Kansas Governor Accepts Trustee Post

Bill Yost Will Head Board Executive Committee

Governor William H. Avery of the State of Kansas is among six new Trustees elected to the Board of St. John's Military School, Colonel R. L. Clem, Rector and Superintendent, has announced.

Governor Avery will join three Salinans and two other Kansans in filling the six positions.

Colonel Clem, and Lt. Col. Keith G. Duckers, assistant superintendent and a Board representative met with the Governor in Topeka Feb. 27, to discuss the program at St. John's.

He informed them that he would accept the three-term on the Board.

Salinans elected to the Board are Kelly Slaughter, investment counsellor; Tom W. Hampton, attorney, and Joe C. Cloud, grainman.

The Rt. Rev. Edward C. Turner, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas will serve as ex-officio president of the St.

John's Board of Trustees until a new Bishop of Western Kansas is announced.

Other newly elected trustees include Cecil A. Jordan, retired milling executive, Wichita, who has previously served a three-year term on the Board. A person to be appointed from the Diocese of Kansas by Bishop Turner will round out the 16-man governing body.

Trustees whose three-year terms expire following the June meeting are Albert C. Becker; Kansas City, Kans.; C. N. Hoffman jr., Salina banker; Verne M. Laing, Wichita attorney; Bryan H. Lynch, Salina grainman, and Kenneth L. Wright, Salina grainman.

Board members who will continue for one or more years are Milton Blakemore, Liberal, Kansas, banker; Dr. Ralph Hale, Wichita physician; Dan Bolen, Salina realtor; Ralph E. Reitz, Salina accountant; Fred Rice, Salina businessman; William W. Yost, Salina insurance man; Dr. Robert Weber, Salina physician, C. J. Wertz, Salina businessman and Jerry Vanier.

Yost will succeed Hoffman as chairman of the executive committee of St. John's.

Ft. Riley Trip Nears

All Upper School Cadets will spend four days at Ft. Riley from April 1 to April 4.

The purpose of the trip to the Fort near Junction City is to fire the M-14 rifle on the open firing range.

The 169 Cadets will leave St. John's following noon mess on April 1 on chartered buses.

The Cadets will be guests of the First Brigade of the First Infantry Division at the Fort. They will be housed in regulation army barracks during the visit and will eat their meals in mess halls at the Fort.

Each individual will fire 80 rounds of ammunition in the field firing exercise including firing at pop-up targets. Firing will be supervised by members of the First Brigade.

Tentative plans call for orientation programs on tanks, air power, artillery and the engineers program.

Cadets will also be permitted use of base recreational facilities.

Accompanying the troops will be Maj. William Webb and Maj. Arthur Long.

Chartered buses will return the boys to the school on Sunday afternoon April 4.

Gen. Davis Visits S.J.

Maj. Gen. Kermit Davis, commander of the 16th Army Corps visited the St. John's Military School campus Monday, March 22. General Davis made the visit as a part of his annual inspection tour of ROTC, NDCC and Army Reserve units in Kansas.

General Davis was greeted by an honor guard when he arrived on campus at 2 p. m. He spent two hours at the school touring the campus and visiting with faculty and staff before leaving at 4 p. m.

The 16th Corps encompasses Reserve, ROTC, and National Defense Cadet Corps units in Kansas, Nebraska and Colorado.

The Lower School Cadets of '64-'65 have donated a new plaque of track records to be placed in the new Lower School barracks when completed. Names of record holders will be attached to the plaque.

Annual Inspection Scheduled for April 9

The annual formal and general inspection of the St. John's Military program under the National Defense Cadet Corps program will be held April 9 at the school.

The inspection is held annually to judge the quality of the military program at ROTC and NDCC schools.

The suggested agenda and schedule for the day is now in the hands of the inspecting officers for their confirmation.

The inspectors will be Maj. Robert H. DuBois, Professor of Military Science of the Omaha High School ROTC group, Omaha, Neb., and Capt. Robert

D. Woods, assistant PMS of the ROTC group at Kansas State College, Pittsburg.

St. John's has earned the top rating, honor school, each year it has participated in the NDCC program.

Classes will be dismissed for the day. Inspectors will be greeted by an honor guard and receiving line. They will view parades, check records and inspect barracks and question Cadets on their military knowledge.

Summer School Plans Are Made

Lt. Col. R. L. Guernsey, Summer School Director, was in Ft. Collins, Colo., during spring furlough making final plans for the second summer school session to be held on the campus of Colorado State University.

Applications will still be accepted for the session which begins June 14 and ends Aug. 6.

Each student will be helped to earn 1½ units or 3 credits of academic work during the eight-week session.

Progress 'Slow' On New Dorm

Work on the new Lower School barracks is progressing slowly due to the cold weather, according to Lt. Col. Keith G. Duckers, Assistant Superintendent.

Workmen have begun setting forms for the concrete columns that will support the second floor of the building.

The new barracks will house 88 Cadets and four faculty members and families.

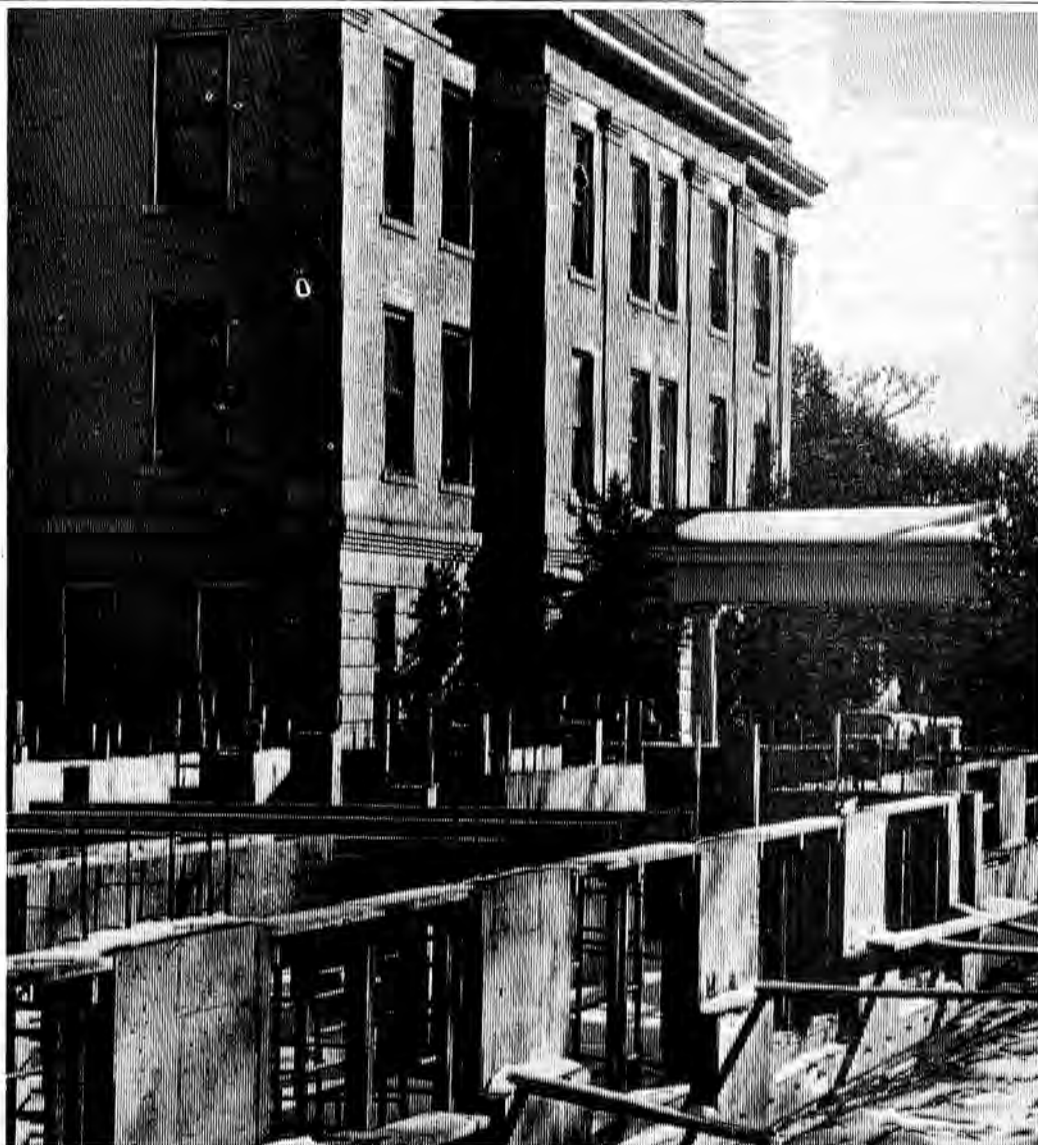
Colonel Duckers said in spite of the bad weather it is still anticipated that the building will be ready for use next October. When completed the old junior school building will be razed.

Present Junior School

Salina's First Hospital To Be Torn Down

When the new Lower School building is completed and the old one razed, Salina's first hospital will be a thing existing only in the past.

The city's pioneer hospital was opened in October, 1910, by the Episcopal Church in the District of Salina, now the Missionary District of Western Kansas.

Named St. Barnabas hospital, it served the Salina area until it was closed in December, 1921.

The Episcopal hospital was organized at the request of a group of Salina physicians who approached the Rt. Rev. S. M. Griswold, then bishop.

Bishop Griswold announced that St. John's Military School had donated four acres on which to erect the hospital.

The hospital cost a little over \$19,000 to build and \$5,000 to furnish. The report for 1913 carefully listed the condition

of all 177 patients during the year: cured, 118; improved 43; unimproved, 5, deaths 11. There were four births.

When the Rt. Rev. Robert H. Mize came to Salina as the new Bishop, he was immediately concerned with the hospital. He warned that it was inadequate.

St. Barnabas hospital was closed Dec. 1, 1921 and the building turned over to St. John's to be used for the younger boys.
