## New Military Head Named

### Lt. Col. J. V. Ausan Will Become P.M.S.—Commandant In Sept.

The appointment of Lt. Col. James V. Ausan to the combined position on the St. John's Military School faculty of Professor of Military Science and Commandant was announced this week by Col. R. L. Clem, rector.

Colonel Ausan will assume his new duties next September.

Maj. Russell L. Guernsey, veteran St. John's Commandant of Cadets, will relinquish his duties as chief Cadet disciplinarian to head the science department and devote his full efforts to that area. He is a candidate for the Master of Science degree at Kansas State Teachers College, Emporia, this summer.

Capt. Arthur V. Long, acting Professor of Military Science since the death of Lt. Col. A. Y. Hardy in December, will assist Col. Ausan in the military program and continue to teach chemistry and physical science.

In announcing the appointment of Colonel Ausan, Colonel Clem praised the work done over the past 15 years by Major Guernsey. He will be given the title of Commandant

Emeritus and act as senior advisor to Colonel Ausan.

The Rector commended Captain Long for an "outstanding job, well done" in filling in after Colonel Hardy's death. "Captain Long's long hours of extra work have insured a continuing program that might have otherwise fallen apart under the circumstances," the Rector said.

Colonel Ausan comes to St. John's with a long and distinguished military record. He entered the U.S. Army in 1941 and served as a rifle company commander and Battalion Intelligence officer during the Italian campaign. During the Korean War he was Chief of the Miscellaneous Section, G-1 at theatre headquarters in Seoul.

His present assignment, until his retirement in July, is as advisor to the third Armored Rifle Battalion, 40th Armored Division, in Santa Ana, Calif.

Colonel Ausan holds the B. S. degree from Augustana College, Sioux Falls, S. Dak., and has done graduate work in the field of education. He has held teaching positions at Strandburg, S. Dak., and at the University of California.

Colonel Ausan is married and has two children, a daughter in college in California, and a son, Jim, who will become a ninth grade Cadet at St. John's in September.

The Ausans will move to Salina in August.

He entered St. John's in 1887 and liked to recall that during the first year the noise of carpenters at work on Vail Hall would disturb classes.

Mr. Seitz served for many years as a Trustee of St. John's. He was honored at Commencement in 1959.

A guard of honor from the school will attend his funeral, the time which is yet to be announced at Skirmisher press-time.

The colors will fly at half mast until the hour of the funeral.

## Rector Reports on S.J.M.S. "Old Boys"

Col. R. L. Clem, school rector, and Mrs. Clem visited with several St. John's Old Boys and former associates of the school during their recent trip to California.

He brought back the following report.

**Roger Bigler**, Cadet C. O., 1955 . . . Roger, Ann and their son live at 434 Lee Street, Oakland in a spacious and attractive apartment. Mrs. H. L. Bigler was visiting Roger, so we had a fine visit and as an added dividend, lunch with Mrs. Bigler in their Saratoga home on a later date. Roger is a C. U. grad and is doing well in business.

Older brother, **Ed Bigler** . . . class of '2, begins his residency in Santa Clara as soon as he leaves his present work in Air Force medicine. Ed received his M.D. from Colorado U.

**Col. Edward T. Comegys**, who attended St. John's from 1897 to 1903 is a retired Army Colonel living at 4454 Newport Ave., San Diego. He and Mrs. Comegys enjoy their attractive home and gardens and were glad to be brought up to date on affairs at the school.

**Carl Fitzgerald**, 4055 3rd Ave., San Diego, who attended St. John's from 1910 to 1912 is retired and recalled Earl T. Johnson of Kansas City, Judge Albert E. Hillyard of Reno, Nevada, who died some years ago. Mr. Fitzgerald returns to his old home town, Dodge City, from time to time and was invited to include St. John's on his next visit to Kansas.

**Tinsley C. Fry**, Hermitage Drive, Monterey Peninsula Country club, Monterey, attended St. John's from 1911 to 1917. He took us on a two-hour tour of the area where I got photo shots of Pebble Beach and other golf courses. Mr. Fry is a "wheel" in the community where everyone seems to know him. The Fry Athletic Medal, given annually at St. John's, was suggested by him while a Cadet here.

Mrs. Braden wanted to be remembered to Mrs. Ganssle and Al Hart, former chef at St. John's.

It would be unfair to close these notes without mentioning the most generous hospitality of our Carlsbad patrons during the two days we spent there because of a preaching engagement at the local Episcopal Church, Mr. and Mrs. William O. Protz, whose son, Bill, was the first of the Carlsbad lads at St. John's, Dr. and Mrs. G. C. Hogsett, Mr. and Mrs. Antonio Hernandez, and Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Carrier were most kind to us. I am confident, they together with Mr. and Mrs. Denhof who were out of town, will make Carlsbad truly a St. John's town.
