SCHOOL YEAR STARTS WITH RECORD ENROLLMENT

171 Cadets In Corps; Colorado Tops List With 54 Boys

St. John's Military School opened for the 1961-62 school year with a record enrollment of 171 Cadets.

The Cadets come from 17 states and two foreign countries, Venezuela and Lebanon.

Colorado has the largest representation with 54 boys enrolled from that state. Other states with large representations are Kansas, 30; New Mexico, 27; Wyoming, 13, and Nebraska, 17.

Five Cadets are enrolled from Texas and six from Oklahoma. Three are enrolled from California and three from Caracas, Venezuela.

Among the cities represented, Denver has the largest number of Cadets enrolled with 16 boys. Nine boys are from Casper and eight from Santa Fe, New Mexico.

New boys reported to the school on Sunday, Sept. 3 for enrollment. Monday, Sept. 4, was spent in testing and orientation. Former Cadets reported on Tuesday, Sept. 5 and classes began on Wednesday, Sept. 6.

Foundation Secretary On Trip

Capt. Jack P. McCandless, Executive Secretary of the St. John's Foundation, left Sept. 25, for a three-week trip through Nebraska, Wyoming and Colorado.

He will call on parents of Cadets and former Cadets, alumni and friends of the school in various towns in the three states. He will also call on Episcopal clergymen.

Capt. McCandless said he hopes to be in Casper, Wyo. to attend the meeting of that chapter of the St. John's Foundation. He said, "I certainly urge all parents, particularly of new Cadets to attend. I will try to contact all parents along the way."

Depending on time, Capt. McCandless may make some calls in Western Kansas. He will return to Salina in mid-October.

Trips are also planned through New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri during the school year.

He asks that any persons knowing of former Cadets to write the name down and give it to him when he calls.

Summer Remodeling Jobs Improve Physical Plant

Two major remodeling projects were completed at St. John's during the summer. The shower rooms in the original barracks were renovated and the mess hall redecorated.

New showers, ceramic wainscoting and tile flooring were installed in the three shower rooms in the barracks in Vail Hall. Windows were removed and glass blocks and exhaust fans installed. A vanity-type lavatory bar was added along with new lighting and mirrors.

Cost of the project was \$11,000 made partially possible by cash gifts to the school.

New suspension beams were installed in the mess hall. The beams eliminated 12 supporting posts. The brick interior was spray-painted with beige paint.

The new beams were covered with mahogany and mahogany paneling was added to the walls. The ceiling was lowered and acoustical tile installed.

Indirect lighting was added on either side of the six supporting beams. A public address system, a gift of the Key Club, was installed.

The room features four murals depicting life at St. John's painted by Ted Cowan, an art student at Bethany College, Lindsborg.

The serving area from the kitchen was remodeled to facilitate the smoother flow of traffic.

The floor was sanded and refinished. New furnishing will include new chairs in a coral color, a gift of the St. John's Foundation. Cost of the chairs was \$2000.

New table and silverware was added.

A platform was built-in at the west end of the dining hall. The Rector's table has been placed on the platform.

New Officers Join Faculty

Four new officers have joined the staff of St. John's Military School for the 1961-62 year.

Capt. Scott Haviland, Lexington, Mo., is the new quartermaster and is an assistant instructor in the military program.

He comes from Wentworth Military School where he was an ROTC instructor for the Army. Capt. Haviland has retired after 20 years service in the Army and two years service in the Air Force.

He served as an infantry officer in Europe, the South Pacific, Korea, Japan, England and Scotland. He has been awarded the Bronze Star, Army commendation ribbon, beachhead arrow and four campaign stars.

An amateur tournament golfer, he was B-flight champion in the Missouri sand greens tournament and was club champion in Lexington. He will teach golf in connection with the physical fitness program.

He is married and his wife, Leona, assists in the quartermaster department. They have three sons, Babe, Jerry and Chuck.

Lt. Loren K. Roush, Burlingame, will be an instructor of mathematics and science. A graduate of Washburn University, Topeka, he completed work for a master of science degree at Emporia State Teachers College this summer. He has been a National Science Foundation student for the past three summers.

He is married and the father of two daughters, Lisa and Susan, and a son, David.

Lt. Bruce Cummings and Lt. Harold Frazier will teach in the Junior School.

Lt. Cummings will be Junior School director. He was principal of Tescott high school for eight years. Cummings received his bachelor's and Master's degrees from Pittsburg State Teachers College. He has taught 20 years.

Lt. Frazier, 111 E. Republic, Salina, was graduated from Salina high school in May 1945. He was graduated from Kansas Wesleyan University in 1950 and completed requirements for his master's degree from Emporia State College.

He was principal at Culver grade school for six years and at Tescott grade school for four years.

Physical Fitness

President John F. Kennedy has called for an all-out drive to improve the physical fitness of the youth of America. It is important that this call should not go unheeded.

The need for improved physical well-being is made clear by the great number of draftees rejected for physical fitness each year. The "softness" of American youth in comparison to the youth of other countries has become a national concern.

The Defense Department has shown an awareness of the problem by ordering a service-wide physical fitness program. The Civil Air Patrol is urging its units to adopt the physical fitness standards set by the Defense program.

St. John's also became aware of this problem and started a physical fitness program last spring. It sets a minimum number of push-ups; sprints and other exercises a boy is expected to be able to perform. The object is to get and keep all Cadets in top physical condition.

Individuals can take advantage of the program by attempting to meet or exceed the minimum set. By working, Cadets can meet the challenge the program offers.

The improvement in physical fitness of Cadets could serve as an example for other youth groups.

Two Courses Added To Curriculum

Two new courses have been added to the curriculum at St. John's school this year.

World Geography is offered as a semester elective and is taught by Col. G. H. Graham. There are 14 enrolled.

French II, new to the curriculum this year, is being taught by the Rev. M. Lester Harn. French I was added to the curriculum last year.

Health, a graduation requirement, is taught as a semester course for the first time this year and is open to any student. Each graduate must also have 1½ units of physical fitness during four years of high school in order to meet the Kansas requirement of two units of health and physical education.

St. John's grants ½ unit credit for each year of physical fitness participation, said Lt. Cmdr. H. E. Nuss, Senior Master. All Cadets are required to participate in the new program.

Physical Fitness Program Under way at St. John's

Each St. John's Cadet has been measured for height, weight, neck-size, chest-size (normal and expanded,) biceps, thigh-size and calf-size.

All this information was placed on cards at the beginning of the physical fitness program. Capt. V. B. Loy, physical fitness director, said he plans to take the measurements again at the end of the semester and at the end of the year. He said then they can tell if the big boys have lost some fat and if the little boys have developed.

Basic calisthenics are taking up most of the physical education period from 3:45 to 5:15 pm on Mondays, Tuesday, Thursday, and Fridays.

Cadets have been doing push-ups, sit-ups, leg-lifts and the 100-yard dash. The Cadets have been running endurance races in cadence by platoons.

Soccer games and volley ball competition will begin as soon as the playing fields are ready.

A chin-up bar to accommodate four Cadets is being built. It will be the first step in a planned obstacle course to be built during the year on the northeast corner of the campus.

To be included in the course are a balance beam, vertical wall climb, an up-over-under course to snake through, stomach crawl, hand-over-hand lad-

der and a rope swing. Capt. Loy said the final phase of the course will be the 100-yard dash back to the starting point.

Cadets will be timed while working the obstacle course.

Charts have been made to record the number of chin-ups, push-ups and rope climbs a Cadet can do. They will then be compared with the national norms.

Immediate plans call for intra-squad competition in the 100-yard dash to eventually end in a battalion champion. A tug-of-war is also planned in the near future.

Capt. Loy is assisted by Lt. Dale Browning, basketball coach, and Capt. Robert McCandless, athletic director and wrestling coach. Other faculty officers are called upon to assist with the program at various times.

Practice for varsity basketball and wrestling will begin Nov. 1. Lt. Rex DeRusseau will instruct the boxing team. Capt. Scott Haviland will coach a golfing team in the spring.

Cadets not out far varsity sport will continue with basic calisthenics.

The spring program will include intra-squad volleyball and softball games and varsity track. Rifle calisthenics will also be held in the spring.

Cadets Attend Band Concert

The St. John's Cadet Corps attended the concert given by the U.S. Army Field Band Sept. 8 in Salina.

The Corps marched from the school to Memorial Hall where the concert was presented. The Corps was recognized and commended for its appearance and conduct by the Band director near the close of the concert.

St. John's Gets Honor School Rating In N.D.C.C. Program

St. John's Military School was designated as an honor school in the National Defense Cadet Corps program.

The honor school ranking, highest given, was awarded as a result of an inspection held last spring.

To obtain an honor rating, a school must have attained an exceptionally high standard of training and discipline.

Col. A. Y. Hardy, professor of military science and training, said the advantage to a Cadet of such ranking is that he is given more consideration in his military training. A Cadet may enter competition for the United States Military Academy, and if he wins in this competition he will need no further appointment. This privilege is given only to those students who show outstanding performance both from an academic and military standpoint.

Col. Hardy said schools must be highly accredited academically and have high standards throughout their programs as well as being exceptional in military discipline and training.
