16th Army Corps Commander Honored At First Visit Here

"Schools like St. John's are the Army's 'farm system' for officer leadership," said Maj. Gen. Thomas N. Griffin, Omaha, Neb., during his recent visit to St. John's Military School.

General Griffin, commander of the 16th Army Corps, inspected facilities at St. John's on Saturday, October 22. He is in charge of all Army Reserve activities in Nebraska, Colorado, Kansas and Wyoming.

Declares Amnesty

All tours of duty and confinements for Cadets were cancelled by Maj. Gen. Thomas N. Griffin, commander of the 16th Army Corps, during his visit at the school October 22.

General Griffin made his announcement following lunch in the mess hall. His request that all confinements be cancelled was met with enthusiasm and applause by the Cadets.

He termed the cadets at St. John's and at similar schools "one of the most important Army Support elements." St. John's is a member of the National Defense Cadet Corps, under the control of the 16th Army Corps. The school also is a member of the Civil Air Patrol. It is the only school in the nation maintaining membership in both groups.

The Corps had a retreat parade at 11 am on Perkins Athletic Field in honor of General Griffin.

General and Mrs. Griffin arrived at 10 am from Ft. Riley where they had spent the night. They were greeted by school officials and a Cadet Honor Guard. They were guests of honor at a coffee at The Rectory and were introduced to staff members and their wives.

General Griffin then inspected Upper School facilities and the barracks. He shook hands with most Upper School Cadets.

The Griffins were guests of staff and Cadet Corps at a luncheon in the Mess Hall following the parade.

At 7:30 pm, General Griffin attended the annual formal military ball of the Mid-Kansas Chapter of the Reserve Officers Association at the Salina Country Club. The St. John's Crack Drill Squad performed at intermission of the dance.

General Griffin was accompanied by his aide, 1st Lt. John Mitchell.

Juniors Take P.S.A.T. Tests

A group of 28 juniors took the preliminary scholastic aptitude tests during the month of October.

The PSAT, given to juniors, is a two-hour version of the College Board's three-hour Scholastic Aptitude Test which is given to high school seniors. Both tests use the same type of multiple-choice questions and measure the same verbal and mathematical abilities.

Lt. Cmdr. H. E. Nuss, Senior Master, said the test gives a measure of ability independent of the school's own grading standards. "Scores can be related to certain standards for academic success at 250 colleges and universities that are members of the College Entrance Examination Boards, as well as many other colleges," he said.
