Crack Drill Squad to Colorado

Two Appearances Scheduled; May Visit Air Force Academy

A three-day trip to Denver and Boulder, Colo., is on tap for members of the Crack Drill Squad early in February, thanks to efforts of members of the St. John's Foundation.

The drill team will perform at a mining convention at the Denver Hilton on Friday evening, Feb. 8. Arrangements for this appearance were made by Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Spencer, parents of Cadet John B. Spencer of Denver.

An additional highlight of the Colorado trip will be a Crack Squad show between halves of the Colorado U. — Kansas U. basketball game in Boulder on Saturday evening, Feb. 9. These arrangements are being handled by Mr. and Mrs. Paul Cook, parents of Dee Cook of Denver.

Mr. Cook, president of the St. John's Foundation, is also handling housing arrangements. Cadets will be housed in homes of several of the Denver patrons.

An additional highlight of the trip is the possibility of a tour of the Air Academy at Colorado Springs and also a visit to NORAD Headquarters in that area. Jack Miller, father of Cadet Chris Miller of Colorado Springs, is working on this project but nothing definite was known at Skirmisher press time.

School officials are high in their praise of the job Cadet Lt. George Bartley has done with the Crack Drill Squad. The drill team is expected to represent St. John's well while in Colorado.

Arrangements are being made through Civil Air Patrol Wing Headquarters in Wichita to try to obtain air lift for the trip. It appears that a U.S. Air Force C-47 will be available. However, in the event air lift cannot be arranged, a bus will be chartered.
