



# Record Enrollment - - - - 155 Cadets

## 72nd Year Is Underway

St. John's Military School began its 72nd year of operation with a record enrollment of 155 cadets September 6.

The cadets represent 16 states and the District of Columbia, Venezuela, Bolivia, Puerto Rico, Cuba and Germany.

New boys arrived Sunday, September 6, for two days of orientation, testing and enrollment. Old boys reported on Tuesday, September 8 for enrollment. Classes began September 9.

Opening day activities included conferences with faculty officers, a coffee for parents, a bus tour of Salina and Schilling Air Force Base, and a chapel service.

The school year opened with four new faculty officers and some remodeling of the administration building and barracks rooms and addition of new equipment.

Colorado is represented by 47 cadets. Kansas follows closely with 38 cadets. Sixteen cadets hail from New Mexico with nine from Wyoming, and Nebraska, five from Oklahoma and six from Missouri.

## "Free Time" Activities Participation Included In Character Ratings

A new rating scale for the participation in non-required school activities section of the Character Rating report will be used this year at St. John's Military School.

This rating scale will attempt to indicate to parents what each

cadet is doing during his "free" time.

The activities and points received for participation are varsity sports, four points; Crack Platoon, Crack Squad, Librarians Club, Rifle Club, Radio, Photo Club, Publications, two points; "S" Club, Key Club, Na-

tional Honor Society, Decorating Committee, bowling, boxing and hobby shop, one point.

Any cadet having eight or more points would earn a character rating of one. A cadet with seven activity points would receive a character rating of two in that section. A

cadet with only one activity point would receive a ranking of eight.

A cadet participating in Crack Squad, Rifle Club and NHS would receive five points. When checked against the rating scale it would give that cadet a rating of five or an average ranking.

## Plans Are Announced For Spring Trip

The national capitol and New York City are on the agenda for the 1960 spring trip, according to an announcement made recently in an all-school assembly by Col. R. L. Clem, Rector.

Sophomores, juniors and seniors are eligible to make the trip, Colonel Clem said.

The trip, sponsored by the

Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, is planned for next March 25 through 31. Cost is expected to be around \$155.

This will be the fifth annual trip endorsed by St. John's. Cadets who are "academically eligible" will be excused from classes to make the trip. A Cadet's academic status will be reviewed by a committee headed by Lt. H. E. Nuss, Senior Master, before the Cadet is excused to make the trip.

Highlights of the trip will include complete bus tours of both New York and Washington, the stock exchange in New York, a tour of Chinatown, a

trip to the top of the Empire State building, tours of federal buildings in Washington, a luncheon in the Senate dining room with one of the Kansas U. S. senators, a tour of the F.B.I. building and a tour of the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, and many other points of interest.

The cost of the trip is all inclusive. Only money needed by those making the trip will be for things of a personal nature.

Parents of upper class Cadets will receive a complete itinerary from the school in the near future. Registration for the trip must be made by Feb. 15.

# Gridders Bow In Initial Three Contests

St. John's inexperienced and young football team has been defeated in its first three contests but is making a stronger showing in each encounter.

But the Cadets haven't been able to push that football across the goal line yet.

### Geneseo-47 Cadets-0

The Cadets were no match for a veteran Geneseo club in its first contest Friday, Sept. 18.

The host team scored a 47-0 triumph in the season opener.

Geneseo, with 14 lettermen, punched out two touchdowns in each of the first three quarters and added a single counter in the final quarter.
