The St. John's Crack Drill Platoon missed an introduction on the Ed Sullivan TV show because Jimmy Durante and his new bride happened to make the show.

The Platoon, commanded by Cadet Maj. Ted Jones was in the New York City area for a series of public appearances from Feb. 11 to 14.

Following attendance at the show's dress rehearsal, a group of five Cadets and Maj. R. L. Guernsey were given seats near the front in case there was time for an introduction. Also accompanying the group was Lt. Cmdr. H. E. Nuss, senior master.

Arriving at the theater that evening, the Cadets found their chairs had been taken by Jimmy Durante and his party.

Purpose of the trip for the St. John's delegation was to participate in the induction of a Cadet Squadron at St. Paul's School on Long Island.

Col. Mullin, national Air Force Liaison Officer with the Civil Air Patrol, and five members of his staff conducted the activating ceremonies following which the St. John's squad performed.

Following a two-day delay because of weather and plane trouble, the Cadets left Salina Saturday, Feb. 11, and landed at Mitchell AFB on Long Island.

The group was greeted by Lt. Col. Tom Ward of St. Paul's School and a CAP group officer, and Capt. Dorothy Welker, Nassua County CAP commander.

The St. John's Cadets were guests in the homes of parents of students of St. Paul's School on Long Island during their New York visit.

On Sunday, the Cadets attended church with their hosts and then were transported to New York City to attend the Sullivan show.

A performance before the

entire student body of St. Paul's School was given Monday morning before the Cadets left for a bus sight-seeing tour of New York and free-time in the City.

The group left Mitchell AFB for the trip home Tuesday, Feb. 14, arriving in Salina at 11 pm.





An increasing amount of attention is being given the number of extra-curricular activities in which a high school student participates. Receiving particular attention are sports and club activities that take a student away from his books.

Discussing the topic "should a student be limited to the number of activities in which he can participate" are five St. John's Cadets.

They are Peter Black, freshman, Scottsbluff, Neb.; Phil Hargrove, sophomore, Omaha, Neb.; Butch Morrison, senior, Corpus Christi, Texas; Jeff Lantz, junior, and Doug White, senior, both of Denver, Colo.

White ... "I think the school should help regulate activities. There isn't a 25-hour day and it is hard to cram everything in especially if you are carrying five solids."

Morrison ... "A student should limit himself according to his own abilities. I think academics come first. You can be a football star and still flunk out. I think a student should live and plan for the future."

White ... "Activities are important. I know a boy who had good grades but was turned down by the Air Force Academy because he hadn't taken part in other activities."

Black ... "I think your school subjects should come first and activities later — if you can handle them."

White ... "What if you are invited to join a group? It's hard to turn down an invitation to membership."

Hargrove ... "I think it is alright for a boy to take part in as many activities as he can handle."

Lantz ... "I agree with Hargrove but I think good grades come first."

White ... "If clubs were regulated, all students might have more of a chance to belong."

Morrison ... "Clubs should not have membership quotas, by that I mean they shouldn't be limited to a certain number."

Hargrove ... "Certain clubs are limited by academic requirements such as the National Honor Society."

Black ... "I think everyone should have some activities."

Hargrove ... "It seems if you belong to lots of clubs it becomes a matter of prestige. Belonging to clubs is just a popularity contest in some schools."

Morrison ... "I still think a high school student should be mature enough to know his own limitations and make his own decisions."

Hargrove ... "They should know but do they?"

Lantz ... "A student, can just be a member, not be a leader and still make good grades."

Morrison ... "Many clubs restrict themselves because of membership requirements such as S-Club and NHS. A good student couldn't be restricted because he would be just bound to be in everything."

White ... "I think belonging to clubs should be a gradual process. My first year here I wasn't in anything."

Morrison ... "I think a Cadet should join because they get acquainted faster."

Hargrove ... "I think activities help you from getting homesick. If you're active, you just don't have time to mope around."

Morrison ... "You can't make a Cadet join things if he wants to be a hermit."

Lantz ... "As the old saying goes—You can lead a horse to water but you can't make him drink."
