## Trip to Schilling O. Q. Range Completes Second Phase for 49

## Message From Rector

All over the Christian world Easter is being celebrated in many ways. To some, Easter will mean bunny rabbits, Easter eggs, the Easter parade, new hats and, to some, it will mean the annual recalling of the Resurrection of Jesus. While it is true that Easter is the celebration of life as shown by flowers, Spring and anthems of affirmation, it is much more the story of how faith became a reality. How it made ordinary men extra-ordinary and frightened men fearless. Faith in immortal life is almost as old as mankind. It is recorded in songs and sacraments as far back as human records run.

But now here is the theme of man's eternal life told in the New Testament story of the Resurrection of our Lord. The Christian accepts the story of the Resurrection calmly and confidently—not asking if it did happen but why it happened and what his individual response to it should be. Some things we can believe in part, but not Easter. It is either all right or all false.

The story of Jesus' last week begins with his entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday when he proclaimed Himself to be the Son of God. It continues when he drove the money changers out of the Temple. It grows increasingly in importance when he and his 12 closest friends met for their Last Supper and rises to a climax in his seizure by the soldiers of Rome and his trial by Pilot and condemnation by the people.

The glory of the last week began Easter morning with the discovery that the prophecies foretold by generations of prophets had come true. The Resurrection showed to mankind for once and all the truth about death. That it is separation, not destruction. That body and soul will part and that there is eternal life.

Easter reminds us to abolish death in our minds; to let us think as Jesus taught—that friends and loved ones are not permanently separated from us but that we lose them temporarily to find them perfectly.

"Why seek ye the living among the dead? He is not here but is risen!"
