Commencement activities at St. John's Military School went on as scheduled in spite of the rainy weather which hampered outdoor activities. The 73rd year ended on May 21.

Awards and honors were presented and diplomas were awarded to 32 graduating seniors.

Speaker at the combined baccalaureate-commencement service was the Rev. Canon Sidney W. Goldsmith jr., rector and headmaster of Shattuck School, Faribault, Minn. He spoke on the thought "if the youth of America want to do something for the world, they might try going to work." In elaborating on the thought he discussed the "fifth freedom as the freedom to be one's best." He said unless we have this freedom we are in danger of losing the other four freedoms—freedom of speech, religion, fear and want.

Fr. Goldsmith said that this fifth freedom may be lost because of three misunderstandings. "We misunderstand the meaning of democracy. There is the feeling that it is undemocratic to be one's best. We feel we must give all the same opportunities and we fear programs for the gifted may be undemocratic."

"There is the misunderstanding of what makes for happiness. The vanishing hickory stick is being replaced by the psychologist. We excuse rather than challenge."

He said, "We have a misunderstanding of values. Our weakness comes from denying the existence of values and giving up the search."

Fr. Goldsmith queried, "What can we do?" In answer he said, "We can challenge—without challenge there is no response. We can have the right of failure. What kind of a freedom do we have where no-one can fail? And we can expose students to the best values we have known. We can have the privilege of working harder and reaching higher standards."

The senior line followed in the church since a rain storm caused it to be moved indoors.

The Commencement weekend began with an Awards Assembly at 8 pm Friday. Parent-faculty conferences were held Saturday morning. The Military Field day was held in Agriculture Hall in Kenwood Park due to wet parade grounds.

About 500 persons attended the Senior Dance and buffet luncheon.

Wiley Banes, president of the Foundation, was host to a reception in honor of the faculty from 5 to 8 pm Saturday.

Following the lowering of the colors, the battalion was dismissed forever and Cadets started on their various ways home.

Cummings, who is in his eighth year at Tescott, was graduated from Moline high school in 1934 and received a bachelor of science degree from Pittsburg State in 1939. He obtained his master's degree from Pittsburg in 1950.


The Cadets were guests of Company E of the First Battle group of the Fifth Infantry, First Division.
