Honor School Rating Is Goal . . .

Annual Inspection Date Set

The National Defense Cadet Corps annual inspection of the military program is set for Friday, April 6.

Cadets will spend the day displaying the knowledge they have acquired in handling military equipment assigned the school for its training program. An "Honor School" rating for a second straight year is the goal of every Cadet.

St. John's Military School was designed as an Honor School, the highest rating, following the inspection last year.

Included will be various ceremonies, parades and informal guard mounts as demonstrations for the inspecting team.

School military records will be checked and all property examined.

The names of the inspecting officers have not been announced.

Books Added To Library
