76th Corps of Cadets Is Formed

Enrollment Record Set As 205 Report for Classes

The 76th year at St. John's Military School began Sept. 8, with a record enrollment of 205 Cadets

New Cadets arrived on Sept. 7 and 8. Orientation and testing were held Sept. 9, with former Cadets reporting on Sept. 10. Classes began Sept. 11.

Upper School enrollment is 167 with 37 freshmen, 54 sophomores, 43 juniors and 33 seniors

The Junior School has 38 Cadets enrolled.

Represented in the Cadet Corps are boys from 21 states and three foreign countries.

Colorado has the largest state delegation with 73 boys. Kansas follows with 41 Cadets. There are 19 boys enrolled from New Mexico and 15 from Nebraska.

The cities with large Cadet representation are Denver and area, 29; Wichita, 19 and Albuquerque, 11.

Three new members have joined the faculty. They are Lt. George Walker, language instructor; Mrs. Jerry Abbott, English teacher, and Maj. William Webb, study hall supervisor.

A change in staff assignments was made with the appointment of Capt. Jack McCandless to the position of commandant. He fills the vacancy created by the resignation of Lt. Col. James V. Ausan.

Improvements to the plant during the summer included painting of classrooms, installation of new bulletin boards and venetian blinds in classrooms, and the usual painting and repair work in the barracks.

The flag pole was also painted.

"Space Age Religion" Theme for Seminar

"Religion in the Space Age" will be the theme of a day long all-school seminar at St. John's on Wednesday, Oct. 30.

Col. R. L. Clem, Rector and Superintendent, said, "This is a new innovation at St. John's and one that we hope will become an annual event. This is not a new idea as many private schools and colleges have Religious Emphasis days and weeks on their campuses each year."

"The day will be devoted to discussions of religion in the life of a boy in the space age," said Colonel Clem.

EDITORIAL - - -

— Good Advice! —

(Editor's note—The following open letter to the 1963 St. John's Cadets was written by a former student and graduate of the class of 1959, Leon Swartzendruber of Whittier, Calif. He was graduated from Whittier College this spring and is now doing graduate work in engineering psychology on a fellowship grant at the University of Illinois.)

Dear Cadets,

How many times have you remarked to yourself, "If only I had that to do over again!"? I am sure that almost everyone has had this thought at one time or another, for this naturally follows from the fact that much of life—especially youth—is a trial and error process in which we attempt to bring about the most desirable results, this by means of experimenting. Sometimes the experiments result in situations which are to our advantage, but at other times they show us that the course that we took was not the right one.

In the process of preparing for adulthood, many young people have learned to beat this trial and error game. How do they do it? They have acquired the ability to **learn from the mistakes of others**, thus avoiding having these mistakes chalked up to their own records. If you are this type of person, and if you are also interested in going to college, this letter may prove to be to your benefit, for I am about to discuss one of the more serious mistakes that I made at St. John's only a few years ago.

Many high school students are now under the impression that they must become "well-rounded," this by "making the most" of a wide variety of extracurricular activities. Unfortunately, some of these students allow themselves to become so entangled in nonacademic matters, that what was originally intended to be a supplement or adjunct to the academic curriculum inadvertently comes to be regarded as more important than the acquisition of the best education.

To some extent, this was one of my shortcoming, for despite the warnings of one of my faculty advisors, I persisted in letting the extracurricular tail wag the academic dog. As a new boy, I was so impressed with the upperclassmen who were actively involved in extracurricular activities that I set out to become a part of every extracurricular activity at St. John's. At that time I could not see that this would make serious demands upon study time nor could I see that what looked impressive to me then would, after four years of college, appear to be rather unimpressive. Nevertheless, since I was able to maintain a respectable grade average despite being cramped for time by nonacademic interests, I fooled myself into a false satisfaction regarding my academic progress, for I refused to admit to myself that, with fewer demands upon my time, I could have been giving myself substantially **better** preparation for college. Although I did manage to gain admittance to a good college, I feel certain that I would have been admitted to a **better** college had I had **better** grades, **better** college board scores, and only a **moderate** amount of outside activities.

The moral of the story is not that you should chuck all extracurricular activities out the window—a reasonable number of nonacademic interests, particularly athletics, is a necessary supplement to a high school or college curriculum—but the important point is to **keep academic and nonacademic matters in their proper places**. The way that you spend time at St. John's will someday be reflected, to some extent, in your personal standard of living, for in our increasingly complex society, education is in nearly all cases essential just in order to **make** a living, and a **good** education is prerequisite to the making of a **good** living.

In evaluating the records of applicants, most employers and institutions of higher learning are putting the greatest emphasis on the applicant's transcript (which is a record of academic progress, not extracurricular progress) and are supplementing this with a record of extracurricular participation only if the transcript is above certain standards. The transcript will follow you into almost any program that you wish to undertake. As one corporation employment interviewer once commented to a college president, regarding a college graduate whose application for a corporation position had been turned down, "To be sure, the young man was quite 'well-rounded,' but his radius was just too short to be of any use to us!" Let us hope that this cannot someday be said of you.
