73rd Year Underway

Record Enrollment At St. John's

St. John's Military School opened the door on its 73rd year with a record enrollment of 160 cadets Sunday, Sept. 4.

New boys reported on Sunday, Sept. 4 for an orientation program and enrollment. Open-day activities included a bus tour of Salina and Schilling Air Force Base, an introductory program and a coffee for parents.

Former students arrived on Tuesday, Sept. 6 and classes began, Sept. 7.

Colorado has the largest representation with 53 cadets enrolled. There are 29 enrolled from Kansas, 21 from New Mexico, 11 from Nebraska, 6 from Oklahoma, and 13 from Wyoming. Other states represented are Arizona, California, Idaho, Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oregon and Texas.

Four Cadets are enrolled from Caracas, Venezuela.

EDITORIAL

MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

Benjamin Franklin said "good education of youth has been esteemed by wise men of all ages as the surest foundation of happiness, both of private family and commonwealths". No one will quarrel with this excellent opinion, but there are about as many ideas as to how the 'good education' is to be achieved as there are people talking and writing about it.

The beginning of a school year is an appropriate time for cadets, faculty and patrons to examine the St. John's Philosophy of Education which was adopted several years ago as the framework within which the 'good education' is striven for here.

1. To provide an active Christian environment (under the auspices of the Episcopal Church) for all boys who come under the school's jurisdiction, regardless of faith or belief.
2. To provide daily formal worship of God in the School Chapel according to Episcopal Church form.
3. To instill a belief that our lives are centered in God and that we must relate everything we do to Him.
4. To maintain a high level of instruction by well-trained teachers, small classes, individual help and supervised study hours.
5. To provide a growth environment in which a boy can have continuous encouragement and inspiration.
6. To provide a framework of moderate, sensible and appropriate discipline in which a boy can live comfortably; the terms of which he will be taught to understand and accept willingly.
7. To help each boy become acquainted with his own shortcomings and abilities and to inspire him to correct the former and develop the latter.
8. To help each boy develop latent qualities of leadership.
9. To accept only boys of good character who can be expected to profit from their attendance at the school.
10. To prepare students for college.
11. To prepare students to take an active and wholesome part in their communities.

"You can't get ahead unless you read" says a recent article by George Gallup, the poll taker. And this is especially true if you are planning to attend college.

Any student going through college is likely to encounter certain great books. Even if literature is not your field of interest, you will read many of the classics in required English and humanities courses. And you will have a head start if you have already read some of the books.

Some of them are difficult but even they can be understood to some degree and this preliminary acquaintance will make the books more meaningful and alive when reread under a professor's guidance.

A recent magazine took a poll of colleges and universities to compile a list of twenty books a college student is likely to read. These are the books most commonly mentioned as a part of reading requirements.

"The Odyssey", Homer; "Oedipus Rex", Sophocles; "The Republic", Plato; "Canterbury Tales", Chaucer; "The Prince", Machiavelli; "Hamlet", Shakespeare; "Poems", John Donne; "Paradise Lost", Milton; "Gulliver's Travels", Swift; "An Essay on Man", Pope; "Poems", Keats; "Great Expectations", Dickens; "Crime and Punishment", Dostoevsky; "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn", Clemens; "Saint Joan", Shaw; "Poems", Yeats; "The Waste Land", Eliot; "Light in August", Faulkner; "A Farewell to Arms", Hemingway; and "Death of a Salesman", Miller.

Playing in a rain that ranged from light drizzle to a downpour, the St. John's Cadets dropped their opening football game of the season to the Hope Lions, 27-6, on Sept. 23.

The Lions, with a 28-6 win under their belts over Alta Vista a week earlier, found the Cadet defense tough and could forge only a 14-6 lead going into the fourth period.

Kenny Ballantyne, fleet Hope halfback, was the difference all night and it was he who broke the game wide-open in the fourth quarter with a 57-yard touchdown romp. The Cadet line kept the Lions contained well most of the game except for Ballantyne's off-tackle slants and end runs.

Hope struck for the final touchdown with just seconds remaining in the game.

The lone Cadet tally came in the third period with fullback Randy Copeland smacking over from eight yards out on a fourth and goal situation.

The big difference in the game was the Cadets' inability to put together much of an offensive punch.

Coach Bob McCandless, starting his first year as head grid mentor at St. John's, was high in his praise for the Cadets in spite of the loss. "The boys did not quit at any time during the game. They showed more life and desire to win than could have been anticipated," he said.
