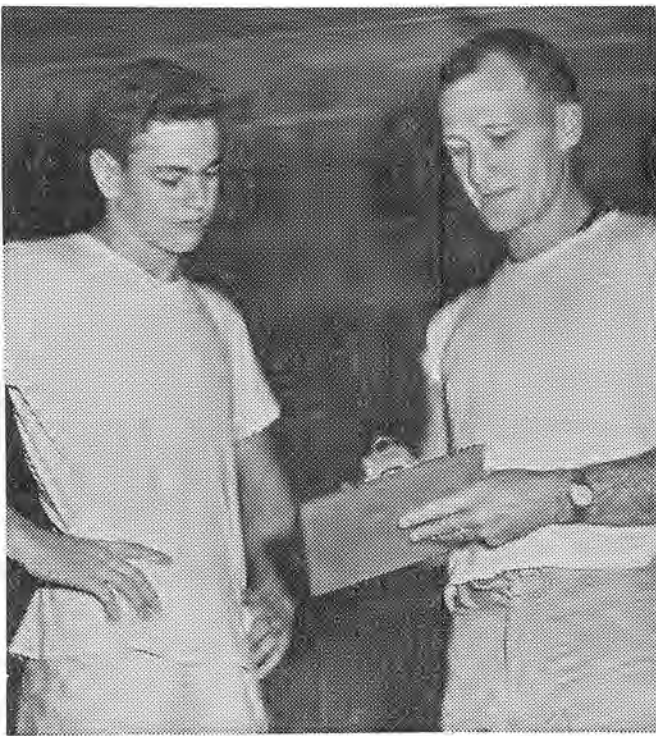

Heading the Rector's Honor Roll for the Senior School during the third grading period was Jerry Moore.

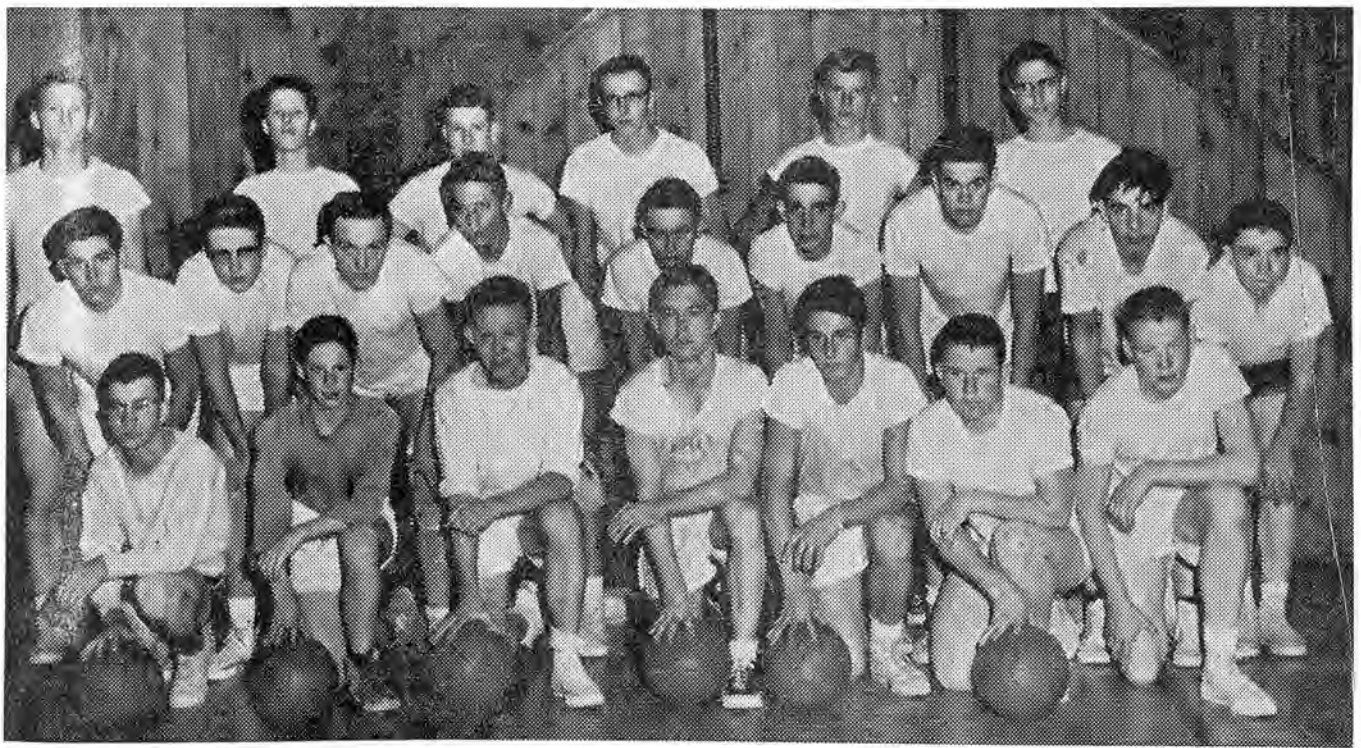

Assaria stopped the Cadet "B" 47-25, Enterprise won a thriller 35-34, and the Cadets downed Brookville 33-27.

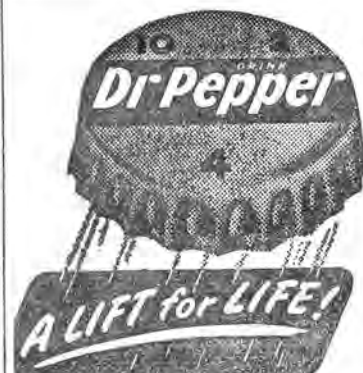
