Thanksgiving Recess Next On Schedule

Hundreds of visitors are expected on campus for the two-day Thanksgiving recess Nov. 21 and 22. Classes will be dismissed and parents and friends have been invited to attend festivities at the school.

Parents may meet with faculty members on Wednesday, Nov. 21.

The traditional Thanksgiving dance will begin with the faculty receiving line at 7:30 p.m. in the 4-H Building, Kenwood Park. The first drill of the 1962-63 year by the Crack Squad, commanded by Lt. George Libby, will follow. Dancing will be from 8:30 to 11 p.m.

The service of Holy Communion will be celebrated in Armstrong Chapel at 7:15 a.m., Thursday, Nov. 22. Cadet attendance is optional.

The fall meeting of the St. John's Military School Foundation will follow a breakfast at 8:30 a.m. at the Holiday Inn.

A Service of Thanksgiving will be held at 11:15 a.m. at Christ Cathedral in downtown Salina.

The turkey dinner will be

served at 12:30 p.m. at the 4-H Building. Cadets will have the afternoon free until taps at 9:30 p.m.

Classes will resume Friday, Nov. 23.

Cadets will be free to visit with parents and friends all day Wednesday. Cadets are required to attend the dance, Thanksgiving service and dinner.

Cadets must have breakfast at the school on Thursday and may not have visitors until 10 a.m.

Special Passes For Academic Effort Being Awarded

Cadets earning a place on the honor roll or improving their academic standing will be eligible for special passes.

Members of the National Honor Society are granted one weekly pass and four non-transferable coupons allowing them to miss one class period per subject during a grading period with the instructors' consent.

Those earning a place on the honor roll or receiving honorable mention will receive one honor pass during a grading period and four non-transferable coupons during a grading period.

Any Cadet who raises his grade two points per course or a total of eight points for all subject during the previous period will be granted one special pass. A Cadet who raises a failing grade to a passing grade during a grading period will receive one special pass for each subject raised.
