75th Corps of Cadets Dismissed Forever on 24th

The 1963-64 school year at St. John's Military School will come to a close with Commencement activities during the week-end of May 22-24.

The first official activities will be a series of awards assemblies during the last week of school. Cadet activities and athletic awards will be made at a 5 p.m. assembly, May 19. Military awards will be made at 5 p.m. May 20.

Academic and faculty merit awards will be given at 7:30 p.m., May 21 in the Armstrong Chapel. Final awards will be made at an Awards Convocation at 7:30 p.m. Friday May 22, on Perkins Field.

Shorter Program

Awards presentations are being made during the week this year to shorten the Commencement program on Sunday afternoon. The only award to be made on Commencement afternoon will be the Gordon Prize, along with the presentation of the Hardy Sabre to next year's commanding officer. Diplomas will, of course, also be presented to the eighth graders and the seniors!

Parents will have an opportunity to confer with staff members on Saturday morning, May 23.

The annual spring meeting of the St. John's Foundation will follow a luncheon at 12 noon, Saturday, May 23, at the Holiday Inn.

Military Field Day

Saturday afternoon will be devoted to the military department with platoon and squad competitions and the individual drill-downs in the Upper and Junior Schools. The Crack Platoon will also drill and Capt. Peter Black, the commander, will turn over the command to an underclassman.

The Drum and Bugle Corps

The traditional Military Ball in honor of the seniors will be held Saturday evening at the 4H Building in Kenwood Park.

The evening will begin with the Senior Receiving line at 7:30 p.m. to be followed by the final performance of the 1963-64 Crack Drill Squad, commanded by Capt. Rick Taylor. The new commander will be named near the end of the drill. Dancing will be from 9 to 11:30 p.m. Taps will be at 1 a.m.

Activities on Sunday, May 24, will begin with an optional service of Holy Communion in Armstrong Memorial Chapel at 7:30 a.m.

The Baccalaureate Service will be at 11 a.m. at Christ Episcopal Cathedral. The Rt. Rev. Arnold M. Lewis, Bishop of the Episcopal Missionary District of Western Kansas and president ex-officio of the St. John's Board of Trustees, will be the preacher.

Following the service, a buffet lunch will be served in the school dining hall. Seating will be available for all guests in either the dining hall or picnic tables outside. The First Infantry Division Army Band from Ft. Riley will play a concert during the lunch hour.

Foundation Raises - \$15,000, But . . .

Diamond Jubilee Fund Drive Far Short of \$300,000 Goal

The total in gifts and pledges in the St. John's Military School Diamond Jubilee Fund Drive has passed the \$125,000 mark.

The drive is being conducted to raise \$300,000 to build a new 88-Cadet Junior school barracks.

Lt. Col. Keith G. Duckers, staff coordinator for the drive, said the St. John's Foundation should be commended for giving more than it pledged. The Foundation pledged \$15,000 to the drive.

Colonel Duckers said the amount raised is far short of the goal but that the Board of Trustees is expected to take some action at its June board meeting.

He said there are three alternatives but that some type of construction will probably begin late this summer or early next fall. Colonel Duckers said the Board could borrow the difference and build and completely furnish the building; or the building could be constructed as far as existing funds will permit and use existing furniture from the present building. The third alternative would be to borrow enough money to finish the shell of the building, costing about \$225,000 and furnishing.

The new barracks would be constructed near the present Junior School building. The old building would be razed when the new building is completed.

Beginning next fall, the Parkview school building on the southwest corner of the campus will be added to the St. John's plant. The Salina School Board has built an addition to another school to replace the Parkview building. The Parkview building will be used for Junior School classrooms next year.

Cadets Busy At Fort Riley

A busy and educational four days were spent by the Upper School Cadets during the annual visit to Ft. Riley, May 6-10.

The purpose of the trip was to fire the M-1 qualifying course at the Fort. Besides firing the .30 caliber course, the Cadets also saw a special fire power demonstration, attended a Sunday church service at the base chapel, saw a sky-diving demonstration and various other static displays of military equipment at the Fort.

Arrangements for the visit were made by Maj. Arthur Long, Professor of Military Science.

Taylor Shoots Top Score

Colonel Guernsey Describes S.J.M.S. Summer Program

A few vacancies are still available for the summer school program to be conducted by St. John's Military School on the campus of Colorado State University, Ft. Collins, from June 15 to Aug. 7.

Lt. Col. R. L. Guernsey, summer school director, said the school is designed to fill several academic needs.
