\$75,000 Now Pledged

Fund Drive Reaches Quarter Way to Goal

About \$75,000 has been pledged or given in the Diamond Jubilee Fund Drive at St. John's Military School. The drive is being staged to raise \$300,000 in gifts and pledges over a three-year period to construct a new 88-Cadet Junior School dormitory.

The drive has been divided into four phases — local, patrons, alumni and non-local friends of the school.

The local drive started Jan. 14, with a kick-off breakfast and is now about 25 percent complete. Local co-chairman are W. W. Yost and Ham Lynch, both members of the Board of Trustees.

Dan Bolen, local publicity chairman, pointed out that this is the most ambitious fund raising drive in the school's 75-year history. He added that St. John's has not appealed for local help in years and that the continued future success of the school is very much dependent upon this drive. The new dormitory is badly needed.

School officials point out that the \$80,000 Clem library built 18 months ago is being paid for from the operational budget and by gifts from patrons and friends outside Salina.

A Denver patron and member of the Board of Trustees, John Galen Spencer, is heading the patron division. Parents have given or pledged \$15,000.

1898 Grad Makes Substantial Gift

An 1898 graduate of St. John's has made a substantial pledge to the Diamond Jubilee Drive and has brought the school up to date on his activities since his graduation.

The Rev. George Davidson is now Rector Emeritus of St. John's Episcopal Church in Los Angeles after serving as rector for over 38 years.

He has written of his rectorship at St. John's, "It is correct that I was the Rector of the largest Episcopal Church west of Chicago. During my time at St. John's church, I built one of the most beautiful churches in America. It was built of reinforced concrete and the chancel all of mosaics and marble. The whole is a work of art. During the past summer, I went to Italy to arrange for gold and marble mosaics, representing the transfiguration scene to be installed over the central arch of the chancel."

Dr. Davidson was born in Halifax, Nova Scotia. He entered St. John's in 1893 and was graduated as senior captain of the student body. After his days at St. John's, he attended Kenyon College and Bexley Theological School.

Unless we reach all possible donors and somehow appeal to their generosity, we are going to be in serious trouble. With all the urgency at my command I ask you to not only make personal contributions but to urge others with whom you have influence to do the same. These will bring wonderful dividends.

K. U. Chancellor Writes

AN OPEN LETTER

Dear Senior Cadet:

You have asked me to write an article for your high school newspaper describing the advantages of attending a college away from home, but whether a college is close to home or far from it seems to me incidental to the significant decision a high school senior must make when he chooses which institution of higher education to attend. I would suggest, rather, that you every high school student make this decision on the basis of where you can get the best education.

This is not always easy to discover. You will have to do a good deal of investigating, but the effort will be eminently worthwhile. The place you choose will be the college or university in which you may spend the next four years of your life, which will prepare you for the best use of the fifty or more years you will have before you.

To find such a place you will have to ask yourself some questions: what is the basic nature of the institution — is it a junior college or a four-year college, is it a liberal arts college or a university, is it a municipal school or a residential institution? What does it offer you, either in preparation for further study or for a career? Does it have the kind of program in which you wish to major or specialize? Does it offer you the opportunity to change your mind — and most students do change their minds about what they wish to study — without undue penalty? Some or all of the answers to these questions will be important to you.

Many of the answers can be found in catalogs, but you will reach a point where the catalog, no matter how good, will not suffice. Then you should visit the campuses of the various colleges and universities to which your decision has been narrowed.

There is no substitute for a personal inspection and a personal evaluation of such factors as the environment for living and for study, the attitudes of students and faculty members, the feel of the place! Look at the classroom and laboratory facilities. Consider the extracurricular opportunities for enjoying music, art, drama, lectures, sports, social occasions. Talk with advisers about matters that still trouble you.

When it comes to make your final decision, you will weigh many factors: cost, living accommodations, academic programs, difficulty of the courses, friends who are attending, the availability of scholarships, loans, jobs, the feelings of students about their studies, the attitudes of faculty members toward their students, the chances of pledging a fraternity or a sorority, the distance from home . . . Some of these are less important than others, but not all of them in the same way to everyone. No one can weigh them but you.

I suggest one final question — its answer should be important to every student — how good is the institution? Quality is not easy to assess, even for professionals in the business of education, but there are a few yardsticks. Is the library large and is it growing rapidly? Is the faculty members regarded by leading members of their own fields? What kind of achievements are marked up by students? How many, for instance, go on to graduate school or to post-graduate professional schools? How many win fellowships for graduate study? What contributions have been made to the world and to its professions by the institution's alumni?

Every other question is incidental to the basic question each high school student must answer for himself: where can I get the best education? Each student may get a different answer, but it will be the right one for him. I hope this letter will serve as my answer to your request.

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Trip To East Being Organized For Senior Cadets

Senior Cadets, who meet eligibility requirements, this year again will be permitted to participate in the Kansas Council on World Affairs High School Educational tour to Washington, D. C., and New York City. The tour is scheduled for April 5 to 11.

Dr. E. F. Giannagelo, Pratt dentist, organizes the tour each year as his personal hobby. Students from all over the state of Kansas make the trip.

Included in the itinerary are an illuminated night tour of Washington with stops at Lincoln Memorial, Archives Building and Congressional Library, and a morning tour of the Bureau of Printing and Engraving, Arlington National Cemetery to witness the changing of the guard at the Tombs of the Unknown Soldiers, Alexandria, Va., and Mt. Vernon.

A tour of the Capitol building will be made and the students will meet with Kansas Senators and Representatives.

A special briefing on foreign policy will be given to the group in a government auditorium.

Visits will be made to the Washington Monument, Pan American Union Building, Organization of American States Council rooms and the White House.

A visit to the Empire State building will be made before checking into the Hotel Taft in New York.

High points of the New York visit will include a tour of Greenwich Village, China Town, Bowery, and Wall Street; a boat ride to the Statue of Liberty; a complete guided tour of the United Nations and free time for sightseeing and shopping.

The cost of the tour is \$152 which includes all rail fare from Kansas City, hotel, bus, tipping, all meals, admission fees, guide fees and insurance. Fare from Salina to Kansas City and return will be extra.

Applications and the \$152 tour cost must be turned in to Mrs. Sally Miller by Feb. 28. Several applications have been received.

To be eligible for the trip, a senior must have a 78 average for the year in all academic courses through April 4.

St. John's Military School hit 61 percent of its field shots in a third-quarter outburst and went on to defeat the Kanopolis Bulldogs 75-57 Jan. 14, in the Cadets' gym.

All five St. John's starters scored in the double figures, led by Gregory Reynolds and Con Schaefer who had 19 and 16 points respectively.

The Cadets led in the shooting percentage department as four of the starters hit better than 42 percent of their attempts from the field. St. John's collected 42.3 percent from the field while Kanopolis got 39.6 percent.

The Cadets employed a full court press intermittently in the first half and it paid off. In the third quarter the Cadets used the same tactics to steal the ball on many occasions and were able to get their fastbreak offense rolling.

With the game practically in the bag, Coach Dale Browning cleared his bench during the last four minutes of play as the Cadets hit an offensive high for the season.

St. John's now holds a 2-3 season record.
