## Federal Inspection Schedule Set

The schedule for the annual Federal Inspection of the St. John's Cadet Corps and military program has been announced by Maj. Arthur Long, Professor of Military Science.

The United States Army, under the jurisdiction of the 16th Army Corps headquarters in Omaha, will make the inspection as a part of the National Defense Cadet Corps Program. St. John's is a NDCC school.

The inspectors will be greeted by an honor guard at 9 a.m. and will be introduced to school officials. The Cadets will march in review at 9:30 a.m.

The Drum and Bugle Corps will perform at 10 o'clock to be followed by drills by the Crack Squad and Crack Platoon.

## Tests Results Are Evaluated

The results of the three-hour National Educational Development Tests and the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying tests are presently being evaluated by Science Research Associates, according to LCDR. H. E. Nuss, Senior Master.

The tests were taken by freshmen, sophomores and juniors on March 10.

Commander Nuss said, "Both batteries were a series of tests in English, social studies, mathematics, natural sciences and word usage which have been designed to measure each student's ability to apply basic learning skills rather than his ability to memorize particular facts or specific subject matter."

He said that both sets of tests are being used at St. John's to help students, parents and teachers identify strengths and weaknesses in each student's educational development and to help them make a realistic appraisal of his educational and vocational objectives.

The scores and an interpretive booklet will be available by May 15. Parents are urged to hear the results and to discuss them with school authorities at commencement time.

## Summer School Applications Are Now Available

Applications and brochures for the St. John's summer school program to be conducted on the campus of Colorado State University, Ft. Collins, are now available in the school office.

The St. John's summer session, headed by Lt. Col. R. L. Guernsey, will begin June 15 and close August 7.

Students will be housed and fed in student dorms and will be insured under the University's health program.

Twenty-five and possibly 28 students can be accepted. General areas to be taught include English, mathematics, biology, and several classes in the social science field.

The session, to be non-military, will cost \$650 including board and room.

A student will receive 1½ Carnegie Units of credit for work carried successfully during the session.

## Here Comes St. John's

The St. John's Upper School Cadet Corps will be hosted by the Third Brigade on a four-day visit to Ft. Riley, near Junction City, May 6 to 10.

The purpose of the visit is to fire the .30 caliber qualification course. Plans and arrangements are being made by Maj. Arthur Long, Professor of Military Science.

The Corps will leave campus by chartered buses following classes on May 6. The Cadets will be housed with the Third Brigade on Custer Hill, a newly developed area at Ft. Riley.

Wednesday evening will be spent making preparations for firing on Thursday. An early first call is scheduled for Thursday and the day will be spent firing the .30 caliber range.

The Cadet Corps will be hosted by the engineers, artillery, air and armored units on Friday and will see static displays and demonstrations of various equipment.

The St. John's group will be a part of an international field day for students on Saturday and again will see various demonstrations. They will be permitted to ride tanks and other personnel moving equipment.

Major Long said he is trying to arrange appearances of the various St. John's drill units for the top ranking officials at the Fort.

A late-sleep and church of choice at post chapels will be on the schedule May 10 before the Corps returns to Salina.

Cadets will be fed in the post mess halls and field messes. During evening free time, the boys will be permitted to use most post recreational facilities including the theater and PX.

The trip to the Fort to fire the course is an annual event at the school.
