Cadets Enrolled From 15 States

Colorado Has Largest Delegation

More than 100 Cadets from 15 states reported to St. John's on Sept. 4-6, as the school's 69th year of operation got underway.

Largest delegation of Cadets hails from the state of Colorado with 39 enrolled. Denver is the city with the largest representation with 19 boys at St. John's.

Kansas places second with 33 students at St. John's; 14 of them from Wichita, the city with the second largest representation.

Other states represented at SJMS this year are Missouri, New Mexico, Wyoming, Arizona, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, California, South Dakota, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Utah, Texas and Illinois.

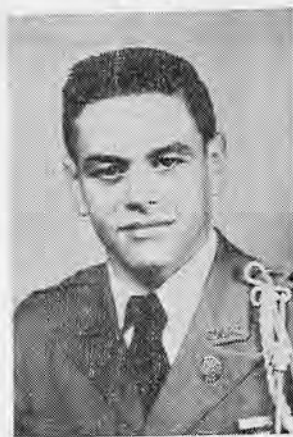

Bob Pave Suffers
Injuries To Arms, Legs

Cadet Bob Pave, 16-year-old junior from Albuquerque, N.M., escaped serious injury on Saturday evening, Oct. 1, when he fell beneath the wheels of a hay rack loaded with Cadets and their dates.

The group was enroute to State Lake at Bennington for a picnic.

Pave suffered severely bruised arms and legs and a loss of flesh on one arm which will necessitate skin grafting.

The fact that the hay rack had rubber tires may have saved the Cadet from much more serious injury. His arms apparently absorbed the weight of the vehicle.

The accident happened about 5:30 p.m. about one mile south of Bennington. Pave, accompanied by two senior cadets, was rushed to St. John's Hospital in Salina by Richard Bruce, a farmer living near the scene of the accident.

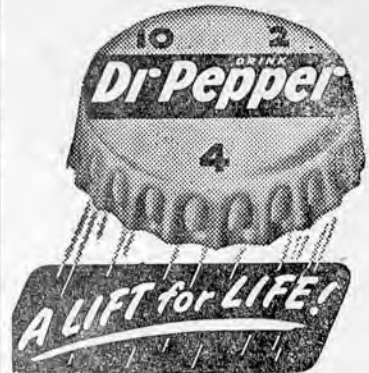
Pep-Rally Held

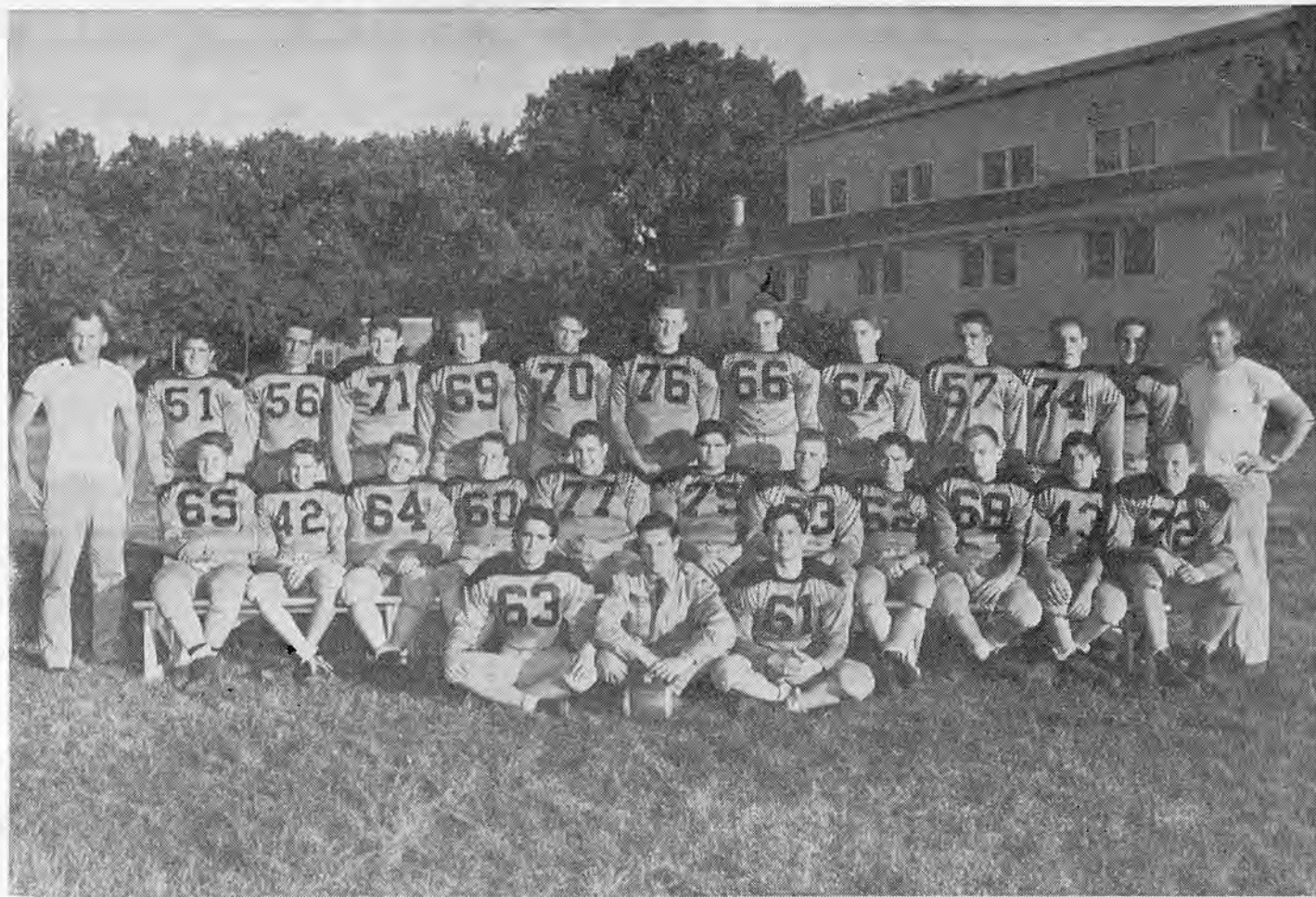

Cadets Defeated In First Two Games

Minus the backfield speed that carried the Cadets to a 4-2-2 record in 1954, Coach Jim Elmborg's 1955 edition of the St. John's football team has been unsuccessful in their initial two outings this year.

The Cadets dropped their opener to Hope High by a 14-7 count, after going to the dressing room at halftime sporting a 7-0 lead. Lack of depth and experience in the backfield stopped the St. John's crew from getting but one scoring drive underway.

Ransom Scores

Al Ransom, veteran quarterback and only lettered back on the squad, bucked over for the touchdown and then fired a pass to veteran junior end Fred Schram for the extra point.

Hope came back to tally twice in the third period to sew up the game.

In the second game the Cadets were completely undermanned as the Little River Redskins got revenge for the drubbing they took from the Cadets a year ago by grinding out a 39-6 victory.

Ransom punched over the Cadets' only TD on an eight yard jaunt around end to prevent a

whitewash from the Redskins.

Good Line Play

In both of the games this season stellar line play has been turned in by lettermen Tom Sweigart, Gail Eilebrecht, Guy Benitez, Kirk Maslin and Fred Schram. Newcomers Roger Bacon, Bill Beech and Larry Spencer also have been showing promise of better days to come.

Rounding out the Cadet starting backfield with Ransom in the first two games have been Dave Wylie and Dan Keating at the halfback slots, with freshman Pete Calhoun playing fullback. Dan Chilcote and Bruce Cuddeback have been filling defense backfield assignments.

Other boys on the squad are Everett Beck, George Couvion, Bruce Forrester, Tom Garrett, Jim Jeppesen, Coors Kugeler, Park Learned, Jim Miller, Ed Stone, Paul Stappenbeck, Jerry Spray and Jim Yeagain.

The Cadets have an open date on Friday, Oct. 7, but swing back into action against Glasco High at Glasco on Oct. 14.
